November 2nd at 6:45pm in the Carter Museum Theater... (FREE)

Anne Emanuel, author of *Elbert Parr Tuttle: Chief Jurist of the Civil Rights Revolution*

This is the first—and the only authorized—biography Elbert Parr Tuttle (1897–1996), the judge who led the federal court with jurisdiction over most of the Deep South through the most tumultuous years of the civil rights revolution.
