PHOTOJOURNALISTS SPEAKING AT CARTER LIBRARY

IRAQ WAR PHOTOGRAPHERS AND WHITE HOUSE PHOTOJOURNALIST TO DISCUSS WORK

Atlanta, GA. - Two freelance photographers who covered the war in Iraq and a famed White House photographer will discuss their work during upcoming author lectures and book-signings at the Carter Presidential Library.

On Tuesday, October 24th, photographers Kael Alford and Thorne Anderson will show examples of their work covering the war in Iraq. Following their 7:30 p.m. lecture, they will sign copies of their book "Unembedded: Four Independent Journalists on the War in Iraq." Literary Journal writes "whether one opposes or supports the war in Iraq, this is recommended reading-or viewing-for the thought-provoking and wrenching photographs." The lecture and book-signing is free and open to the public.

Walker's photographs capture the First Families and world leaders in ways rarely seen. Her talent and professionalism gained her access to the private, personal moments. Her work is humorous, touching and candid. Following her talk and slide presentation, Walker will sign copies of her book, "Public and Private: Twenty-five Years of White House Photography."
