

Hard Times For Chavez' Farm Union

CANDIDATE POSITIONS

(Continued from page 1)

Here are the positions of the leading candidates:

- California Governor Edmund G. (Jerry) Brown — In an April 12 editorial, the WHITTIER (CA) DAILY NEWS noted that the Governor's opposition to Right to Work "lines him up with those who do not think a worker should be free to join an organization or not join an organization. If Governor Brown does not believe a citizen should be as free to choose his work as to choose his church or a town to live in, he should say so in plain terms." Two weeks later, during a Maryland campaign swing, the Governor did just that — saying he opposes Section 14(b) and Right to Work laws.

- Former Georgia Governor Jimmy Carter — Speaking recently in Waukesha, Wisc., Governor Carter dispelled any doubt about his position, saying: "I think Section 14(b) should be repealed, which would permit the abolition of Right to Work laws, and if the Congress passes such legislation, I'd be glad to sign it." There had been some confusion over Carter's position, stemming from a 1971 letter to the National Right to Work Committee in which he said he was "not in favor of doing away with the Right to Work law." Carter's about face has shocked some of his long-time supporters like Gerald Anderson, Democratic Party Chairman in Georgia's Second Congressional District, who announced recently that he was withdrawing his support for Carter because of his new anti-Right to Work position.

- President Gerald R. Ford — In his first statement on Right to Work since assuming the Presidency, President Ford recently told the publisher of SAN ANGELO (TX) STANDARD-TIMES, that he opposes elimination of Section 14(b). "I would, under no circumstances, take that right away from any state by either law or constitutional amendment."

- Senator Henry (Scoop) Jackson — Senator Jackson continues to court favor with top union officials by attacking voluntary unionism at every occasion.

- Former California Governor Ronald Reagan — Governor Reagan has spoken out on Right to Work only once during the campaign, saying that he was "leaning . . . very heavily toward Right to Work."

- Representative Morris Udall — Congressman Udall has repeatedly promised union officials that he will conduct a crusade against Right to Work if they help him get elected President.

Despite enactment of a state farm labor law designed to expedite the forced unionization of California farm workers, Cesar Chavez' years-long crusade to make himself king over America's farm laborers has fallen on hard times.

Throughout his organization's history, Chavez has demonstrated a remarkable inability to get workers to join voluntarily. As a result, he has done his "organizing" by waging war against the growers, pressuring them to force their employees into an unwanted union.

His ability to win these wars during the early 1970's hinged largely on his ability to gain support from benighted clergy and various political and social activists. Their continued allegiance, however, appears to be very much in question.

"Chavez falls back on boycotts because he finds it easier to win favor among shoppers in parking lots than among . . . (workers)," admits Sister Thomas More Bertels, a one-time Chavez activist. "He seeks to achieve in the supermarkets of suburbia what he apparently cannot achieve in the fields of California."

Writing in the April issue of FARM JOURNAL Magazine, Sister Bertels says that "like hundreds of other adherents of the social gospel, (she) had refused to eat grapes and lettuce," assuming "that the information being disseminated in the classroom, from the pulpit, and by the media was unadulterated truth." To her amazement, however, she learned otherwise.

She learned, for example, that Chavez never had the voluntary support of even a sizeable minority of the farm labor rank-and-file. (At one point, while he was being hailed as spokesman for all of California's farm workers, a report on file with the Labor Department showed fewer than 2,500 voluntary members.)

She learned that the Chavez union, run by cadres of social activists, openly discriminates against workers which the union bosses consider a threat to their movement.

She learned too that the only way Chavez was able to recruit "members" was by promoting product boycotts which compelled the growers to sign contracts requiring their workers to join the union.

Armed with fact rather than propaganda, Sister Bertels thinks it important enough to speak up.

"What right have they to decide which union is best for the farm workers? They have placed the church and the academic community in the untenable position of insisting that the workers have freedom of choice, then maligning that choice if it does not square with theirs."



Dear Mr. Carter,




