November Authors at Carter Library

Atlanta, GAWar and Peace seems to be the theme for our November book signings at the Carter Presidential Library. All of the programs begin at 7:00 pm and all three are free. Here's a quick look at what's coming up...

Monday, Nov. 9.....Antony Beevor.... *"Ardennes 1944"*

Tuesday, Nov. 17....Jane Smiley..... *"Golden Age"*

Friday, Nov.20.....*"Women, Religion & Peacebuilding" & "Women's Bodies as Battlefields"*

We begin with New York Times bestselling author and historian Antony Beevor and his book *Ardennes 1944: The Battle of the Bulge*. Book TV will be on hand to record this talk for airing on C-Span. Library Journal says "[T]his is a treasure of memorable portraits, striking details, fascinating revelations, and broad insights—likely to be the definitive account of the battle for years to come. Essential reading for anyone interested in World War II." The talk will be in the Carter Museum Theater. Acappella Books will have copies of the book available for purchase and signing.

On November 17th, we join with the Georgia Center for the Book to present Pulitzer Prize winning writer Jane Smiley and her new book *Golden Age: A novel (Last Hundred Years Trilogy)*. This is the much-anticipated final volume, following *Some Luck* and *Early Warning*, of her acclaimed American trilogy—a richly absorbing new novel that brings the remarkable Langdon family into our present times and beyond. This program will be held in the Carter Center's Cecil B. Day Chapel.

We'll end the month with a double-hitter on Friday, November 20th. Katherine Marshall and Susan Hayward will discuss their book *Women, Religion and Peacebuilding* which examines the obstacles and opportunities that women religious peacebuilders face. In addition, Susan Brooks Thistlethwaite will talk about her book *Women's Bodies as Battlefields* which argues that the 'war on women' is not a metaphor but rather a global pandemic of violence against women that constitutes an actual war.
