1. FY '80 Budget: The Budget Committee has approved an increase in the spending ceiling provided for in the second budget resolution. The deficit increases to \$38.2 billion. The Committee combined this third resolution for fiscal '80 with the first resolution for fiscal '81.

2. FY '81 Budget: The Budget Committee will, today, finalize action on the first resolution for fiscal '81. Dave Obey and Paul Simon are trying to put a package together that will attract greater Democratic support for the Committee resolution. Central to their package will be \$500 million to help urban areas particularly hard hit by the budget cuts.

3. Budget Limitation Proposals: The Rules Committee task force headed by Tony Beilenson has conducted extensive hearings on the many budget limitation schemes. Dick Bolling has no immediate plans to report any such measure from the Committee.

4. Registration: Jamie Whitten has yet to schedule a full committee meeting.

5. S. 932: The conferees have completed work on Title I, the synthetics program. Attention now centers on Title V, conservation. Progress is slow (with Senate staff being uncooperative).

6. Energy Mobilization Board (fast track): House and Senate remain divided on substantive waiver with no resolution in sight. Phil Sharp seems best suited to try and mediate the differences between Dingell and Tim Wirth, which are preventing progress. (For the moment Wirth is aligned with Metzenbaum and Bumpers, as well as the environmentalists. Together they are preventing Bennett Johnston from compromising with Dingell).

7. FTC: The continuing appropriation is scheduled for floor action today.

8. Mortgage Bonds: Scheduled for floor action today. The home builders have been working against the bill.

9. Utility Oil Reduction: On the Commerce Committee only John Dingell seems to support the bill actively.

10. Truck Deregulation: Public Works plans to report a bill, probably in May.

11. Rail Deregulation: Commerce Committee markup is likely in May.

12. Economic Development: Remains hung up in conference.

- o Nancy, I share your concerns about the Rock Island Railroad and I am aware of yesterday's 7th Circuit Court's decision regarding the ICC's interim operating authority.
  
- o However, I understand that the 7th Circuit's opinion does not mean that the ICC cannot authorize uncompensated directed service to carriers over the Rock Island line.
  
- o In fact, the ICC will today issue an order authorizing such service under another section of the Interstate Commerce Act. This will provide interim operations until May 23 over those Rock Island lines described in Neil Goldschmidt's letter of March 12 to ICC Chairman Gaskins.
  
- o I also understand that the affected labor unions have agreed to these temporary operations.
  
- o I assure you that we are considering a range of alternatives to prevent a complete hiatus of service on the Rock Island.
  
- o I have asked Secretary Goldschmidt to call you with more detailed information on the present status of interim operations on the Rock Island line.

Dear Charles:

You will excuse the familiarity of my first-name salutation, when I explain that you and I were close friends, for several months, in 1922.

I had a short ministry with the Bainbridge Christian Church - short because my aging parents were unable to adjust to the climate, and we decided to return to the North.

On one occasion you climbed into my lap - which was nothing new - but, this time, you carefully inspected my ears, and said, "You sure do keep your ears clean." Your mother said that you had announced that you were going to be a preacher when you were fat enough, and she had told you, that if you did, you would have to keep your ears clean.

She told me, also, that you had played "church" with some other children, and, as the preacher had told them, "Just as sure as candy is good, God is good."

You couldn't have used a better argument with children. This shows that you were cut out to be, either a preacher or a lawyer. I suggest that you can still do some preaching, and I don't mean just in addressing a judge and jury.

I am retired, eighty-two years old, and hard of hearing - my wife is confined to our home, but her heart and blood pressure are good for her age.

I am not proposing a regular correspondence; I know that you are too busy for that. But I have been thinking of writing to you, for some time, and the immanence of another presidential election spurred me on.

I don't know this for sure, but I am convinced that registration for military service would be more acceptable to many, if they could be assured that the U. S. government would never again engage in a "no-win war," but would put all the military and financial powers of our country behind our military forces when necessary.

Then, too, I am enclosing a Zerox copy of a government pamphlet issued in December, 1942. To me, this points several facts:

1. That the inflation balloon will burst if it gets much bigger, and that F. D. R. and his "brain trust" thought so, too.

2. That price ceilings and commodity rationing have failed to stop inflation.

3. That meeting the president's appeal for self denial - not for any particular group or class, but for all Americans - beginning in Washington - is an urgent necessity.

Quotes from this and other government pamphlets issued in the beginning of inflation might be advantageously brought to public attention.

I. PURPOSE

To honor the six top officials and 56-member National Advisory Committee of the forthcoming White House Conference on Aging, scheduled for December 1981.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS AND PRESS PLAN

A. Background: On December 10, 1979, you gave the "call" for the 1981 White House Conference on Aging and introduced the Chairperson, four Co-chairpersons and the Executive Director in a Cabinet Room ceremony. Since then, the full 56-member National Advisory Committee has been named and just completed (this Monday and Tuesday) its first meeting. The First Lady is conducting a reception for them -- providing an excellent opportunity for you to discuss the serious impact of inflation -- especially on the elderly.

B. Participants:

1. List A (attached) gives the six top officials of the Conference whom you introduced in the December 10 ceremony mentioned above.

List B (attached) gives the 56 members of the National Advisory Committee, their home states and certain affiliations.

2. The audience will include Rep. Claude Pepper and Senator Lawton Chiles, Chairmen of the House and Senate Select Committees on Aging, and thirty additional Representatives and Senators have indicated their intention to attend (LIST C, attached), plus

the Governor of Kansas (John Carlin) and the Governor of New Hampshire (Hugh Gallen). In addition, White House Conference representatives from about 16 states will be present, along with officials of all the major aging organizations.

(NOTE: Secretary Patricia Roberts Harris will be unable to attend.)

C. Press Plan: Entire event is open to the press.

### III. SCENARIO

At 2:05 p.m., you will join the First Lady in the Blue Room. You both will then proceed to the East Room where the five top officials of the White House Conference (Arthur Flemming will not be present) and Nelson Cruikshank will be waiting on the raised platform. The 56-member National Advisory Committee will be seated in front. The First Lady will introduce you. You will depart upon completion of your remarks and the First Lady will continue with the program.

Attached is background information concerning the assassination of Archbishop Romero:

- 1) Copy of Archbishop Romero's February 17 letter to President Carter, in which he expressed his grave concern about pending military assistance by the United States to El Salvador. The letter is a plea to reverse the decision of sending military aid because the present government cannot govern, and military aid would only exacerbate the present situation.
- 2) Copy of letter to Archbishop Romero from Archbishop Quinn, President of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and the United States Catholic Conference, expressing support for Archbishop Romero's position, and assuring him that the United States Catholic Conference would do whatever it could to work against military assistance to El Salvador.
- 3) Copy of letter to Rep. Clarence Long, Chairman of the Foreign Operations Subcommittee, from Bishop Kelly, General Secretary for United States Catholic Conference, stating the official USCC position against United States military assistance to El Salvador. Kelly states that from information received directly from the church in El Salvador, that "the military arm of government in El Salvador is itself an instrument of terror and repression, quite unable to win the political support needed to govern in peace."

- 4) Press release issued today, March 25, 1980, by Archbishop Quinn, President of the United States National Conference of Catholic Bishops, calling yesterday's assassination of Archbishop Romero "a tragedy and an outrage."

It is important to note that representatives of the United States Catholic Conference testified today on Capitol Hill against military assistance to El Salvador.

Archbishop Romero's letter to President Carter is public knowledge and received extensive press coverage, including a Washington Post front-page article by Chris Dickey on February 17.

Because of what Archbishop Romero stood for, his assassination was deeply felt among the world community, and especially among the Catholic community.

In light of the seriousness of this new development, the decision to provide military assistance to El Salvador should be re-evaluated.

A delegation from the United States Catholic Conference led by Archbishop Quinn will be going to a memorial mass for Archbishop Romero in El Salvador on Sunday.

WASHINGTON--The President of the U.S. National Conference of Catholic Bishops, calling yesterday's assassination of Archbishop Oscar Romero of San Salvador "a tragedy and an outrage," has renewed the Archbishop's plea that the U.S. not give military aid to El Salvador.

"There could be no more fitting tribute to the heroic life of this holy man than the fact that as a nation we would follow his advice," said Archbishop John R. Quinn of San Francisco.

Following is his statement:

The assassination of Archbishop Oscar Romero of San Salvador is a tragedy and an outrage. Although it is impossible at this time to fix the precise blame for this killing, it is clear that the Archbishop's death is part of a major social conflict in which he has consistently stood as a voice for the poor and the oppressed who form the vast majority of the Salvadorean people.

We in the United States tend to look at events in a country like El Salvador in a detached way, as if we were unrelated to them. In fact, however, the posture and policies of our nation directly influence the daily life of the poor in El Salvador. Archbishop Romero called attention to this himself in his prophetic letter to President Carter on February 17th. In a direct personal plea to the President, the Archbishop requested that no more military assistance be given to the El Salvadorean government. As yet the plea has not been

# Salvadoran Archbishop Asks Carter To End Military Aid

El Salvador's Archbishop Oscar Romero has been not only a critic of right-wing military forces in his country but also of leftists who have occupied churches and buildings and taken hostages, as well. The archbishop has also been a critic of the armed forces and civilians in government positions who, he feels, yield to pressure from forces on both the right and the left and stall the implementation of needed reforms.

Violence in El Salvador threatens civil war which some fear will lead to an end of attempts at democratic changes by two successive juntas of young officers and civilian leaders. The current junta came to power after a coup last October.

On Jan. 30 this year, Archbishop Romero met with Pope John Paul. After their private audience, Romero said the pope supports efforts of the church to establish social justice by peaceful means. He said the pope told him: "I know well the conditions of your country, the difficulties of your pastoral task, and I pray every day for El Salvador. There must be a vigor-

Archbishop Oscar Romero of San Salvador wrote a letter to President Jimmy Carter Feb. 17. The letter expressed great concern at news reports that the U.S. government is considering the possibility of giving military aid to El Salvador. Romero told the U.S. president that such a move would "without doubt sharpen the injustice and repression against the organizations of the people (of El Salvador) which repeatedly have been struggling to gain respect for their most fundamental human rights." It would be "unjust and deplorable," he said, if the intrusion by foreign powers were to frustrate the Salvadoran people by violating the right of "the legitimate self-determination of our people" proclaimed by the Latin American bishops during their 1979 general assembly in Puebla, Mexico. The text of Romero's letter follows.

In the last few days, news has appeared in the national press that worries me greatly. According to the reports, your government is studying the possibility of economic and military support and assistance to the present junta government.

Because you are a Christian and because you have shown that you want to defend human rights, I venture to set forth for you my pastoral point of view concerning this news and to make a request.

I am very worried by the news that the government of the United States is studying a form of abetting the arming of El Salvador by sending military teams and advisors to "train three Salvadoran battalions in logistics, communications and intelligence." If this information from the newspapers is correct, the contribution of your government, instead of promoting greater justice and peace in El Salvador, will without doubt sharpen the injustice and repression against the organizations of the people who repeatedly have been struggling to gain respect for their most fundamental human rights.

The present junta government and above all the armed forces and security forces unfortunately have not demonstrated their capacity to resolve, in political and structural practice, the grave national problems. In general they have only reverted to repressive violence, producing a total of deaths and injuries much greater than in the recent

human rights was denounced by the Inter-American Committee on Human Rights.

The brutal form in which the security forces recently attacked and assassinated the occupiers of the headquarters of the Christian Democratic Party in spite of what appears to be the lack of authorization for this operation from the junta government and the party is an indication that the junta and the party do not govern the country, but that political power is in the hands of the unscrupulous military who only know how to repress the people and promote the interests of the Salvadoran oligarchy.

"As archbishop of the Archdiocese of San Salvador I have an obligation to see that faith and justice reign in my country, (so) I ask you, if you truly want to defend human rights, to prohibit the giving of this military aid to the Salvadoran government."

If it is true that last November "a group of six Americans were in El Salvador...providing \$200,000 in gas masks and flak jackets and instructing about their use against demonstrators," you yourself should be informed that it is evident since then that the security forces, with better personal protection and efficiency, have repressed the people even more violently using lethal weapons.

For this reason, given that as a Salvadoran and as archbishop of the Archdiocese of San Salvador, I have an obligation to see that faith and justice reign in my country, I ask you, if you truly want to defend human rights, to prohibit the giving of this military aid to the Salvadoran government. Guarantee that your government will not intervene directly or indirectly with military, economic, diplomatic or other pressures to determine the destiny of the Salvadoran people.

In these moments we are living through a grave economic and political crisis in our country, but it is certain that it is increasingly

people who are awakening and organizing and have begun to prepare themselves to manage and be responsible for the future of El Salvador. Only they are capable of overcoming the crises.

It would be unjust and deplorable if the intrusion of foreign powers were to frustrate the Salvadoran people, were to repress them and block their autonomous decisions about the economic and political path that our country ought to follow. It would violate a right which

we Latin American bishops meeting in Puebla publicly recognized when we said: "The legitimate self-determination of our people that permits them to organize according to their own genius and the march of their history and to cooperate in a new international order."

I hope that your religious sentiments and your feelings for the defense of human rights will move you to accept my petition, avoiding by this action worse bloodshed in this suffering country.

## Bishop Meets The Divorced and Separated

The bishop of Spokane, Wash., Lawrence Welch, invited divorced and separated people to a Feb. 17 meeting with him. In a column he wrote for Spokane's diocesan newspaper, the bishop explained: "As part of our Family Year, we want the divorced and separated people to feel a part of the family of the church. We want them to know we care about them. We want to say we love you, we will support you in whatever way we can." The text follows of the bishop's column, which appeared in the Feb. 14 edition of the Inland Register.

A young lady recently told me that she hopes this Year of the Family will be an opportunity to strengthen and support families. On the other hand, she faces all of this with great anxiety and some fear. She is one of the approximately 5 million to 6 million divorced Catholics in this country. Her fear is that the emphasis will be solely on the traditional family. Where does this leave the divorced and separated person?

There indeed is a great pastoral need to minister to divorced and separated people. The divorced and separated are part of our larger family — the family of the church — the parish family. Approximately 150,000 divorces out of 1 million involve marriages in the Catholic Church each year. It is an astounding and shocking reality that we must face.

### Church Trying to Help

Our own diocese is working on a marriage program that we hope will help prepare couples for marriages that will be grace-filled and successful — a program that will help couples prepare themselves to meet all the challenges and pressures that face married

people. There's hardly a family among us that has not been touched by divorce. It's one of the foremost problems facing the church today. Divorced and separated people should never feel alienated from the church. They need the church and the church needs them.

In ministering to divorced and separated people, the church is not condoning divorce. The church must minister to all hurting and suffering people. Many of our divorced and separated brothers and sisters are indeed suffering much anguish and pain. They need the compassion and understanding of the church.

### We Have to Do Something

The reality of divorce is that it is something that breaks down the social fabric. It's not only a private horror, it erodes society. And so we have to do something to minister to divorced and separated people.

As part of our Family Year, we want the divorced and separated people to feel a part of the family of the church. We want them to know we care about them. We want to say we love you, we will support you in whatever way we can.

To show my concern for the needs and concerns of our divorced and separated brothers and sisters, I am inviting them to meet with me this coming Sunday, Feb. 17. We will meet at Sacred Heart Church Hall in Spokane at 12:30 p.m.

I want to talk to them, and more important, I want to hear from them. I desire to hear their needs and what they think the church can do to help them. I hope you can appreciate my concern as your bishop. I have come here to serve all God's people.

the defense of social justice, there must be love for the poor. But we must exercise care regarding some ideologies that can infiltrate the efforts for human rights, for in the long run such ideologies violate those rights."

There will be no plea of strength. I am trying to find that balance in defending with vigor social justice, which is being so trampled among our people. I am with the poor, and at the same time I point to the dangers of seeking redress minus Christian principles and sentiment."

The archbishop said, "I reassured the pope that I was trying to steer the Christian basic communities, the priests and religious on the path of the Gospel so that in the ferocity of defending justice and loving the poor, they do not lose sight of the Christian values of our people."

Then, he said, the pope "gave me a strong hug and said he supported my position. He sent a special blessing to the people of El Salvador, and urged all to have trust in God."

I write to request that you and the members of the Foreign Operations Subcommittee oppose the provision of U.S. military assistance to the present government in El Salvador.

This position of the U.S. Catholic Conference has been formulated in light of the extraordinary step taken by Archbishop Oscar Romero of San Salvador. On February 17th, he addressed a personal plea to President Carter asking him, in the name of human rights, to "prohibit the giving of military aid to the Salvadorean government", and to guarantee that the United States would not "intervene, directly or indirectly, with military, economic, diplomatic or other pressures to determine the destiny of the Salvadorean people".

By this letter I wish to echo the Archbishop's plea, this time from within the church in the United States. The position of our Conference is taken because of the information coming to us from the church in El Salvador. Rather than a view of a beleaguered government caught between extremists of left and right, the picture we receive is that the military arm of government in El Salvador is itself an instrument of terror and repression, quite unable to win the political support needed to govern in peace.

It is for this reason that I commend respectfully for consideration Archbishop Romero's position that the United States

On the anniversary of the death of the revered Father Rutilio Grande, S.J., I write to acknowledge receipt of a copy of your letter of February 17, 1980 to President Carter urging the United States not to provide military assistance to the Salvadorean government.

Our Conference, as you know from previous communications, has been following the developments in El Salvador closely. We are aware of the courageous, indeed prophetic, positions you have taken during this time of great suffering and struggle for the people of El Salvador. I am writing at this time to endorse your position opposing U. S. military assistance to the present government, and to tell you that we will be doing all we can through the U. S. Catholic Conference in Washington to see that your advice to the President is followed.

In December 1979, Mr. Thomas Quigley, the Latin America Adviser at the Conference, testified before the U. S. Congress opposing military aid to the junta. Later this month we expect to be able to testify again; we will surely rely upon your letter and join our voice with it in warning against the provision of military assistance by our government at this time.

We will continue to follow events in your nation with care. We are available in these difficult days to cooperate through our activity in the United States in the efforts of the Church in El Salvador to bring justice and peace to your nation. Our prayers and best wishes are with you.

The Regents have recommended the reappointment of Professor Theodore Ropp and the appointment of Lieutenant General Andrew J. Goodpaster.

Theodore Ropp (North Carolina): Professor of History, Duke University.

Andrew J. Goodpaster (New York): Lieutenant General, United States Army; Superintendent, United States Military Academy at West Point.

National Cancer Advisory Board

The National Cancer Advisory Board was established to advise the Director of the National Cancer Program, and to report annually to the President and Congress on the progress of the Program. The 29 member Board is composed of eleven ex-officio members and 18 public members, appointed by the President. The following six candidates have been approved by Secretary Harris and Frank Press.

William Powers, of Michigan, is a current member of the Board, and we recommend his reappointment. He is Professor of Radiation Oncology at Wayne State University School of Medicine, and Director of the Central Radiation Therapy Facility of the Detroit Medical Center. He is strongly recommended by Senators Levin and Eagleton.

Robert Hickey, of Texas, is Executive Vice President and Director of the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston. He has expertise in research, patient care, surgery and management. Dr. Hickey is recommended by Bob Strauss and Senator Bentsen.

LeSalle Leffall, of Washington, D. C., is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Surgery at Howard University Hospital, and President of the American Cancer Society. He is a specialist in surgical oncology and the treatment of cancer.

J. Gale Katerhagen, of Washington, is the Director of the Department of Oncology at Tacoma General Hospital, and past President of the Association of Community Cancer Centers. He is a community surgeon with expertise in medical oncology. Dr. Katerhagen is strongly recommended by Senator Magnuson.

Mrs. Jules Lederer (Ann Landers), of Illinois, is a well-known, syndicated columnist whose experience with the public through her newspaper column and her special interests in health activities make her well-qualified to serve as a public member of the Board. Mrs. Lederer is supported by Anne Wexler.

Rose Kushner, of Maryland, is Executive Director of the Breast Cancer Advisory Center. She also serves as a consultant to many women's health groups and has written and lectured extensively on the subject of breast cancer. Sarah Weddington supports this appointment.

Dr. Henry Pitot, of Wisconsin, is a current member of the Advisory Board. He was designated Chairman on April 24, 1979, for a term of one year. We recommend that he be re-designated as Chairman of the Board for an additional year.

**EIGHTEEN** appointed by the President. Not more than twelve of the appointed members shall be scientists or physicians, not more than eight of the appointed members shall be representatives from the general public, and not less than five of the appointed members shall be individuals knowledgeable in environmental carcinogenesis (including carcinogenesis involving occupational and dietary factors.) The scientists and physicians shall be appointed from persons who are among the leading scientific or medical authorities outstanding in the study, diagnosis, or treatment of cancer or in fields related thereto, and at least two of the physicians shall be physicians primarily involved in treating individuals who have cancer.

Each appointed member shall be appointed from among persons who by virtue of their training, experience, and background are especially qualified to appraise the programs of the Institute.

The ex officio members of the Board shall be nonvoting members.

NATIONAL CANCER ADVISORY BOARD

CHAIRMAN:

The President shall designate one of the appointed members to serve as Chairman for a term of two years.

TERM:

SIX YEARS - except, that of those first appointed six shall be appointed for a term of two years, and six shall be appointed for a term of four years.

Any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term for which his predecessor was appointed shall serve only for the remainder of such term.

They shall be eligible for reappointment.

They may serve after the expiration of their terms until their successors have taken office. (HOLDOVERS)

SALARY:

Members who are not officers or employees of the United States: Not to exceed daily rate for GS-18, WAE, including traveltime.

All Members may be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, while serving away from their homes or regular places of business.

NATIONAL CANCER ADVISORY BOARD

PURPOSE:

The Board shall advise and assist the Director of the National Cancer Institute with respect to the National Cancer Program. They shall meet at the call of the Director of the National Cancer Institute, but not less than four times a year. They shall submit a report to the President for transmittal to Congress not later than January 31 of each year on the progress of the National Cancer Program toward the accomplishment of its objectives.

The Director of the National Cancer Institute shall make available to the Board such staff, information, and other assistance as it may require.

NOTE:

~~Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) --  
of Section 7 pertaining to the effective date of this  
act, the members of this Board may be appointed  
at any time after the date of enactment of the law  
and shall be compensated from the date they first  
take office. -----~~

The amendments made by P. L. 95-622 respecting the manner of appointing members and the composition of the Board shall apply with respect to appointments made after the date of the enactment of this law, and the President shall make appointments after such date in a manner which will bring about, at the earliest feasible time, the composition prescribed in this law.
