Talking Points

Reception for Governors

1. THIS IS THE FOURTH YEAR NOW THAT ROSALYNN AND I HAVE RECEIVED YOU HERE AT THE WHITE HOUSE. AS A PROUD ALUMNUS OF YOUR GROUP, THIS IS ALWAYS A SPECIAL TIME FOR ME. I KNOW IT IS THE SAME FOR ROSALYNN, WHO OFTEN ACCOMPANIED ME TO MEETINGS WITH MY FELLOW GOVERNORS IN THE PAST.

2. I AM THE FIRST GOVERNOR TO SIT IN THE OVAL OFFICE SINCE FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT. PERHAPS IT IS MY FEELING OF KINSHIP WITH THIS GROUP THAT MAKES THIS ANNUAL RECEPTION SO SPECIAL. IT GIVES ME A CHANCE TO STEP BACK AND LOOK AT TODAY'S CHALLENGES FROM A VERY PERSONAL PERSPECTIVE.

3. I WOULD LIKE TO SHARE THAT PERSPECTIVE WITH YOU. FOUR YEARS AGO, AS I CAMPAIGNED ACROSS THIS GREAT COUNTRY, I HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO SEE THE AMERICAN PEOPLE, IN ALL THEIR DIVERSITY, AT VERY CLOSE RANGE. I DEVELOPED A VERY DEEP FEELING ABOUT THE AMERICAN PEOPLE AND THEIR STRENGTH. THAT FEELING WAS THIS:

¶ THAT NOTWITHSTANDING THE BITTERNESS AND DEEP DIVISIONS OF VIETNAM, THE AMERICAN PEOPLE BELIEVED STRONGLY IN THEIR COUNTRY AND IN ITS PRINCIPLES; IF ASKED, THEY WOULD RALLY TO PROTECT OUR NATION'S TRUE INTERESTS AND TRUE VALUES.

¶ THAT NOTWITHSTANDING WATERGATE, THE AMERICAN PEOPLE HAD NOT LOST THEIR FAITH IN OUR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS AND OUR DEMOCRATIC PROCESSES;

¶ MOST IMPORTANT OF ALL, I HAD THE STRONG FEELING THAT THE AMERICAN PEOPLE ARE AN HONEST PEOPLE. THEY KNOW THAT GOVERNMENT WILL NEVER BE PERFECT, BUT THEY WERE AND ARE DETERMINED THAT IT BE HONEST. THEY KNOW THAT GOVERNMENT CANNOT DELIVER EVERYTHING THAT EVERYBODY WANTS, BUT THERE IS ONE THING THEY DEMANDED AND STILL DEMAND FROM GOVERNMENT -- THE TRUTH.

4. IT HAS BEEN FOUR YEARS SINCE I CAMPAIGNED FOR THIS OFFICE. THOSE FOUR YEARS HAVE SEEN MANY DEVELOPMENTS, NOT ALL OF THEM PREDICTABLE IN 1976. BUT I AM HAPPY TO SAY THIS EVENING THAT THE BASIC FEELINGS I HAD THEN ABOUT THE AMERICAN PEOPLE, AND THEIR INNATE STRENGTH, HAVE BEEN FULLY BORNE OUT.

¶ THE AMERICAN PEOPLE ARE AS PATRIOTIC TODAY AS ANY TIME IN OUR HISTORY. FACED WITH A CLEAR THREAT TO OUR INTERESTS, TO OUR PRINCIPLES, THEY WILL DO WHAT IS NECESSARY. THEIR FEELINGS OF PATRIOTISM, AND WILLINGNESS TO SACRIFICE, HAVE BEEN AN INSPIRATION THESE PAST WEEKS.

¶ THE AMERICAN PEOPLE STILL BELIEVE STRONGLY IN THEIR GOVERNMENT -- NOT THE KIND OF GOVERNMENT THAT SENDS OUT DIRECTIVES FROM WASHINGTON, BUT THE KIND THAT WORKS IN GENUINE PARTNERSHIP WITH THEM, THAT RECOGNIZES THAT THE STATES, THE PRIVATE SECTOR AND THE PEOPLE THEMSELVES HAVE AN IMPORTANT

ROLE TO PLAY IN MEETING OUR NATION'S EMERGING CHALLENGES.

¶ MOST IMPORTANT, THE AMERICAN PEOPLE HAVE SHOWN THAT THEY WILL SUPPORT GOVERNMENT, NO MATTER HOW IMPERFECT, THAT TELLS THEM THE TRUTH. SUBJECT: IDCA Policy Statement

Tom Ehrlich has sent you the International Development Cooperation Agency's policy statement for 1980 (Tab B), as required by the foreign aid reorganization plan that you approved. It spells out the approach that Tom discussed with you last month, concentrating on energy development, food, population, and health. There is a good 2½-page summary of the paper at its start.

The IDCA is, inevitably, having some start-up bureaucratic problems dealing with the separate fiefdoms that you mentioned in your meeting with Tom. He will have to overcome these problems if he is to be effective in his major missions, notably devising reforms that will improve the effectiveness of aid, and recommending Administration positions on the Brandt Commission proposals, as you asked him to do. Tom's ability to overcome these problems and carry out these tasks would be facilitated by receipt of the attached memo.

RECOMMENDATION

That you sign the memorandum at Tab A, which has been cleared by OMB.

SUBJECT: IDCA Policy Statement

The IDCA Policy Statement that you sent me is a sound agenda for United States efforts in international development over the coming year. I hope that you will move vigorously to fulfill this agenda, and to carry out the development policy coordination that is required. I also look to you to take the lead in two particular tasks:

(1) developing coordinated Executive Branch positions on the Brandt Commission's proposals, in time for use in preparations for the Venice Economic Summit, submitting disagreements to me for resolution;

(2) preparing, prior to our fall budget decisions, plans for improving the effectiveness of major development assistance programs, both bilateral and multilateral, giving priority to programs that will raise significant budgeting or legislative issues in FY 1982.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: James T. McIntyre, Jr. *Jim*

SUBJECT: Executive Order on Federal Employee Occupational Safety and Health

Attached for your signature is an order to replace Executive Order 11807, signed by President Ford.

The purpose of the order is to correct weaknesses in government programs to protect its own employees from hazards on the job. The weaknesses have been reported by the press, the GAO, and by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in the Labor Department in its evaluations of other agencies' programs. It also results from your charge to the Interagency Task Force on Workplace Safety and Health, jointly chaired by the Secretary of Labor and me, to review occupational safety and health programs that affect federal employees.

The order was suggested by the Department of Labor in March 1979. It was revised several times after objections and suggestions were received from interested agencies and after extensive consultation with the Department of Labor, the Department of Defense, and the American Federation of Government Employees. I believe that it represents a consensus that the government should do more to protect its workers on the job. However, there is no consensus on all the individual provisions. I doubt it is possible for us to bring interested agencies to consensus on all the provisions of an order, such as this, which establishes regulatory authority in one agency over all the others and directly affects their day to day management.

Major new provisions:

1. Agencies will be allowed to establish labor-management safety and health committees to assist their internal programs. If they choose not to establish the committees, the agencies may be inspected by OSHA, either on its own initiative or in response to a worker request. Also, one half the members of a committee will be able to ask OSHA to inspect its agency. The one half rule was established so that management could not bottle up complaints in the committees.

2. Agencies will be required to follow DOL rules for their internal safety and health programs or justify alternative approaches.
3. Agencies will be required to conduct unannounced inspections accompanied by worker representatives, respond to worker reports of hazards, and promptly abate hazards.
4. Agencies will be prevented from discriminating against workers who report hazards or participate in safety and health programs.
5. The General Services Administration will be required to resolve conflicts between its safety and health standards and OSHA standards, accompany OSHA inspectors in agencies, and abate hazards in facilities subject to GSA authority.
6. The order will apply to all executive branch agencies, but not to military personnel and uniquely military equipment, systems, and operations.

I recommend you sign the order.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

-----

OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH PROGRAMS FOR FEDERAL EMPLOYEES

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and statutes of the United States of America, including Section 7902(c) of Title 5 of the United States Code and in accord with Section 19 of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, as amended (29 U.S.C. 668), it is ordered:

1-1. Scope of this Order.

1-101. This order applies to all agencies of the Executive Branch except military personnel and uniquely military equipment, systems, and operations.

1-102. For the purposes of this order, the term "agency" means an Executive department, as defined in 5 U.S.C. 101, or any employing unit or authority of the Federal government, other than those of the judicial and legislative branches. Since section 19 of the Occupational Safety and Health Act ("the Act") covers all Federal employees, however, the Secretary of Labor ("the Secretary") shall cooperate and consult with the heads of agencies in the legislative and judicial branches of the government to help them adopt safety and health programs.

1-2. Heads of Agencies.

1-201. The head of each agency shall:

(a) Furnish to employees places and conditions of employment that are free from recognized hazards that are causing or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm.

(b) Operate an occupational safety and health program in accordance with the requirements of this order and basic program elements promulgated by the Secretary.

(c) Designate an agency official with sufficient authority to represent the interest and support of the agency head to be responsible for the management and administration of the agency occupational safety and health program.

(d) Comply with all standards issued under section 6 of the Act, except where the Secretary approves compliance with alternative standards. When an agency head determines it necessary to apply a different standard, that agency head shall, after consultation with appropriate occupational safety and health committees where established, notify the Secretary and provide justification that equivalent or greater protection will be assured by the alternate standard.

(e) Assure prompt abatement of unsafe or unhealthy working conditions. Whenever an agency cannot promptly abate such conditions, it shall develop an abatement plan setting forth a timetable for abatement and a summary of interim steps to protect employees. Employees exposed to the conditions shall be informed of the provisions of the plan. When a hazard cannot be abated without assistance of the General Services Administration or other Federal lessor agency, an agency shall act with the lessor agency to secure abatement.

(f) Establish procedures to assure that no employee is subject to restraint, interference, coercion, discrimination or reprisal for filing a report of an unsafe or unhealthy working condition, or other participation in agency occupational safety and health program activities.

(g) Assure that periodic inspections of all agency workplaces are performed by personnel with equipment and competence to recognize hazards.

(h) Assure response to employee reports of hazardous conditions and require inspections within twenty-four hours for imminent dangers, three working days for potential serious conditions, and twenty working days for other conditions. Assure the right to anonymity of those making the reports.

(i) Assure that employee representatives accompany inspections of agency workplaces.

(j) Operate an occupational safety and health management information system, which shall include the maintenance of such records as the Secretary may require.

(k) Provide safety and health training for supervisory employees, employees responsible for conducting occupational safety and health inspections, all members of occupational safety and health committees where established, and other employees.

(l) Submit to the Secretary an annual report on the agency occupational safety and health program that includes information the Secretary prescribes.

1-3. Occupational Safety and Health Committees.

1-301. Agency heads may establish occupational safety and health committees. If committees are established, they shall be established at both the national level and, for agencies with field or regional offices, other appropriate levels. The committees shall be composed of representatives of management and an equal number of nonmanagement employees or their representatives. Where there are exclusive bargaining representatives for employees at the national or other level in an agency, such representatives shall select the appropriate nonmanagement members of the committee.

1-302. The committees shall, except where prohibited by law,

(a) Have access to agency information relevant to their duties, including information on the nature and hazardousness of substances in agency workplaces.

(b) Monitor performance, including agency inspections, of the agency safety and health programs at the level they are established.

(c) Consult and advise the agency on the operation of the program.

1-303. A Committee may request the Secretary of Labor to conduct an evaluation or inspection pursuant to this order if half of a Committee is not substantially satisfied with an agency's response to a report of hazardous working conditions.

1-4. Department of Labor.

1-401. The Secretary of Labor shall:

(a) Provide leadership and guidance to the heads of agencies to assist them with their occupational safety and health responsibilities.

(b) Maintain liaison with the Office of Management and Budget in matters relating to this order and coordinate the activities of the Department with those of other agencies that have responsibilities or functions related to Federal employee safety and health, including the Office of Personnel Management, the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, and the General Services Administration.

(c) Issue, subject to the approval of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and in consultation with the Federal Advisory Council on Occupational Safety and Health, a set of basic program elements. The program elements shall help agency heads establish occupational safety and health committees and operate effective occupational safety and health programs, and shall provide flexibility to each agency head to implement a program consistent with its mission, size and organization. Upon request of an agency head, and after consultation with the Federal Advisory Council on Occupational Safety and Health, the Secretary may approve alternate program elements.

(d) Prescribe recordkeeping and reporting requirements.

(e) Assist agencies by providing training materials, and by conducting training programs upon request and with reimbursement.

(f) Facilitate the exchange of ideas and information throughout the government about occupational safety and health.

(g) Provide technical services to agencies upon request, where the Secretary deems necessary, and with reimbursement. These services may include studies of accidents, causes of injury and illness, identification of unsafe and unhealthful working conditions, and means to abate hazards.

(h) Evaluate the occupational safety and health programs of agencies and promptly submit reports to the agency heads. The evaluations shall be conducted through such scheduled headquarters or field reviews, studies or inspections as the Secretary deems necessary, at least annually for the larger or more hazardous agencies or operations, and as the Secretary deems appropriate for the smaller or less hazardous agencies.

(i) Conduct unannounced inspections of agency workplaces when the Secretary determines necessary if an agency does not have occupational safety and health committees; or in response to reports of unsafe or unhealthful working conditions, upon request of occupational safety and health committees under Section 1-3; or, in the case of a report of an imminent danger, when such a committee has not responded to an employee who has alleged to it that the agency has not adequately responded to a report as required in 1-201 (h). When the Secretary or his designee performs an inspection and discovers unsafe or unhealthy conditions, a violation of any provisions of this order, or any safety or health standards adopted by an agency pursuant to this order, or any program element approved by the Secretary, he shall promptly issue a report to the head of the agency and to the appropriate occupational safety and health committee, if any. The report shall describe the nature of the findings and may make recommendations for correcting the violation.

(j) Submit to the President each year a summary report of the status of the occupational safety and health of Federal employees, and, together with agency responses, evaluations of individual agency progress and problems in correcting unsafe and unhealthful working conditions, and recommendations for improving their performance.

(k) Submit to the President unresolved disagreements between the Secretary and agency heads, with recommendations.

(l) Enter into agreements or other arrangements as necessary or appropriate with the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health and delegate to it the inspection and investigation authority provided under this section.

1-5. The Federal Advisory Council on Occupational Safety and Health.

1-501. The Federal Advisory Council on Occupational Safety and Health, established pursuant to Executive Order No. 11612, is continued. It shall advise the Secretary in carrying out responsibilities under this order. The Council shall consist of sixteen members appointed by the Secretary, of whom eight shall be representatives of Federal agencies and eight shall be representatives of labor organizations representing Federal employees. The members shall serve three-year terms with the terms of five or six members expiring each year, provided this Council is renewed every two years in accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act. The members currently serving on the Council shall be deemed to be its initial members under this order and their terms shall expire in accordance with the terms of their appointment.

1-502. The Secretary, or a designee, shall serve as the Chairman of the Council, and shall prescribe rules for the conduct of its business.

1-503. The Secretary shall make available necessary office space and furnish the Council necessary equipment, supplies, and staff services, and shall perform such functions with respect to the Council as may be required by the Federal Advisory Committee Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. App. I).

1-6. General Services Administration.

1-601. Within six months of the effective date of this order the Secretary of Labor and the Administrator of the General Services Administration shall initiate a study of conflicts that may exist in their standards and other requirements affecting Federal employee safety and health, and shall establish a procedure for resolving conflicting standards for space leased by the General Services Administration.

1-602. In order to assist the agencies in carrying out their duties under Section 19 of the Act and this order the Administrator shall:

(a) Upon request, require personnel of the General Services Administration to accompany the Secretary or an agency head on any inspection or investigation conducted pursuant to this order of a facility subject to the authority of the General Services Administration.

(b) Assure prompt attention to reports from agencies of unsafe or unhealthy conditions of facilities subject to the authority of the General Services Administration; where abatement cannot be promptly effected, submit to the agency head a timetable for action to correct the conditions; and give priority in the allocation of resources available to the Administrator for prompt abatement of the conditions.

(c) Procure and provide safe supplies, devices, and equipment, and establish and maintain a product safety program for those supplies, devices, equipment and services furnished to agencies, including the issuance of Material Safety Data Sheets when hazardous substances are furnished them.


1-7. General Provisions.

1-701. Employees shall be authorized official time to participate in the activities provided for by this order.

1-702. Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or alter the powers and duties of the Secretary or heads of other Federal agencies pursuant to Section 19 of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, Chapter 71 of Title 5 of the United States Code, Sections 7901, 7902, and 7903 of Title 5 of the United States Code, nor shall it be construed to alter any other provisions of law or Executive Order providing for collective bargaining agreements and related procedures, or affect the responsibilities of the Director of Central Intelligence to protect intelligence sources and methods (50 U.S.C. 403(d)(3)).

1-703. Executive Order No. 11807 of September 28, 1974, is revoked.

1-704. This order is effective July 1, 1980.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

I want to draw your attention to the serious foreign policy problems we face if the Congress does not pass the fiscal year 1980 Foreign Assistance Appropriations bill.

Given the recent events in Southwest Asia, it is crucial that the United States be steadfast in helping its friends and allies meet their security and economic needs. Passage of the Foreign Assistance Appropriations Act will be a critical demonstration of our resolve.

Operating on a continuing resolution for the rest of the year would cause financial and technical difficulties. We particularly need the higher economic and security assistance levels in the FY 80 bill. Otherwise, countries that count on us for support will be forced to reduce their programs while we are urging them to join us in standing against aggression.


Without this bill, we cannot meet our financial obligations to the multilateral development banks. The International Development Association has already suspended project approvals in the absence of a U.S. contribution. As you know, IDA assistance goes to the poorest of the poor.

Without this bill, our bilateral aid programs will be severely handicapped. Aid programs in Central America and the Caribbean need every cent of the increase over last year that the FY 80 bill allows.

I ask that the Central America request be funded along with the other FY 80 appropriations. Delaying the \$80 million emergency appropriation for Central America until later in the year would be very dangerous. When I first sent this request to the Congress last fall, I noted that it was urgent. It is now critical. Unless

we provide assistance to Nicaragua before the growing season begins, there will be shortages of food, further economic deterioration, and demoralization of private business. If assistance from the United States is not forthcoming soon, we can expect an exodus of middle-class Nicaraguans as they conclude that the United States has turned its back on Nicaragua.

The programs funded by the Foreign Assistance Appropriations bill are important to our national interests. I urge you to give this legislation the highest priority.

SUBJECT: Brief Meetings Regarding the MX Missile System with Governors Matheson and List and Congressmen Gunn McKay (Utah)

We urge that you have brief meetings this week with Governors Scott Matheson and Bob List and separately with Congressman Gunn McKay to (1) reaffirm your support for the MX system and the proposed mode of basing, and (2) to hear their concerns regarding the system as it is being perceived in their states. Because of political and personal differences between Governor Matheson and Gunn McKay, it is necessary to have two brief meetings.

Public opposition to the system is building fast in the two states. The MX is now the biggest daily news in each state. The Nevada and Utah Senatorial delegations have written you requesting a review of the basing mode. Harold has drafted a response to that letter which can be released in coordination with the meeting, if you approve it.

It is important to neutralize the building opposition by appealing to the Governors to support your plan as a matter of the highest national security. At present, Governor List is willing to support and Governor Matheson is moving to a position of open opposition. Congressman McKay has been a supporter, but is growing nervous under heavy re-election pressure.

If you approve the meetings, we will provide you with talking points, including good news for the Governors regarding our willingness to abide by State water appropriations procedures for the MX. We would let McKay put out this "good news."

SUBJECT: Federal Labor Relations Authority (FLRA) - PAS

FLRA was created by the Civil Service Reform legislation to administer the law that protects the right of Federal employees to organize, bargain collectively, and participate in labor organizations. FLRA also ensures compliance with the statutory rights and obligations of Federal employees, and the labor organizations which represent them, in their dealings with Federal agencies.

Last year you appointed Ronald W. Haughton as FLRA Chairman, and Henry B. Frazier III and Leon Applewhaite as Members. Mr. Frazier's term expires on July 1. We join Chairman Haughton in recommending that Mr. Frazier be reappointed for a full five-year term.

The FLRA Members have worked diligently in developing an efficient agency to respond to a case load which greatly exceeds the original projections of Congress, OMB, and civil service experts. Mr. Frazier is the only member whose background includes extensive Federal service. Prior to his appointment, he served as Executive Director of the Federal Labor Relations Council. His expertise in civil service regulations has been valuable to Chairman Haughton, Member Applewhaite, and the staff.

Mr. Frazier's reappointment has been endorsed by Defense Secretary Harold Brown and Ken Blaylock, President of the American Federation of Government Employees.

His exposure to the realities of petroleum in both Saudi Arabia and Libya would establish his credentials to deal with the subject in Qatar. Fluent in Arabic and thoroughly knowledgeable of Arabian ways, Marthinsen would be outstanding in developing contacts. He could be relied on to continue the high morale at our small post in Doha.

Subject: Nomination for Appointment

Dr. Barry Blechman, Assistant Director of ACDA for Weapons Evaluation and Control, resigned on December 31 to return to private life, where he will be associated with the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

The Weapons Evaluation and Control Bureau, which has been headed by Dr. Blechman, is responsible for assessing the policy implications and arms control impact of defense programs, the arms control effect of the transfer of arms and technologies to other countries, and the conduct of economic studies on arms control subjects. The bureau is especially concerned with a range of arms transfer issues, including international negotiations on conventional arms transfers.

I consider it essential to fill this position with an expert in the complicated issues involved in determining the U.S. national interest in arms transfer and defense impact cases. Therefore, I am pleased to submit as my first nomination since becoming Director of ACDA the name of Mr. George W. Ashworth, currently Counselor of the Agency, to fill this position.

Mr. Ashworth has been Counselor of ACDA since May 1979, during which time he has served as Chairman of the Agency's Research Council and been involved in a wide range of arms control issues. Prior to joining ACDA he spent seven years on the staff of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, where he had prime responsibility for arms control and various national security matters including conventional arms transfer policy and Committee review of Arms Control Impact Statements.

Liaison with the Congress is a very important aspect of both our arms transfer policies and our analyses of defense

impacts. Consequently, I believe that Mr. Ashworth's experience in responsible arms control positions in both the legislative and executive branches is just what is needed to fill this important position in ACDA.

From May, 1972, to May, 1979, Mr. Ashworth had the primary professional staff responsibilities for arms control and various national security matters for the U. S. Senate Committee on Foreign Relations, and the Subcommittee on Arms Control, Oceans, and International Environment.

## BIOGRAPHY

JOHN J. (JACK) SHEEHAN

John J. (Jack) Sheehan, a graduate of St. Joseph's College at Yonkers, New York, with a BA and a MA degree, was born on May 13, 1926. in New York City. He is married and has two children, a son and a daughter.

He has served on the administrative staff of the United Steelworkers of America since 1951. In that capacity, he has acted as International auditor, traveling extensively in the United States and Canada for the International Secretary-Treasurer's office.

Prior to being an auditor, he was assigned to a District to work in the area of job evaluation and classification. He has served as special advisor and consultant to the Steelworkers' Department of Education. In this assignment, he aided in program development and served as an instructor and lecturer.

In 1959 he was assigned to the Washington office to serve as legislative representative, both in lobbying activities of the International Union and encouraging steelworker participation in politics on the federal and state levels through the Legislative Education Committee.

With the passage of the Manpower Training and Development Act and the Area Redevelopment Act, he was assigned to deal with community projects involving manpower and area redevelopment. He has been active in the poverty programs and the civil rights movement, and is a member of the Steelworkers' National Committee on Civil Rights.

He has written a number of booklets, one dealing specifically with labor and the federal law, entitled Collective Bargaining or Monopoly. He has also written numerous articles which have had national exposure through leading magazines.

Early in 1967, he was appointed Director of the Legislative Department of the Steelworkers, which concerns itself with all aspects of lobbying and legislation on the national level.

He has served as treasurer of the National Civil Liberties Clearing House, is his Union's representative with the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights and was a delegate to the National Urban Coalition. In the field of consumer protection, he was elected to serve as one of the first members of the board of the Consumer Federation of America. He is a former Chairman of the National Air Conservation Commission, which is an organization sponsored by the American Lung Association, of which he is also a board member. He currently serves on the ALA's Occupational Health Committee, and is a former board member of the D.C. Lung Association.

Since the passage of the Occupational Safety and Health Act, he has served widely as a lecturer and instructor on occupational safety and health as it affects labor. He is a member of the National Advisory Committee on Occupational Safety and Health (U.S. Department of Labor) and a board member of the Society for Occupational and Environmental Health.

Mr. Sheehan was recently appointed to the Board of Directors of the newly formed Consumer Energy Council of America. He recently became a board member of the National Coalition for Disease Prevention and Environmental Health.

I. PURPOSE

To greet the majority of the 1979-80 group of Exchange Executives.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS & PRESS PLAN

A. Background: The President's Committee on Executive Exchange was created by Executive Order in January, 1969 by President Lyndon Johnson (President Carter revised the Executive Order in May, 1979).

The Commission administers a program in which promising mid-level executives in private business come to work in a Federal Government agency for a one year period, and government executives go to work in private industry for one year. The objective of the program is to promote understanding and better working relationships between business and government.

Over 550 executives from 250 different corporations and Federal agencies have participated since the program began. The current group comprises a total of 52 men and women, 26 from each sector.

The Commission, which administers the program, comprises 36 members from business and government. The Chairman is Robert E. Kirby, Chairman of Westinghouse Electric Corporation. The Commissioner representing the White House is Hugh A. Carter. The Executive Director is Lee Cassidy.

B. Participants: Approximately 45 of the current group of Presidential Exchange Executives, some of the Commissioners and the permanent Commission staff (Tab A).

C. Press Plan: White House photographer and one or two representatives of the business press (coordinated through the White House Press Office).

III. TALKING POINTS

(You might wish to open with the observation that your career has also spanned both government and business.)

1. THERE IS NO PARTNERSHIP MORE IMPORTANT TODAY THAN THAT WHICH EXISTS BETWEEN GOVERNMENT AND BUSINESS.

BUSINESS IS THE ECONOMIC LIFEBLOOD OF OUR COUNTRY; AND THE FREE ENTERPRISE SYSTEM IS WHAT HAS MADE THIS COUNTRY THE STRONGEST AND MOST TECHNOLOGICALLY ADVANCED NATION ON EARTH.

AT THE SAME TIME AMERICA'S BUSINESS NEEDS A STRONG AND EFFECTIVE GOVERNMENT PARTNER TO PROVIDE THE CONTEXT FOR PRIVATE ENTERPRISE TO OPERATE; AND ALSO TO ASSURE A BALANCE BETWEEN ECONOMIC GOALS AND THE SOCIAL VALUES WHICH UNDERLIE OUR NATION'S STATURE AND INTEGRITY.

2. ALL TOO OFTEN, HOWEVER, THIS PARTNERSHIP SUFFERS FROM GAPS IN COMMUNICATION, WHICH DETRACT FROM THE ACCOMPLISHMENT OF THE COMMON GOALS OF BUSINESS AND GOVERNMENT.

TO THIS END THE EXECUTIVE EXCHANGE PROGRAM HAS MADE A UNIQUE AND INVALUABLE CONTRIBUTION TO ENHANCING RELATIONSHIPS BETWEEN BUSINESS AND GOVERNMENT. MORE THAN JUST THE SPECIFIC KNOWLEDGE GAINED IN THEIR YEAR OF SERVICE, EACH EXECUTIVE ACHIEVES AN APPRECIATION AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE PROBLEMS, NEEDS, ATTITUDES AND FRUSTRATIONS OF THEIR COUNTERPARTS IN GOVERNMENT OR INDUSTRY.

- BY THE COMMISSION FOR HAVING SELECTED YOU; AND
- BY THE AGENCY OR COMPANY HOSTING YOU.

AT THE SAME TIME I ALSO KNOW THAT EACH OF YOU FULLY APPRECIATES THE RESPONSIBILITY THAT ACCOMPANY THESE HONORS, TO EXERCISE LEADERSHIP BY SHARING YOUR EXPERIENCES WITH AS MANY PERSONS AS POSSIBLE WITHIN YOUR ORGANIZATIONS. SUBJECT: Decision Regarding Accommodations in Rome  
for the Upcoming Official Visit

Although we would not ordinarily bother you at this time about the June trip to Italy, we believe it important that we communicate a decision to Ambassador Gardner and the Italians about where you wish to stay during the visit to Rome.

The Government of Italy has invited you to be guests at the Presidential Palace which is used to host all official visitors. We have inspected the available quarters there and found them to be acceptable. The Palace is secure, convenient to the other sites of the schedule and contains walled in gardens suitable for jogging. Officials of the Italian government have advised us that if you do not stay at the Palace, some Italians will presume that your decision reflects a lack of confidence in Italian security and/or a rejection of Italian hospitality.

Ambassador and Mrs. Gardner are very anxious for you to stay at their Residence. The facilities there are also acceptable and include an outdoor pool and tennis court; however, the Residence itself is more distant than the Palace from the sites that will be a part of the official schedule.

Ambassador Gardner has made known to the Italian government his desire that you stay at his Residence.

Recommendation: The President and Mrs. Carter should accept the hospitality of the Italian government and stay at the Presidential Palace.



SUBJECT: Alaska Natural Gas Pipeline

Your 1977 decision on the Alaskan Natural Gas Transportation System (ANGTS) vested in John McMillian's company (Northwest Alaska Pipeline Company) the right to construct and operate the pipeline to carry natural gas to the lower 48 states. The decision included two significant conditions: (1) that the project be privately financed without government assistance; and (2) that the gas producers would be prohibited from participating in the ownership of the system or being equity partners in the sponsoring consortium.

Last fall, Martin Lipton was appointed special advisor to the Department of Energy to assist in the negotiations for the financing of ANGTS. After several weeks of discussions, Mr. Lipton proposed a financing concept that includes Federal financial assistance and producer (Exxon) ownership of the pipeline. This concept assumes that your 1977 decision is no longer feasible and the pipeline cannot be constructed unless there is Federal financial assistance and producer participation in the project. It would require a change in your 1977 decision and legislation.

I am concerned that this concept could be interpreted by the financial community as indicating a change in your decision and Administration support for Federal financial assistance.

*It would*

I have expressed to Charles my deep concern about variances from your decision and that I would be reluctant to recommend any changes -- particularly with respect to these two extremely controversial and costly aspects. In addition, it is virtually certain that legislation to accomplish such a change could not be enacted.

Charles has assured me that DOE has not endorsed Lipton's proposal. At this time, I am unaware of any analytical information that could support Mr. Lipton's conclusion.
