I. DOMESTIC POLICY ISSUES

1. Alaska Lands

Congressmen Udall and Seiberling have now decided on an Alaska Lands strategy following consultations with Senators Jackson and Stevens. They will incorporate what they perceive as "essential changes" to the Senate-passed bill into a new vehicle or separate piece of legislation which they hope to pass and send to the Senate.

Exactly what Chairman Udall intends to put into this new bill is uncertain and will depend upon the outcome of negotiations now going on between House and Senate staff and principals. It is highly unlikely that any major changes will be made in the Senate bill. However, the process will make it much easier for environmentalists to accept the final result.

On a related note, the feedback we have received as a result of your meeting with environmental leaders has been extremely positive and your comment on the Alaska issue was particularly well-received.

2. Rail Deregulation

Speaker O'Neill's insistence that the House stay in on Tuesday until they had completed action on the rail bill led to House passage of the bill Tuesday night. The Eckhardt substitute was easily defeated, 83 to 296, and the Staggers-Rahall compromise then passed, 364-6. Although this compromise was not as far-reaching as the measure that was pulled off the floor in July, the bill remains a strong one and goes considerably further than the Senate bill.

There are still a few problems to work out in conference. Congressman Levitas added his usual congressional veto amendment, but it is likely this can be deleted in conference. We expect the conferees generally to follow the House provisions, though Senator Long will probably press on behalf of utilities for some additional rate relief. The conferees should begin meeting next week.

3. Fair Housing

We are awaiting a decision from the Majority Leader on scheduling the bill for action by the full Senate. Your direct involvement is very much appreciated. We are already at work with committee staffs on possible resolution of issues which will be subject to conference immediately upon Senate passage.

4. Higher Education Conference

Conferees are scheduled to meet on Tuesday to re-conference the bill. A bill could be back on the House floor as early as Thursday. We have been working with committee staff on changes in budgetary and other matters.

5. Youth Act

The Senate's action on the Higher Education conference has delayed consideration of our youth bill. The schedule now calls for Senator Pell's subcommittee to mark up Title II on September 18. Senator Nelson's subcommittee will report out Title I on September 23. The full committee will act later that day. The Senate is expected to vote on it on September 29 and be ready for a conference with the House on October 1. We will continue to press for enactment before the recess.

6. Mental Health

Negotiations continued throughout the week at the staff level, and it remains possible that the conferees could meet as early as next week, although no date has been set. Congressman Waxman has indicated that he'd like to hold a conference on three health bills, while Senator Kennedy wants to have a separate conference on Mental Health since the other two bills are controversial. Stu will be calling Waxman to urge him to agree to a separate Mental Health conference.

7. Superfund

Superfund is scheduled for House floor action next week. On the Senate side, the Senate Finance Committee today completed two days of hearings on its superfund bill. Although no markup date has been set, there has been no notice that action on the bill

will not proceed. WH CL has visited ten members of the Finance Committee to urge that they move the bill quickly. We will also ask that you discuss with Senator Long our strong desire that the committee complete all action it is going to take in time for the bill to pass the Congress before they go home for the election.

8. Omnibus Regulatory Reform Bill

The AFL-CIO and the Business Roundtable remain close to agreement on a compromise version of the Senate regulatory reform bill. For different reasons, both want a bill this year -- the BRT because of the time and effort it has invested and the AFL-CIO because it fears passage of a worse bill next year. While a number of substantive issues remain unresolved, the principal stumbling block remains the fear that amendments will be added on the Senate floor. We have warned the AFL-CIO of this risk and of the fact that it is unlikely that you will be able to veto a bill if one is passed before the election.

The House Judiciary Committee is scheduled to resume its markup of regulatory reform next Wednesday and Thursday. As the price for getting the markup going again, the Republicans have agreed to go back and delete the legislative veto provision that had been added to the bill. If the committee completes action on the bill next week, we will still try to keep the bill from going to the House floor unless the Senate has passed an acceptable bill.

9. EDA Conference

After a promising start last week at resolving the long-deadlocked EDA conference, the House conferees have become embroiled in a controversy over subcommittee Chairman Roe's apparent failure to fully consult with his fellow Members about the Administration's proposed compromise offer. Congressman ~~Oberstar~~, a conferee, is particularly upset and has mentioned his unwillingness to cooperate with Roe.

10. Antitrust Procedural Reform

In 1977 you appointed a National Commission for the Review of Antitrust Laws and Procedure which filed its report in January 1979. The Commission recommended a number of reforms designed to move antitrust litigation through the courts more quickly and cheaply. Last week the House adopted a conference report containing most of the reforms recommended by the Commission. The bill passed the Senate earlier and will be forwarded shortly for your signature.

11. COWPS Reauthorization

The COWPS Reauthorization bill has been granted a rule and awaits floor action. Congressman Reuss has indicated that the bill will reach the floor during the week of the 22nd. It is important that the House act as soon as possible on the authorization since the original COWPS legislation contains a specific provision terminating all of the Council's authority as of September 30, 1980. Without House action, we will have to add authorizing language to the COWPS appropriations bill in the Senate, an action Senator Proxmire opposes. In fact, the Senate appropriations bill as now written stipulates that the funds are not available until an authorization bill has been passed.

II. ECONOMIC ISSUES

1. Unemployment Compensation

As you know, subsequent to your decision, questions were raised as to the possibility of an alternative which would cover all states for the next two quarters, when unemployment is expected to be most serious. We will return to you this weekend for further decisions before transmitting it to the Hill on Monday. The Ways and Means Subcommittee on Public Assistance and Unemployment Compensation is scheduled to hold a hearing on your proposal on Wednesday.

2. Revenue Sharing/Countercyclical

House Rules is scheduled to take up the revenue sharing/ countercyclical bill on Tuesday. The House bill contains only the local share of revenue sharing and provides \$1 billion in countercyclical in FY '81, '82 and '83. Floor action is expected the week of September 22. Congressman Rodino is expected to offer an amendment to restore the state share for the outyears.

Also expected next week is Senate floor action on Transportation and Military Construction.

Continuing Resolution

House markup and floor action are likely next week on the Continuing Resolution, although the exact schedule is fluid.

In addition to a potential abortion rider, the bill may contain a provision prohibiting programs that would prevent voluntary prayer and meditation in public schools.

One of the most controversial aspects of the resolution will be its effective date. Some Senate staff are pushing for a February effective date to give the Congress more flexibility over the need for a lame duck session. However, such a late date would hamper effective management of many Federal programs and would preclude a Second Budget Resolution before next year. Because of the touchiness of this situation between the Appropriations and Budget Committees, we recommend caution concerning any statements about the effective date of the continuing resolution.

Treasury-Postal

This bill was marked up in Senate subcommittee on Tuesday. While full results are not yet available, we do know that the subcommittee approved the full budget requests for the White House Office, Executive Residence, DPS, and NSC accounts. OMB and OA were reduced slightly, but should be able to operate effectively under the subcommittee mark.

Energy and Water Development

The Senate passed this bill by a vote of 83-9 on Wednesday.

The Senate -- by a vote of 78 to 13 -- agreed to a modified Robert Byrd amendment that imposes a ceiling on the pay of senior officials of the Executive Branch, judges, and Members of Congress as recommended by the Administration. This same general provision is included in the House-passed 1981 Legislative Branch Appropriations bill, which is incorporated in the House-proposed Continuing Resolution.

Another Byrd amendment was approved authorizing \$284 million for the Tug Fork Project and providing \$6 million -- within available resources -- to begin work on the project. This provision is clearly legislation in an appropriations bill and initiates a "new start" outside the normal approval process. The advantage of this action is that it will likely kill the omnibus water authorization bill for this session of Congress.

A Chafee amendment to delete \$200 million for further construction of Tenn-Tom was rejected by a resounding vote of 37-52.

Transportation

This bill was marked up in Senate full committee on Tuesday. The bill is under our budget request by roughly \$750 million.

Defense

This bill was reported by House full committee last Wednesday. It contains policy increases of about \$2.9 billion over our request, which is approximately one-half of the total budget add-on in the recently-enacted DOD authorization bill.

Some of the larger increases to our request include the following:

- \$508 M for one extra SSN-688 submarine
- \$476 M for two extra FFG-7 frigates
- \$475 M for additional Air Force spare and repair parts
- \$271 M for 12 extra F-18s
- \$243 M for AV-8B (Harrier) aircraft development

Jim McIntyre has met with Senator Stennis to urge him to follow the House's lead and keep the add-ons in the Senate bill well under the authorized level. Because of the conservative makeup of the Senate Appropriations Defense Subcommittee, this goal will not be easy to achieve. ?

4. Reconciliation

Conference may begin next Wednesday. OMB intends to send a letter to the conferees giving the Administration's position on the bill, including a statement of general support for the reconciliation process. The draft letter will be sent to affected agencies early Monday morning, and we will try to expedite any appeals.

All agency CL work on the reconciliation bill is to be coordinated through WH/OMB CL and the Budget Task Force to ensure that the conferees are not overwhelmed by too many simultaneous contacts.

5. Tax Cuts

The Finance Committee, which is scheduled to mark up minor and special interest tax amendments September 16-18, has released an agenda of over 75 items. Senator Long's staff will advise him to add any of the items approved by the Committee to already pending minor bills rather than create another major bill or attach them to the tax cut bill. Long has not agreed to any strategy.

No movement is foreseen on tax cuts until after Senator Long returns from Louisiana on September 15. While Long has been speaking in favor of a tax cut this year while campaigning, it is as yet unknown how forceful he will be in pushing Senator Byrd to schedule action on a bill.

In the House, Ways and Means Democrats, for the most part, remain firm with Chairman Udall against enactment this year. Congressman Jim Jones, who favors a tax cut this year, will probably restrain himself since he is angling for the Chairmanship of the House Budget Committee and does not want to upset the applegart by trying to roll over the Ways and Means Chairman and the House Democratic leadership, all of whom oppose a tax cut.

Chairman Ullman will be caucusing next week with the Ways and Means Democrats as part of his commitment to discuss tax cuts with committee members. It is expected that Republicans will work together as a block and seek every opportunity to get a vote on a tax cut bill.

III. FOREIGN AFFAIRS, DEFENSE, AND INTELLIGENCE ISSUES

1. Tarapur

The Government of India responded with restraint to the double defeat of our proposal to export shipments of nuclear fuel for use in its Tarapur reactor. Noting that "India is only concerned with the continued implementation of the 1963 Agreement," a Foreign Ministry spokesman referred to the defeats in the two foreign affairs committees as "domestic processes of decision-making within the United States." We do not expect this measured reaction to be repeated if the full House and Senate adopt a resolution disapproving the two shipments. If that occurs, we will have failed what has become in India a litmus test of the relationship with our country.

The floor battle that looms will be difficult. In the House, where an overwhelming number of members signed on to a disapproval resolution even before the Administration had an opportunity to make its case, we expect little debate and a big defeat. House floor action is likely on Wednesday.

In the Senate, we are lining up support for the floor debate. At this stage our vote count shows nearly a dead heat among those Senators who have focused on the issue, but there is a large undecided bloc. We are hoping that Senators Byrd and Baker will play an active role in supporting Senators Church and Javits of the SFRC. Other Senators who support our position and who could be helpful on the floor are Jackson, McClure, Levin, Sarbanes and Percy. Pat Moynihan could be a key; he originally supported the Administration's position, but now is reported to be wavering. As a former Ambassador to India with a good deal of credibility on this issue, Moynihan could make the difference. A high-level overture is needed here.

Church has told us that he wants floor action late next week. We will use the time to step up our individual contacts with Senators and to move quickly to gain commitments. Senator Cranston is working the other side with Senator Glenn, and we can be sure he is lining up Senators against the Administration. At this stage we are somewhat encouraged by the support we have received from some of the Senate's most influential members, but we expect a very close vote.

2. Somalia and Other Access Agreements

State Department officials will testify before Congressman Clarence Long's appropriations subcommittee on September 16 in support of our proposed FY '80 reprogramming of \$20 million in FMS credits for Somalia in the context of our overall Indian Ocean/Persian Gulf policy. We have also been asked to testify on other prospective access arrangements, such as with Egypt at Ras Banas. Congressman Solarz will probably be on hand to make the case against the reprogramming on the basis of apparent continuing Somali military presence in the Ogaden in violation of assurances given to us during the negotiations. If we are unable to satisfy the subcommittee that we are taking adequate measures on the troop question, the subcommittee is likely to vote against the reprogramming. In the meantime, they have asked us to delay.

Should the Committee vote against our proposal, we would then have to consider whether to move ahead anyway. A challenge to the Foreign Operations Subcommittee is likely to produce a major effort to deny the Administration any right to reprogram.

The SFRC also plans to hold a closed hearing on September 17 on the broader question of the U.S. strategic position in the Indian Ocean. The hearing would focus on the nature of the access agreements, the military requirements for the facilities, the nature of our security commitments, the consistency with on-going Middle East and African policy, and the Ethiopia/Somalia/Ogaden conundrum. State and DOD representatives will both testify. We do not expect a confrontational hearing; Senators will more likely wish to get on the record their views regarding the various access agreements and to warn of the potential dangers in the U.S.-Somali relationship.

3. PD 59

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee will hold a closed hearing Tuesday morning on PD 59 (nuclear targetting strategy) with Secretaries Muskie and Brown testifying. We anticipate extensive questioning not only on the policy implications of PD 59, but also on the roles of Defense and State in its formulation. The House already got into this issue, although to a very

limited extent, when State Department officials briefed Representative Zablocki's International Security Subcommittee last Wednesday. During that closed session, Congressmen Bingham, Winn, and Hamilton expressed strong concern regarding what they perceived as State's exclusion from the codification of such an important evolution in strategic policy.

4. House "Peace Through Strength" Resolution

During the next couple of weeks the State Department will be working with Congressman Zablocki in dealing with House Concurrent Resolution 306 calling for a national strategy of achieving peace through strength and, specifically, military superiority over the Soviet Union. The resolution was introduced by Congressman Stratton and now has 223 co-sponsors (133 Republicans, 90 Democrats). Zablocki has requested the Administration's views and intends to hold a hearing on the resolution later this month. Given the domestic as well as foreign policy implications of this issue, the State Department will coordinate closely with the Administration in developing our position.

5. Nominations

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee was unable again this week to get a committee vote on a number of nominations. Of particular interest was their failure to vote on Henry Precht (Mauritania), former head of the Iranian Task Force. The committee is tentatively scheduled to meet again on September 19. At that time we hope they will hear Francis Meehan (Poland) in addition to other nominations.

6. IMF

Both the IMF authorization and appropriations bills are scheduled for House floor action next week. While the opposition does not appear to be well-organized, we will be working hard to ensure passage of the legislation. Assuming passage next week, there is a chance that the legislation could be enacted before the recess. The Senate has already approved the authorization bill, and the appropriations bill could be moved quickly through the Senate Appropriations Committee.

7. Cuban-Haitian Refugees

On Thursday, the Senate Labor and Human Resources Subcommittee on Education is scheduled to mark up a House-passed bill providing assistance to state and local agencies for the education of Cuban and Haitian refugees.

As we predicted, problems have developed with the INS Efficiency bill, which contains a provision to enable INS to seize vessels carrying illegal aliens. As a result, we have altered our strategy and have decided to offer the vessel seizure provision as a separate bill. On Monday, House Judiciary Committee Chairman Rodino will introduce a separate bill amending Section 274. It will be taken up by the Judiciary Committee on Tuesday or Wednesday. He will then place it on the Suspension Calendar on Monday, September 22. We will arrange, after House passage, to have the bill held at the desk in the Senate, then taken up by unanimous consent and agreed to -- it can then be sent to the President for his signature.

This now appears to be the fastest route with the best chance of success. Chairman Rodino has agreed to cooperate in every way.

8. Intelligence Oversight Act of 1980

Although it is not yet clear whether the issue of oversight language will be resolved in the free-standing legislation or as part of the Intelligence Authorization, we are optimistic that the tangle will be resolved next week in a way satisfactory to us. This means that Congressman Zablocki will release his hold on the Foreign Aid Authorization conference.

9. Intelligence Identities Protection Act

This bill is on the calendar of the House Rules Committee for September 16. House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence Chairman Boland's request for a modified open rule is likely to be granted. Subject to a rule being granted, the bill is scheduled for House floor action on the 17th. S. 2216 is also scheduled for Senate Judiciary Committee markup that day.

10. Military Construction (MILCON)

On Wednesday the House passed the FY '81 Military Construction bill, having previously acted on the appropriations bill. On the Senate side, the authorization bill is scheduled for floor action on Tuesday and may be followed by the appropriations bill later in the week. In all cases, the mark came out somewhat less than our request, but overall the funding levels are reasonably satisfactory. One issue of concern is the start on binary gas funding which we did not request. Both House bills have included the project, whereas both Senate bills have not. However, on Wednesday the Senate Armed Services Committee voted 14 to 3 to offer a committee amendment to add the project when the bill comes to the floor next week.

Senators Pryor, Hart, Levin, and Hatfield are interested in fighting the committee amendment with one of their own which would delay funding pending a study. Those Senators are interested in knowing how much Administration support they can get in a floor fight. At this time, we are afraid that the committee amendment would carry. We want to avoid a lopsided vote on the floor which would make it more difficult for us to later adopt a fall-back position. We will assess our vote count again to decide how much political capital to expend; meanwhile, we are working on a fall-back provision which would give the Secretary of Defense discretion with respect to timing on committing the funds.

IV. MISCELLANEOUS

1. Controversial Legislation

Majority Leader Byrd has sent letters to all Senate committee chairmen urging them not to report out any controversial legislation because of the inability of the Senate to act on it during the short time remaining in the session.

Mayor Jackson
Thank you, ~~Maynard~~, and Governor Busbee:

When I was running for ^{*and serving as*} Governor, and later running for President, I promised myself that one of the first things I would do ^{*was to*} help get this new airport built.

If you wonder where I learned patience and restraint, it was at the Atlanta Airport. And if you wonder where I learned jogging, it was at the Atlanta Airport.

I cannot tell you how much I looked forward to this day -- and how proud I am to be the first passenger to depart from this magnificent new terminal.

I am proud for all Atlantans and all Georgians because the Hartsfield Atlanta International Airport has meant so much to us all. No city has more identified itself with its airport. And no airport symbolizes more the spirit of its city.

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Mayor Bill Hartsfield many years ago called Atlanta "the city too busy to hate." There was no better way to remember ^{him} ~~Bill~~ and his characterization of this city than with this airport named after him.

I want to talk to you today as leaders in a nation that has a purpose, a commitment to principle and to people, to each child of God, of whatever race or religion, ~~both within our borders and throughout the world.~~ ³ ~~both within our~~ ₃

The long bondage of American black people is over. The long bondage of all Americans to the evil of slavery and of ^{legally} enforced racial discrimination is over. We were freed at last to continue our march down the road to freedom together,

but we have not yet reached the Promised Land. ~~and~~, Like the children of Israel in the wilderness, we never thought it would take so long. As in the words of the old hymn [There is a Balm in Gilead], "sometimes we feel discouraged. Sometimes we think our work's in vain." 3 } 4

Twenty years ago, with ~~[a lot of]~~ help from many of you here today, the South and the nation were at long last ^{having to face} ~~facing~~ the great moral roadblock to our nation's march toward freedom. -

~~We were struggling at last~~ to make the principle that all human beings are equal in the sight of God a fact in our laws and in our lives ↙.

The South had been poor for 100 years. For too long, our politicians sought ^{public office} ~~security~~ by dividing the races -- especially poor whites and poor blacks -- turning us against each other instead of helping us work together to solve our common problems. 4 } 5

We had enough problems without that. We lacked the industrial

base to provide jobs and opportunity for our people. We lacked the skills, the machines, the technology. Too many of our babies died, black babies and white babies. Too many of our children were sick, too many of our people were hungry. Too many of our people, black and white, knew what it was to work long and hard without reward or hope. In their desperation they lashed out against each other, compounding their pain. 5 } 6

For too many of our young people, black and white the only way out was to get out. The chief export of our region was its young people.

There is only one way to destroy forever the seeds of hatred and fear. We must provide *justice and equal* opportunities for every Southerner, for every American -- white, black, Hispanic, Asian-American, native American, male, female -- everybody.

There are three main things we must do to solve our economic problems: We must end the drain of importing foreign



So he went down to City Hall to register. An annoyed clerk directed him to a special elevator marked "Colored", but it was not running. The staircase to the registrar's office was marked "Whites only." So was the only ~~working~~ elevator. *That worked.*

That worked.

He was determined to find a way to get up to the registrar's office. He came back ~~day~~ ^{time} after ~~day~~ ^{time} until finally one day the elevator marked "Colored" was working. He was over the first hurdle. Then ^{They told him} ~~he learned~~ about the poll tax. Some black people were required to pay back taxes amounting to hundreds of dollars for all their ancestors who had lived in the county. If they got past that hurdle, they were required to take a so-called literacy test -- actually a complicated test on government and history and the Constitution. Like that elevator, the test was for blacks only. 18 19

"Maybe that part of it was a strange blessing, because some blacks learned a lot about government that way," he recalls.

We still had a similar test when I was elected to the Georgia Senate. ^{one of} ~~the~~ first speech^s I ever made in the Legislature was a call for the abolition of that unfair test.

Daddy King led a voter registration march to Atlanta's

City Hall in 1935. And he demonstrated alone against that discriminatory elevator until the signs were finally taken down.

"Knowing I could vote was one of the most meaningful things in my young life," he writes. He did not dream then that someday cities like Atlanta and Birmingham and Los Angeles and Detroit would have black mayors, that a black Southerner -- a preacher at that -- would someday represent this nation



Startex Textile Mill Remarks

Mitchell Allen [exec. v.p., Spartan Mills], Charles
Davis [plant manager]:

Thank you for inviting me and for the tour of your plant.

Anybody who drives down I-85 knows that this area is
booming with industry -- that this is the center of America's
textile industry.

I hear plenty about textiles in Washington from your
elected officials -- Governor Dick Riley, Senator Fritz
Hollings, Congressman Butler Derrick, Congressman Ken Holland,
and State Senator Liz Patterson.

I am very impressed by your plant. Mitchell Allen tells
me that your new card room has the most modern equipment


