March 26 at 7pm ..James Hunt...*Restless Fires: John Muir's Thousand Mile Walk to the Gulf*

The Carter Library and the Sierra Club host James Hunt for a discussion of the travels of John Muir. Hunt effectively makes the case that Muir was profoundly affected by his travels through the Southern United States in ways that significantly shaped the future direction of his life. FREE

March 27 at 7pm... Stuart E. Eizenstat,.....*The Future of the Jews: How Global Forces are Impacting the Jewish People, Israel, and Its Relationship with the United States*

The Carter Library and the World Affairs Council host Stuart Eizenstat for a discussion of his book, "The Future of the Jews." Eizenstat surveys the major geopolitical, economic, and security challenges facing the world in general, and the Jewish world and the United States in particular. FREE

Among the bodies found at the Tri-State Crematory was that of Brent Hendricks's father. FREE
