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Dear President Carter:

I have just spent ten days in Paris centered around chairing an international conference on "The Return of Women to Work" sponsored by the German Marshall Fund. While there I ran into the following which may be of interest to you:

- Giscard has told his senior staff (even before the Iran crisis) that he expects you to be reelected.
- Barre, with whom I talked, was very impressed with the U.S. job creation record of the last years. This was true for everybody with whom I talked. I think the Administration should publicize this accomplishment. I will follow up with Stu.
- The U.S. is hurting itself unnecessarily by insisting that its productivity has seriously declined. I don't believe this to be a fact. It reflects errors in calculating service output which is now about 60% of our GNP. I gave a long interview to L'Expansion to help set the record right. I will follow up with Charlie Schultze and Stu.
- Our conference on women showed that the U.S. is far ahead on most fronts although we have a way to go. I'll touch base with Ray and Sarah Weddington about the forthcoming OECD Conference on women.
- In talking with Ambassador Hartman I confirmed some hunches about the runaround that we get in certain trade relations. I really do believe that we must get tougher. I don't expect U.S. employers and labor to remain quiescent on this front. I'll pursue with Stu.
- The public and the French press believe that you are handling the Iran problem very well. I hope you manage to keep everybody in our corner. If you do, things should eventually come out alright.



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Dear Mr. President:

It has been a most rewarding experience for me to serve as Associate Director of ACTION and to play a role in your Administration for these past two and one-half years. I feel an urgent need to return to the South, where I am seriously considering playing an active role in the politics of Atlanta and Georgia. Therefore, I am respectfully submitting my resignation, effective December 31, 1979.

I want to thank you for providing me with the challenge and the opportunity to direct programs to enhance the quality of life for those Americans most in need. It has been most gratifying and educational for me to help direct government resources to benefit the poor, the disadvantaged, the disabled, and the minority groups -- those who are still disproportionately left out and left behind in the American society.

I have travelled the length and breadth of this country and have been uplifted by an impressive reservoir of committed and dedicated individuals who are ready and willing to take advantage of the opportunity to help fellow human beings.

The most moving moments of my experience as a Federal official were those opportunities I had to visit in the homes and communities of the poorest of the poor. In those brief, but haunting moments, I felt and shared the hopes, fears, desires, and dreams of proud and humble people who live in conditions which are obscene and unthinkable in a country with so many resources. In our urban ghettos, in the heart of Appalachia, on Indian reservations, and on the farms and plantations of the Deep South, my faith in humanity was often renewed as I met a rare breed of Americans who are the greatest assets of our nation -- those who refuse to surrender their dreams, who refuse to give up in the face of adversity, who refuse to be content with less than their full share of opportunity.

Thank you again for this unique opportunity to be of service. It has been a special privilege and pleasure for me to work closely with Sam Brown and the dedicated members of the ACTION family who are truly fulfilling a mission of caring and sharing.

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Dear Mr. President:

I have just been re-reading Hanson Baldwin's book, "The Crucial Years", which deals with the period of 1939 until 1941.

The one analogy which permeates the 1939 situation-- in this book and in every one of the many books I have studied about the period prior to World War II--is, that when Adolph Hitler moved into the Rhineland, the lack of action on the part of the free world encouraged his invasion, and, when there was a response, the response was not united. Consequently, this miscalculation started World War II.


There are two significant similarities. First, none of our allies wanted war. Second, no country was willing to risk war to stop the incursion.

Mr. President, I would submit that we are at a similar point in history; the oil supply from the Middle East is essential to the free world and the United States must be willing to go to war over this issue.

I would suggest that a trial of the hostages should trigger a full mobilization of the Reserve and the National Guard to make it clear to the world, and, in particular the Soviet Union, that the United States considers that part of the world absolutely essential to free world survival.

It may not be necessary to use force, but timely mobilization would signal the world and possibly avert the miscalculations of 1939.

III. BACKGROUND

A. SALT Concerns: Throughout the Senate Foreign Relations Committee markup of the SALT Treaty, Senator Stone was not helpful either in terms of his remarks or his votes. With the exception of Glenn's understanding requiring advance notification of all planned ICBM launches, Stone supported all other so-called "killer" understandings and in the end voted against reporting

the treaty favorably, stating that he found it unacceptable in its present form. Stone also introduced one of his own "killer" amendments which would have required that the Soviet Golf class submarines be counted in the aggregate. His primary interest in counting submarines was the fact they had visited Cuba. This belief ties in with Stone's concern that the Soviets are using Cuba, particularly Cienfuegos, as a base of operations in violation of the 1962 and 1970 agreements. Stone's overriding concern, however, is that the agreements on Cuba are just two of many agreements that the Soviets have violated and if they violate SALT II, the U.S. will not have the "willpower" to enforce compliance.

Political Concerns: Stone's strongest primary opponent, Buddy McKay, said that he would announce his position on SALT prior to the SFRC vote. He did not do so, but rather issued a statement after the vote saying it was a terrible treaty, with lots of flaws, but he probably would have voted for it anyway. He was criticized by both liberal and conservative press for such an equivocating statement. If McKay eventually opposes SALT, it will make it more difficult for Stone to reverse his Committee vote.

Stone may be able to handle his conservative constituency by supporting several "killer" amendments on the Floor and then voting for final passage, but this is unlikely. Stone has gotten himself way out on the limb on SALT, and it would take a major change in his political thinking to get him off. He will do what is in the best interest of his reelection, and, for the moment he believes opposing SALT is in his best interest.

C. Additional Issues and Personal Information:

Senator Stone is remaining undecided in the Presidential primaries. His own reelection may not be as difficult as he believes. McKay is not running a good race; Stone is well financed and organized, he has strong support in the Jewish and Cuban communities.

Stone has nurtured his Cuban support by being consistently anti Soviet. He has nurtured his Jewish support by his unfailing support of Israel, and the impression that he is an expert on the Mideast. In this regard Stone has suggested repeatedly that we establish a permanent American base in the Mideast. He will raise this again. In addition he is carrying our water on our Moroccan arms sales proposal and increased arms to Sudan.

Our one hope of getting Stone on SALT is to appeal to his sense of himself as an internationalist. Stone takes great pride in giving advice to the President, and if he believes you are listening carefully he will soften up. You should expect as much a global discussion as a discussion on SALT.

SUBJECT: International Trade Commission - Designation  
of Chair

On December 16, the term of Chairman Joseph O. Parker will expire. He will be succeeded by Michael J. Calhoun, an Independent, whose nomination is pending in the Senate.

The statutory two-year term of a Republican Chairman expires in June 1980. Another Republican member must be designated for the coming six months. We recommend Catherine Bedell.

Mrs. Bedell, of Washington State, was appointed to the ITC in 1971. From 1971 to 1975 she served as Chair, the first woman to hold the position. Mrs. Bedell represents the ITC on the Interagency Committee on Women's Business Enterprise and the Interdepartmental Task Force on Women. She is a member of the Advisory Board of the Republican Women's Federal Forum and the Advisory Council of the National Federation of Republican Women. She served in the Congress from 1958 - 1970.

Paula Stern and Bill Alberger, whom you have appointed to the ITC, join in our recommendation.

Stu, Reubin Askew, Henry Owen and Frank Moore concur in the following recommendation.

BACKGROUND: Senator Sparkman has retired to his native Huntsville, Alabama. He is still very respected and has quite a following in the TVA area of northern Alabama. Senator Sparkman has endorsed your re-election in a letter several weeks ago. As you know, you are scheduled to be in Huntsville the afternoon of December 7. We feel you should call the Senator, thank him for his endorsement, discuss SALT, and request that he be with you on December 7. The day before that, on December 6, his hometown of Hartselle, 30 miles from Huntsville, is having a John Sparkman Day and Senator Kennedy is the keynote speaker. The Senator's endorsement probably needs to be reinforced through your phone call.

TALKING POINTS:

- o Inquire how the Senator is doing, and how things are in Alabama.
- o Ask for his continued support and advice on SALT.
- o Tell him you hope John Sparkman Day goes well, and ask him to join you on December 7 at your rally, possibly to introduce you.

SUBJECT: NRC Chairman

Following your instructions, we explored the possibility with Commissioner John Ahearn that he would be designated Chairman when you make your statement on nuclear energy policy next Friday. Ahearn would accept if it be made public that this is an interim appointment, pending a national search for an outside Chairman when the next vacancy occurs.

Chairman Hendrie was told by Jack Watson of your decision to designate Ahearn. He took the news graciously. He expected this action and he feels that Ahearn is the Commissioner most qualified for the Chairmanship. He indicated that he probably will not resign in order to preserve the "thin pro-nuclear consensus." The next vacancy will occur in June when Commissioner Kennedy's term expires.

Ahearn agrees with the policy that you will be announcing. He intends to exercise strong leadership pending implementation of your reorganization proposal to Congress to strengthen the role of the Chairman.

This memo has been read to Dr. Ahearn and he agrees with it.

SUBJECT: Head of the Voice of America

Zbig has discussed with me his note to you on Senator Inouye's concerns about a conflict of interest between myself and my wife should she be selected as the next head of the Voice of America.

I have not approached you on my wife's candidacy because she and I have pursued our careers on the principle that they should remain entirely separate. But since the issue has been brought to your attention and does involve me, I felt it appropriate to make two points.

First, my wife presently is the Senior Vice President for Programming of the Public Broadcasting System. In that capacity, she has complete control over what is distributed over PBS. The potential for a conflict of interest between her present position and my role as a White House staff member is far greater and much more sensitive than with the Voice of America position. Indeed, this question was raised several years ago, but her entirely professional conduct put the issue to rest with her board, with the Congress and with the broadcast industry generally. Therefore, I believe there is no foundation whatsoever to the argument that there would be a conflict of interest. Indeed, my wife has proven that fact in a position which, in this respect, is at least as delicate as the one for which she is being considered.

Nonetheless, if this issue is considered to be central in determining whether or not she should be appointed to this position, I would appreciate the opportunity to discuss it with you. I do not believe that my career or position should stand in the way of hers -- particularly since I believe you will find that she is outstandingly qualified for the position and has broad support throughout the industry and in the Congress.

Finally, I recognize that the real issue may not be the so-called conflict of interest which has no foundation, but rather the strength of Senator Inouye's feelings on the matter. It is my understanding that the Congressional Liaison people (Bob Beckel) are trying to get a direct and authoritative reading on this question.

In this connection, I want you to know that I recognize the possible political dimensions of this choice and would not urge you to take any step contrary to your political interests.

A Washington Post article on Sunday stated that a number of major banks were dilatory in reimbursing for payments they made and charged to the Treasury on forged checks. This has been a problem for many years because some banks are reluctant to admit that they have paid out on forged checks, at least until they have received reimbursement from the payee or endorser of the check. The problem got worse during the last year because of an overload of transactions in our check claims division. We are catching up with the situation now but as of this writing \$14 million is outstanding, perhaps twice what it should be. We have a program to correct the situation, but because of the large number of small items involved, this will take some time.


You and I know how long things can take in politics, so here is some news of which we can both be proud: I am pleased to tell you that the Federal government is going to help the people of New York pay for the cost of protecting foreign visitors.

This year's United Nations General Assembly placed an extraordinary burden on the New York City Police Department, involving as it did the visits of many important foreign visitors, including Pope John Paul II and Fidel Castro. Throughout this period, your police officers performed in an extraordinarily effective manner and earned our respect and admiration. This is a credit to your own leadership, as well as that of Police Commissioner McGuire.

As you have discussed with me, these protective tasks do place strains on your police and fiscal resources. I am, therefore, especially pleased that through the efforts of my Administration, working closely with the City and its Congressional delegation, in particular with Joe Addabbo, it will now be possible to provide more adequate reimbursement for these expenses. Statutory language included in the 1980 Treasury Appropriations bill will allow for protection for visitors at the United Nations, while in motorcades and at other places they visit. Revised regulations will allow more complete reimbursement for security at missions and for the administrative expenses involved in this effort.

Again, my personal thanks for the difficult job your police officers performed so well -- I'm pleased to be able to help.

**MEMORANDUM: PROGRESS IN THE FURTHER RACIAL INTEGRATION IN THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA**

The North Carolina General Assembly in 1971 enacted legislation making all 16 public senior institutions of higher education constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina. The effective date of the legislation was July 1, 1972, at which time the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina assumed responsibility for the governance of all 16 institutions and for the planning and development of a coordinated system of higher education. The Board has made a sustained effort since 1972 to expand higher educational opportunities for all citizens of North Carolina, to improve the quality of higher education, and to encourage and promote the further racial integration of all 16 institutions. This memorandum summarizes the principal achievements of this effort to attain greater racial integration, and the related commitment to strengthen the five historically black constituent institutions.

1. Black enrollment in the eleven historically white institutions has increased 189.7 per cent, from 2,349 in 1972 to 6,804 in 1979. Thirty-two per cent of all black students enrolled in institutions of The University of North Carolina are now enrolled in the historically white institutions, as compared with 16 per cent in 1972.

2. White enrollment in the five historically black institutions has increased 134.7 per cent, from 636 in 1972 to 1,493 in 1979.

3. Total black enrollment in The University of North Carolina increased 47 per cent, from 14,440 in 1972 to 21,250 in 1979, while total University enrollment increased 28 per cent.

4. Black enrollment in graduate and first professional programs increased from 1,288 in 1972 to 2,328 in 1979, an increase of 80.7 per cent. Particularly noteworthy are black enrollments in the two University medical schools: in 1979 black enrollment in the UNC-Chapel Hill School of Medicine is 12.9 per cent and in the East Carolina University School of Medicine it is 12.4 per cent. These compare with a national average of about 7 per cent.

5. The Board has worked consistently to strengthen the five historically black constituent institutions. This effort has included the following:

- a. Appropriations for current operations for the five historically black institutions increased 207 per cent by 1979 over 1972, as compared with an increase of 156 per cent for the eleven historically white institutions.
- b. Twenty-four new baccalaureate degree programs and four new master's degree programs have been established in the five historically black institutions.

- c. Beginning in 1980, under current plans, Fayetteville State University -- a historically black constituent institution -- for the first time will offer master's degrees, as a first major step in its transition from a general baccalaureate to a comprehensive university. Studies are currently being made of the need to establish Graduate Centers at the two other historically black general baccalaureate universities -- Elizabeth City State University and Winston-Salem State University.
- d. Remedial education programs at the five historically black institutions have been strengthened by providing an annual level of \$900,000 in state-appropriated funds for their support.
- e. All University libraries have been brought to a minimum standard both in their financial support and their basic collections, through a program of increased library appropriations that was funded during the years 1974 - 1978.
- f. Special funds have been provided, over and above salary increase appropriations, to increase and equalize the amount of State appropriations for each budgeted teaching position among the general baccalaureate and among the comprehensive University institutions.
- g. A program to enable faculty members to spend one year of study for the doctor's degree at full pay is now funded at an annual rate of \$400,000, with priority given to faculty in the historically black institutions. Of 27 faculty members currently on doctoral study assignments, 22 are black and 2 are Indians.
- h. For needed renovations and repairs of campus facilities at the five historically black institutions, as identified by competent architects and engineers, the 1979 General Assembly appropriated \$20,000,000. An additional \$20,000,000 was also appropriated in 1979 for new capital construction on these campuses.

The 1979 capital appropriations of \$40,000,000 is in addition to another \$40,000,000 appropriated by the General Assembly of North Carolina during 1973-1978 for capital improvements at the five historically black institutions.

Therefore, over \$80,000,000 in state funds has been provided for repairs, renovations and new construction at the five historically black institutions since 1972.

A 43-year-old mother with two teen-age sons, Ms. Stewart is one of a dozen private lawyers in Washington regarded as specialists in employee discrimination suits.

She was one of the lawyers involved in the successful suit in 1976 by black railroad porters to become full-fledged train conductors instead of "pullmen-in-charge" when they perform a conductor's duties.

Two years ago, she set legal precedent when a federal court agreed with her that the government should pay the legal fees for federal employees who prevail in ad-

ministrative hearings on discrimination complaints. This eased the way for federal employees who feel discriminated against to hire legal help.

She has been to North Carolina only once; that was in the 1950s when she passed through the state. She has never met the UNC officials involved in the dispute.

Tatel, her predecessor, toured UNC campuses last summer. Ms. Stewart said she might be interested in a visit, but not if it would be "an empty gesture."

"Any delay in obeying the (civil rights) law harms generations of students," she

said. "It does irreparable harm. You can't take a college student who has been inadequately prepared for life and send him back to college for four years."

Ms. Stewart was raised in Chicago and attended law school briefly in the late 1950s before dropping out to become a participant in the Civil Rights movement. She was a staff worker for groups trying to integrate Chicago housing and the doctors' staffs at Chicago hospitals.

She returned to law school in 1969 when her husband, from whom she is now divorced, was transferred to Washington with the U.S. foreign service.

Although she is active in Washington's civil rights affairs, she said she had never met Patricia Harris before being asked to interview for the director's job.

Having opened her own practice four years ago, she said she is reluctant to quit.

"Now is the time when all my chickens are coming home to roost; it's the best time for me to stay," she said.

A year ago she won a major case in which the federal courts ordered the Navy not to sit on discrimination complaints after her client, a black computer technician, complained that the Navy was ignoring his accusation that he had been unfairly passed over for promotion.

Legal action involving a university will not be new to Ms. Stewart.

She at one time represented a university that was accused of discrimination, but she would not name the school since the matter was settled out of court. It was one of several cases in which she has been on the other side, defending the accused.

"All cases don't have merit," she said.

She will take a case, she said, from a company that has been accused of discrimination and wants to do the right thing but "doesn't know what the right way is, isn't sure about how best to go about it, isn't sure what its responsibility is."

"If they are wrong, they need to be told they're wrong and make an attempt to ratify it," she said.

Several of her corporate clients have wound up doing that in the past, she said.

Recently, you accepted the resignation of Anita Miller as a member of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board. You appointed her in 1977. She was the first affirmative action appointment ever made to the Board. Her work has been primarily to spearhead the Administration's neighborhood reinvestment initiatives, which were very well received by civil rights groups, consumer and neighborhood groups.

Those groups strongly supported Anita Miller for Chair and were disappointed when you nominated Jay Janis. They expect you to replace her with another woman or a minority. We have identified two candidates to replace her.

John Dalton (resume attached) has served you well in a variety of capacities. His experience as President of the Government National Mortgage Association has given him a unique and valuable insight into capital markets and the availability of funds for home mortgages. His strong financial background would provide a range of much-needed skills to the Bank Board.

Charles M. Hill (resume attached) is currently the Vice President and Community Investment Officer at the Federal Home Loan Bank in Chicago. Before accepting that position, Hill served as a member of the Chicago bank's board. He is very familiar with the Administration's neighborhood reinvestment initiatives, and would be able to continue that work on the Board.

Chairman Jay Janis, whom you appointed, feels that both are well qualified for appointment and either would be acceptable to him.
