SUBJECT: Memos Not Submitted

1. ROUTINE CAB CASES, in which Cutler and all agencies concur:
  - o Docket 30697 expands air service for various airlines from 15 US cities to 21 Caribbean points and 4 points in Venezuela.
  - o Docket 35455 permits Braniff to offer non-stop US-Brazil service.
  - o Dockets 35715 and 32379 renew and expand the foreign air carrier permits for Turk Air Limited and Caribwest Airways.
  - o Dockets 36145 and 15019 authorize additional routes for Pan Am and Airwest Airlines.
2. SECRETARY HARRIS MEMO reporting on her recent visit to Liberia, Nigeria, Italy and Egypt to discuss areas of health cooperation. (NSC has a copy.)
3. HENRY OWEN MEMO, summarizing key recommendations of the Hunger Commission:
  - o the elimination of hunger should be the primary focus of the US relationship with developing countries in the 1980s;
  - o the US should support establishment of global food reserves to meet major international food shortages;
  - o US economic aid to developing countries should be increased to meet the UN goal of 0.7% of GNP as soon as possible;

- o HEW should establish a National Nutrition Surveillance Program.

"Explicit responses can be deferred pending your consideration of the results of the interagency reviews of the Report, which we will arrange..."

4. OMB reports 5 violations of the Antideficiency Act of the Army and the Air Force. OMB indicates that none of the violations were willful, and that DOD has taken appropriate corrective and disciplinary action.

on violations of section 3679 of the

There is attached a memorandum dated January 7, 1980, from the Deputy Secretary of Defense reporting to you, as required by law, violations of subsection (h) of section 3679 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (31 U.S.C. 665), commonly known as the Antideficiency Act.

Five reports of violation are transmitted. The violations were caused by failure to comply with regulations; however, none of the cases appear to have been willful. The reported violations are as follows.

Operation and maintenance, Army, 1975	1975	\$490,915.17*	Obligations and expenditures in excess of a statutory limitation.
Operation and maintenance, Air Force, 1978	1978	\$49.90	Overobligation of an allotment.

\* Comprised of five separate violations.

The memorandum from the Deputy Secretary of Defense states that appropriate corrective and disciplinary action has been taken. Disciplinary action consisted of oral reprimands. In view of these actions taken within the Department, we do not recommend further action at this time.

Copies of the Defense reports have been sent to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

SUBJECT: Reports of Violations of the Anti-Deficiency Act

In compliance with the provisions of Section 3679(i)(2), Revised Statutes, there are submitted herewith five reports of violations of the Anti-Deficiency Act (Section 3679, Revised Statutes), and of Department of Defense Directive 7200.1, "Administrative Control of Appropriations." Five violations occurred in the Army (one report contained two violations) and one in the Air Force.

No evidence has been found that the violations were willful. The five Army violations and the Air Force violation were caused by failure to comply with existing regulations. Appropriate corrective action has been taken. Disciplinary action was taken where warranted.

To comply with the provisions of Section 3679(i)(2), Revised Statutes, copies of the reports are also being submitted to the President of the Senate and to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.



SUBJECT: Report of the Presidential  
Commission on World Hunger

Here is the Hunger Commission's final report, which Sol Linowitz could formally present during the ten-minute participation in an East Room meeting of religious, development, charitable, and agricultural leaders that I proposed in an earlier memo.

The Commission makes some 30 recommendations (pp 181-190), including these key ones:

-- ". . . that the United States make the elimination of hunger the primary focus of its relationship with the developing countries, beginning with the decade of the 1980s."


-- That the United States press for establishment of global food reserves, support creation of emergency food stocks in developing nations, and back up US food aid commitments with both an earmarked government reserve and farmer-held reserves to meet major international food shortages.

-- That US economic aid to developing countries be increased as rapidly as possible to meet the UN goal of 0.7% of GNP and that development aid be targeted primarily on poor nations committed to meeting basic human needs and rights.

-- That HEW establish a National Nutrition Surveillance Program, that the Congress increase resources for demonstrably successful domestic feeding programs, and that greater emphasis be put on nutrition in health legislation.

You can respond initially to the Commission's international food security recommendations by signing the new Food Aid Convention and urging passage of the Food Security Bill, e.g., at a suitable ceremony, as suggested in my earlier memo. Other explicit responses can be deferred pending your consideration of the results of interagency reviews of the Report, which we will arrange.
