

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

SUBJECT: Significant Actions, Secretary and Deputy Secretary of Defense (October 27 - November 2, 1979)

Defense Cooperation with Egypt, Portugal, and Turkey: Bill Perry, my Under Secretary for Research and Engineering, and I have been very encouraged by Egyptian, Portuguese, and Turkish capability to manufacture defense equipment. We have been working to increase their internal production through bilateral agreements and joint projects, particularly in light of FMS program fund restrictions. Egypt clearly has by far the largest defense industrial capacity--far better than we had previously thought possible--but Portuguese and even Turkish industry also offer considerable potential for increased defense-oriented production. Our joint programs offer an impressive opportunity to develop allied national resources for defense purposes--I intend to expand these programs and will consult with Cy Vance to give our projects higher visibility in State.

Korea: Although it is still too early to predict with confidence the long term effect of the Park assassination on U.S.-Korean security arrangements, I continue to be encouraged by the coordinated--and stabilizing--effect of U.S.-Korean defense forces reaction to the crisis. This eased the Korean military's apprehensions about external security. In turn this encouraged them to support Korean governmental institutions and civilian rule.

China Trip: The Chinese have agreed to a unilateral U.S. announcement of my trip to China. We are announcing today that I will visit the PRC January 6-13 at the invitation of the Chinese Defense Minister Xu Xiangqian.

Loring Air Force Base, Maine: As a follow up to our breakfast discussion last Friday, the Defense Department has worked out an accommodation with Ed Muskie on the proposed realignment action at Loring. On Wednesday, we announced that previous plans to reduce operations have been re-evaluated and that Loring would continue as a fully operational B-52 base. Ed agreed to eliminate provisions and restrictions pertaining to Loring from the Military Construction bill (the condition we laid down) and is aware of your interest.

SALT: At present it appears that the SALT Treaty will be reported out by the SFRC. But we may face some difficult category 3 reservations even in Committee. Jack Javits told me he thinks debate could begin before Thanksgiving.

FY 80 Appropriations Bill: The FY 80 Appropriations bill proceeds slowly. Although agreement has been reached on the issue of where to build the six missile frigates, conference agreement and floor action may not be concluded before November 20th--requiring yet another continuing resolution. It may well be necessary to propose a formal procedure to decouple payroll disbursement authority from the Appropriations bill.

U.S.-Jordan Joint Military Commission (JMC): Despite strains in personal and diplomatic relations with King Hussein, the JMC mechanism has allowed us to convey our continued concern and support for Jordanian security. To follow up on JMC recommendations we intend to ask Congress for continued support for Jordanian Armed Forces modernization. This action should put Jordan's Chief of Staff, LtGen bin Shaker (with whom I met on Wednesday), in a better position to discourage King Hussein from concluding arms deals with the Soviets as well as set the stage for consultations with the King about West Bank and related issues.

Soviet Arms Deal in Yemen: Last week I asked Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense Robert Murray to visit Yemen and review our military program there in light of President Ali Abdallah Salih's apparent decision to accept a large package of Soviet arms. Our future programs will depend to some degree on Saudi actions to stop--or react to--the Soviet deal. We would expect the Saudis to fund further U.S. programs unless the Yemeni-Soviet deal is accepted. A Yemeni arms deal with the Soviets would be a setback for the Saudis as well as for us.

Cambodian Refugees: We have airlifted 800 tents to Thailand to provide shelter for the refugees and we stand ready to transport food, medical supplies, and a 30-member medical unit. The State Department and international relief organizations have been reluctant thus far to use military resources pending further assessment of the diplomatic implications of employing military equipment and personnel in that area.

SUBJECT: Telephone Call from the President to
R. Peter Strauss

As you know, Peter Strauss wanted to see you when he resigned as Director of Voice of America. He also was somewhat let down by the impersonal tone of our standard letter accepting his resignation. I think it would be worthwhile to have you call Strauss, and Hedley Donovan concurs.

Strauss, who is a prominent New York Democrat, has served in the last three Democratic administrations. He and his family have been generous financial backers of the Democratic party in the past.

Suggested talking points:

- (1) Thank Peter for the fine job he did;
- (2) Apologize that your schedule prevented you from meeting personally with Peter;
- (3) Tell Peter that you have read the attached letter sent to the Voice by a Vietnamese refugee and that you have signed a response (also attached).

I have reviewed the appropriateness of a letter from you to a Vietnamese refugee with Secretary Vance's personal staff, who concur in the suggestion. John Reinhardt also concurs.

For your information, many of the VOA's 2,500 staff members are ethnic Americans (Polish, etc.) and they have a sense of mission somewhat similar to the Peace Corps or poverty lawyers. I think it would be good for the VOA staff and you for you to give them some recognition.

I am also going to make the standard form of your response to a resignation somewhat less impersonal.

Voice of America Director, a Kennedy Ally, Resigns

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 — R. Peter Straus, asserting that the Carter White House is hamstrung by a "paranoia" about a prospective challenge from Senator Edward M. Kennedy, has resigned as director of the Voice of America and is considering supporting the Massachusetts Democrat for President.

Mr. Straus, who was appointed by President Carter to head the overseas broadcast service in June 1977, thus becomes the first person to resign from the Administration for political reasons since Senator Kennedy acknowledged last month that he was considering a Presidential candidacy of his own.

Mr. Straus, who is 58 years old, said in

an interview that he met with Senator Kennedy late last week "to inform him of what I was doing." He added that they did not discuss any role for Mr. Straus in a Kennedy campaign, but that the conversation left him "fairly convinced" that the Senator has decided to run.

Although Mr. Straus's resignation was submitted 10 days ago and accepted by the President in a brief letter dated Sept. 28, it has not yet been announced by the White House. The resignation takes effect Oct. 21.

'Badly Served by Subordinates'

Mr. Straus said that he believed Mr. Carter "is a better President than he is given credit for being," but he added that the President was "badly served by subordinates who suffer from a Kennedy para-

nolia that prevents them from focusing on more important things."

One result, he said "is that the extraordinarily dedicated civil servants in this Government, such as those at the Voice of America, get neither the credit nor the direction they deserve."

Mr. Straus said he attempted to meet with Mr. Carter to discuss such concerns at the end of August, but the White House

staff did not arrange an appointment. In his resignation letter, a copy of which was obtained by The New York Times, Mr. Straus said he "would have welcomed the opportunity to discuss with you some innovations needed to continue the forward thrust of motivation and creativity at the V.O.A.," but that he understood the "constraints" on the President's agenda.

In the interview, Mr. Straus said he hoped the President would take "a firmer hand in directing his subordinates and in directing the nation." He added that the

Administration's "conflicting" foreign policy makes it difficult for Americans and very hard for foreigners to understand where the country is going.

Close to Kennedy Family

A former president of radio station WMCA in New York City, Mr. Straus has long been close to the Kennedy family. He was chairman of the late Robert F. Kennedy's successful Senate campaign in New York in 1964. In 1960, WMCA became the first radio station in the country

to back a Presidential candidate when it endorsed John F. Kennedy. The station endorsed Mr. Carter in 1976 and Mr. Straus assisted in the Carter campaign organization.

Mr. Straus said it was "conceivable" that he would join a Kennedy-for-President campaign this year if one is started, but that he had not made that decision yet. In the meantime, he will develop and teach a course in "public diplomacy" at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies in Washington.

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
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"Too much" alcohol, Upton said, is certainly any more than two drinks a day. "Two are probably in the borderline region," he said, calling "a glass of wine or beer or highball" or "no more than one or two ounces of hard alcohol" daily safely moderate.

There is still another difference, however, between this new anticancer diet and the usual prudent heart diet. Most heart specialists advise against overeating saturated—usually solid—fats, like meat fats and butter, and instead advise use of unsaturated, usually more liquid fats, like some oils and margarines.

Upton advised going easy on all fats, based on recent experiments showing the number of cancers in rats fed unsaturated fats was even larger than that in rats fed saturated fats (which include coconut oil).

In short, he said, "don't overuse margarine just because it doesn't contain animal fat." And the average American who now consumes an amazing 40 percent of his or her calories in fats could well reduce fat intake to 33 percent, he advised.

Upton recommended a balanced diet, including "ample fresh fruits and vegetables," to provide important vitamins and minerals without resort to vitamin pills. He advised "generous intake of dietary fiber" on the basis of reports of fewer colon-bowel-cancers in people and some experimental animals who eat fibrous foods.

But, he emphasized, one can only call such advice "prudent," since the evidence isn't all in. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare, NCI's parent agency, has shunned

firm pronouncements on diet and cancer.

However, Dr. Ernest Wynder, head of the American Health Foundation in New York, urged such advice last June after his group's conference on cancer prevention. Dr. Mark Hegsted, head of the Agriculture Department's new Human Nutrition Center, and Dr. Anthony Miller, head of epidemiology at the National Cancer Institute of Canada, concurred.

Another panel of scientists—among them, Dr. Barry Compton of Washington University—yesterday urged reform of the way NIH reviews scientists' research proposals. The panel said that without reform, establishment scientists will keep blocking the new kinds of nutrition research needed to get the answers Upton said are required.

Voice of America Director Quits, Cites Carter's Staff

Voice of America Director R. Peter Straus has resigned, citing growing displeasure with the operations of the White House staff.

Straus indicated that he might be open to working for Sen. Edward M. Kennedy should the Massachusetts Democrat decide to seek the presidency in 1980.

"Carter is badly served by his staff these days," Straus, whose resignation is effective Oct. 21, said in an interview yesterday. "Carter himself is good, but you get conflicting signals on different days from the people who serve him. In the absence of any clear direction, it's unfair to ask my family to bear the burden or the taxpayers to pay me to sit over there for another 14 months."

This criticism was reflected in his letter of resignation, in which he wrote to President Carter, "While I would have welcomed the opportunity to discuss with you some innovations needed to continue the forward thrust in motivation and creativity at the VOA, I certainly understand the present constraints of other priorities on your agenda."

Straus said yesterday there is a growing sense of drift in the Carter administration as it concentrates more on the president's problems, although he indicated his discontent is more deeply rooted.

"One of the major problems with this administration is that there is no reward for a job well done, and perhaps more important, no penalty for messing something up," Straus said. "The result is that a lot of people aren't doing their jobs."

The White House had no comment on Straus' statements.

Since Straus came to VOA, the official U.S. broadcasting arm, 2½ years ago, he has pressed for a more independent news operation and for expanded facilities. The radio station broadcasts in 36 languages to a worldwide audience believed to number more than 80 million.

Straus, a restless and quick-talking

man, was active in New York politics and served as President Johnson's foreign aid director for Africa.

He will remain in the Washington area and will teach a course on public diplomacy at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies.

Straus said yesterday that the White House has failed to recognize the contributions of large numbers of "extraordinarily dedicated civil servants, such as those at VOA."

"I and a lot of others have pleaded with the White House to recognize the contributions of others and they haven't done it," Straus said.

Straus refused to be specific in his criticism of personalities at the White House, but he said that he has had no problems in dealing with the foreign policy staff under national security affairs adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski.

Straus said he had called on Kennedy and other senators who follow the activities of VOA to inform them of his decision to resign. He said Kennedy had taken the occasion to note Straus' past contacts with the Kennedy family. In 1968 Straus worked in the presidential campaign of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.


Straus stressed, however, that there had been no discussion of the current political scene, in which Kennedy appears to be moving closer to a challenge to Carter for the 1980 nomination.

"It's way too early to say what I will be doing politically," Straus said, "but I want to be free to do it in four or five months from now."

To the Vietnamese Service
Voice of America

Recently, you have devoted quite a lot of time to talking about Vietnam, a country torn by war for so many generations, and about the plight of the Vietnamese refugees, who now have nothing left. They are like a flock of birds whose nests have been blown away by a hurricane. That is why we, the refugees, and those who are left behind in Vietnam, are very thankful to you.

Your voice is being heard daily by millions of unfortunate Vietnamese, including tens of thousands who are now in refugee camps, who weep every night in despair at being separated from their loved ones. Have you ever seen the distressed eyes of weary birds lost from their flock?

My motive in writing this letter to you is to ask you to convey to President Carter our appreciation and our gratitude to him. Although I know that this task may be beyond my capability to express properly my feelings, I still do so because of my admiration and respect for him. Moreover, I believe that in America freedom and equality and human rights really exist.

Dear President Jimmy Carter:

Last week, in a Vietnamese broadcast, the VOA reported what you said to a group of Americans of Italian origin. In your address, you quoted the inscription beneath the Statue of Liberty, that says:

"Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free
The wretched refuse of yon teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me
I lift my lamp beside the golden door."

This poem sounds like a prophecy that can be applied to the Vietnamese refugees of today.

It strains our belief that you, the leader of a superpower, possess such generosity, compassion and humanitarian consideration for us, Vietnamese refugees, who are completely unknown to you. Your words and your kindness lead us to believe that you are not only the leader of a superpower, but also an angel from heaven who comes to this human race full of grief and sin.

We don't know how to convey to you our deep and sincere appreciation, because to us you are in such a lofty position of power and prestige.

Mr. President, although we are now expatriates seeking refuge in foreign lands, we pray every night for a change to happen in our country, so that we could go back to our homeland without being imprisoned; so that we could see again our 70 year-old mother, and especially our little daughter who has just been able to call her parents' names. When we left Vietnam, we had to crawl silently to the beach, beneath the guns of communist guards, so we had no choice but to leave our little daughter behind. What hurt us the most is the thought that our daughter, who has just become aware of the world around her, awakened one morning and found that her parents had gone forever. In this painful situation, Mr. President, your words and generosity are like soothing rain that washes away part of our sorrow. You have practiced what the Bible taught:

"Love thy neighbor as thyself."

Mr. President, your kind words are in contrast to those of our ex-leaders, our ex-generals, the big bosses of our Republic of Vietnam, who, 4 years ago, comfortably left Vietnam with all their wives and children, plus money and valuables. What have they done, and what are they doing to help the poor, destitute refugees materially and morally? They are the ones who called us "dear compatriots" in their speeches; whereas you, a man of different race, different ancestors, living in distant country, you show compassion and concern for us.

Mr. President, 4 months ago, when our boat (merely 8 meters long) was about to sink near Malaysia in a stormy night, we were rescued by an American of Vietnamese origin. His name is Jimmy Ha, an adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Newman. They were on board the S.S. AKUNA, a ship chartered by a charitable organization called "Food For The Hungry." They rescued us, although they knew that we would be a problem for them, because hardly any country would permit them to land with "boat people" on board. It was on that ship that Jimmy Ha told us about you. He said: "President Carter is a man of great virtue. Every Sunday, no matter how busy he is, he still devotes some time to preach the Gospel, bringing the light of God to other people."

I know that I have taken more of your time than I should, Mr. President, but it was because of my admiration for, and gratitude to you. I even feel that I am being impolite by using this kind of low-grade paper to write a letter to you. But because we don't have money, we can't afford anything better. The stamp we bought was from the allowance given to us by a priest (whose address is on the envelope). We are given 500 rupia a week (about 80 cents) to buy additional food to supplement our diet.

We pray that God give you, Mrs. Carter, and your whole family (we don't know how many children you have) peace and good-health in this temporary life on earth. We hope that you will never be in such a sorrowful situation as we are, a situation described by an American female vocalist (whose name I forget) when she organized an outdoor concert for the benefit of the refugees, prior to the Geneva conference of July 20, 1979.



The Senate Foreign Relations Committee today voted down both the Category 3 Glenn Backfire understanding and the Category 3 Percy Anti-Satellite understanding. The Glenn vote was 8-7, with Glenn, Stone and Zorinsky against us. The Percy vote was 9-6, with Glenn and Zorinsky on our side and Stone voting with Percy.

In each case a Category 2 substitute drafted by us was adopted by the Committee.

These were to be the last two killer amendments. However, Senator Helms has now tabled a new one limiting each side to 200 ICBMs more than its number of launchers. This will be voted on tomorrow and we should be able to defeat it.

We will then face a motion by Senator Hayakawa to take a new vote on four earlier understandings defeated in Category 3 form and approved in Category 1 or 2.

I. PURPOSE

One-on-One Meeting.

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II. BACKGROUND

Rep. Dingell is very pleased with the outcome of the EMB legislation in the House, is a key actor on energy legislation generally and has been helpful to you politically in Michigan. The purpose of this meeting is to encourage Dingell's further cooperation and particularly to urge him to be flexible on the question of substantive overrides in the EMB Conference. Note: we expect that some form of limited substantive override will be in the final bill, but believe we should build a solid record of doing our best to eliminate it.

On the Energy Security Corporation, Jim Wright and the House Majority leadership enthusiastically supported the synthetic fuels program sponsored by Bill Moorhead of the House Banking Committee. John Dingell was not pleased with the leadership in supporting Moorhead but was unable to prevent or delay House passage of the synthetic fuels program as an amendment to the Defense Production Act. Dingell subsequently introduced a synthetic fuels bill of his own which included a corporation. That bill (H.R. 5045) has not been reported from the House Commerce Committee, and Jim Wright intends to go to a conference with the Moorhead bill. We want to enlist Dingell's cooperation -- but do not want to appear to be undercutting Wright. We suggest you let Dingell bring up the ESC. Talking points are provided below.

III. TALKING POINTS

- o I personally appreciate the time and effort you have put into the whole range of energy issues, from rationing to the EMB to synthetic fuels and conservation.
- o I appreciate the close working relationship you have developed with my staff and DOE and want to make sure this continues.
- o The Administration supported the Dingell-Santini bill in the House because we could not accept the delay inherent in the additional court review provisions of Udall-Wirth. But I want to make clear our opposition to substantive waivers -- we don't think they are necessary and they will provide more controversy and bitterness on the House and Senate floors if the existing House language is reported from Conference.
- o I know you disagree, but I hope you will work with us to eliminate or modify the substantive override in Conference Committee.
- o It is now likely that the major elements of the Administration program -- ESC, EMB, stand-by rationing, home weatherization, low-income aid -- will emerge from this Congress. Dingell has been a crucial leader, and we appreciate it.

On the Energy Security Corporation

- o We understand that the House intends to go to conference with the House Banking bill as its principal element.
- o We appreciate that he (Dingell) may not be pleased with the jurisdictional outcome on synthetic fuels in the House, but we do not wish to do anything which would delay or complicate enactment of a synthetic fuels program.
- o Many of the provisions of the bill which he (Dingell) has introduced are similar to the positions that we have taken in the bill reported by the Senate Energy Committee.
- o The Senate is acting on the synthetic fuels legislation this week and we hope to go to conference quickly thereafter.
- o We hope that he will work with us to get a strong corporation enacted as quickly as possible.

SUBJECT: Speech Planning Schedule

After a month of breaking in our new system, it is beginning to fall into shape although there is still enormous resistance to the kind of discipline necessary to provide thoughtful materials early with wide staff participation. With your continued support and insistence, we should soon establish this program as a standard routine which will no longer be questioned and much less frequently circumvented.

For your information, attached is a copy of our internal planning schedule for the beginning of our second month. It lays out the items we already know for the coming six weeks and carries specific assignments and deadlines for all of your known appearances this month.

You may want to note the following:

- (1) The final draft to the President is scheduled in each case at least 48 hours ahead of delivery and frequently longer (e.g., AFL-CIO Convention);
- (2) The schedule provides for a clearance process of at least a day or two after the speechwriters complete their drafts before the date on which the revised final is due to the President;
- (3) There is a provision for a communications/speech strategy for all major addresses. These are intended to get an early series of suggestions on messages, themes, tone and other indications from Senior Staff members directly concerned. These are then passed to you for further suggestions before the writers begin drafting. The due dates for these speech strategies are shown in the third from last column.

Susan Clough and Phil Wise will be on the regular distribution list for the Speech Planning Schedule so they can anticipate your personal time requirements and the flow of speech materials. As the system takes hold, our focus is now shifting toward improving the quality of the drafts coming to you. We welcome any further suggestions to serve you better.

TALKING POINTS FOR SENATE ENERGY COMMITTEE BILL

The reasons for a corporation have been misrepresented. This can't be another "business as usual" DOE program with the traditional political pressures. The program needs a single, business focus with talented (and well paid) people running it whom industry will trust and can relate to. The corporation needs to be free from the red tape and administrative complexities that hamstringing current agency practice. The corporation will be small -- a maximum annual administrative budget of \$35 million -- and will provide financial assistance to industry, not get Government into the business.

The Federal, State, and local environmental laws will apply to the projects which receive financial assistance just as they would to projects which do not receive financial assistance from the corporation. Water rights are not affected and eminent domain does not extend to acquiring water rights.

Although the initial \$88 billion synthetic fuels proposal was characterized as a "crash" program, the Energy Committee bill clearly is not. This is a phased effort with \$20 billion authorized in the first 3-year phase. Additional authorizations require Congressional approval. The \$20 billion is the authorized program level, outlays will be quite low and spread over several years. The outlays will stay low if the real world price of oil increases. \$20 billion is the total financial exposure of the corporation even if it never makes an outlay.

The Banking bill "rolls" the \$3 billion authorized (like a revolving fund) and leverages loan guarantees up to \$9 billion. Under the Banking bill, the Congress never approves the program level -- only the dollars available for "rolling." The \$20 billion level of program activity is an investment in an industry that promises to be crucial to meeting our liquid energy supply requirements. It is a relatively small figure in terms of the overall budget and will remain a relatively small portion.

The Energy Committee bill is a package designed to deal with our short and long-term energy problems. It has a title on gasohol which promises to quickly augment our liquid fuel supplies. There is a title to augment our current efforts on conservation and establish new programs of almost \$5 billion over the next 5 years.

They could do it anytime in November. Saturday, November 10, or Saturday, November 17, or on a weekday, if you prefer. It would be from the White House and would be 2 hours.
