



You already have seen the most likely questions under the first tab. There are new Q & A's updated today on Israel and the U.N., defectors in our Ethiopian and Afghanistan Embassies, Somoza's death, El Salvador, Iran, Libya, OPEC, and Strategic Balance.

QUESTIONS - September 18, 1980

1. Have you agreed to the principle of an inquiry committee to look into U.S. relations with the late shah? What would be the function of such a commission? Is this a revival of the UN commission of earlier this year?

What other Iranian demands is the United States willing to accept?
2. You seemed to change your assessment of the situation in Iran from Monday to Tuesday. What happened to change your assessment? Did you talk to Secretary Muskie during that time about your seeming differences in assessment of the current developments in Iran? What is your assessment now?
3. Why shouldn't your administration's handling of the hostage crisis be a campaign issue? Aren't the American people entitled to a full discussion of that question as they try to assess your record and the potential foreign policy actions of your opponents?
4. What do you have to say about former ambassador Sullivan's attack on how your administration, and particularly Dr. Brzezinski, handled the situation in Iran at the time of the fall of the shah?
5. Do you think you have won on the debate issue?
6. Are you going to watch the Sunday Reagan-Anderson debate? Are you pleased that the League of Women Voters has decided not to have an empty chair on the stage?
7. Why did you say in Atlanta that you did not think there would be a one-on-one debate, when all along your advisors and campaign officials have said that they thought there would be?

8. What is your response to critics who say the tone of this campaign has sunk to new lows, and who accuse you of labeling Governor Reagan as a racist?

9. Do you think the controversy over your brother's ties to Libya has now come to an end? Are you satisfied that all the members of your staff behaved properly in their handling of this matter?

Do you think the Senate was justified in making its inquiry into this question?

10. Why did you allow Secretary Brown to publicly reveal the existence of the Stealth project? Did you know beforehand he was going to do that?

Would you have allowed the project to be revealed if the strength of the administration's defense record had not been made a campaign issue?

Aren't you politicizing the Pentagon to an unprecedented degree?

11. This is your first news conference since August 4, and the August one was the first since April 29. Why are you holding so few news conferences?

12. Do you think you can win New York with John Anderson and Jacob Javits on the Liberal party line of the ballot there? Where else in the country can you realistically pick up the electoral votes to offset a loss in New York?

13. You have criticized Governor Reagan for not initially supporting the 1964 Civil Rights Act. What was your position on it in 1964?



I. PURPOSE

To greet 130 top officials of the Operating Engineers Union--President J. C. Turner, Secretary-Treasurer Frank Hanley, 11 Vice Presidents, and approximately 110 local union business managers.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS, AND PRESS PLAN

A. Background: The 420,000 member Operating Engineers is primarily, but not entirely a construction workers union. About 320,000 of its members operate heavy equipment at large construction projects and some coal mines. Another 100,000 operate heating and air conditioning in large buildings. The OE has members in all 50 states, especially in New York, Pennsylvania, California, Ohio, Illinois, Florida, Alabama and Mississippi. You recently appointed J. C. Turner to serve on the White House Coal Advisory Council. Turner flew to Iowa before the Iowa caucus to endorse you. The Operating Engineers are experiencing higher than average unemployment right now than presently exists in the Building Trades as a whole.

Its New York members are particularly interested in the Westway project. The OE are strong supporters of OSHA and Davis Bacon and appreciate your support on these issues. OE members are in favor of a strong national defense, endorsed the actions you took in response to Soviet aggression in Afghanistan, and believe construction of the MX missile would create about 20,000 new jobs.

III. TALKING POINTS

--I am delighted to have this chance to meet with my good friend Jay Turner, your Secretary-Treasurer, Frank Hanley, and all of you in the Operating Engineers.

--I have come to know Jay Turner well these last few years. He's a man I feel I can turn to for good advice, not just on labor issues, but on a broad range of concerns facing our nation. Just this week, I was proud to announce that I have asked Jay to serve on the White House Coal Advisory Council.

--As you know, before the Iowa caucus, Jay personally flew to Iowa to endorse my candidacy. I will always be grateful to Jay and to all of you for the efforts you have made on my behalf.

--This is probably the most critical election campaign in recent times. The American people will decide in November, not just between two candidates or even between two parties. What is at stake are two totally different paths to our nation's future.

--My Republican opponent is committed to halting or even repealing the whole agenda of progress that the Democratic Party and the labor movement have achieved and are trying to achieve in this country. My Republican opponent fought against Medicare; has said Social Security ought to be voluntary; opposes virtually all federal public works construction projects.

--You can see that sharp difference clearly on the labor issues that are so vital to your members. My Republican opponent wants to repeal Davis-Bacon wage protections. You and I have stood together 9 different times these past 3½ years to prevent any congressional efforts to weaken Davis-Bacon. I promise you for the next 4 years I will resist any effort to weaken Davis-Bacon.

--My Republican opponent wants to gut the OSHA protections your members depend on to protect their health and safety on the job. We have made a good start together in strengthening OSHA protections at the most dangerous worksites. I will continue to stand with the Operating Engineers against the efforts underway in the Congress to weaken OSHA protections.

--With your help, we have made an important start in reversing our nation's dangerous dependence on foreign oil. We have in place now the first national energy program in our nation's history. We have created a new synthetic fuels corporation, and I have asked Lane Kirkland to serve on its Board. With our windfall profits tax, we will be constructing an entirely new synthetic fuels industry in our country over the next decade. It will product thousands of new jobs.

--My Republican opponent wants to give the entire windfall profits tax back to the oil companies, and let the oil industry decide our energy future. I say the energy future of our nation should be decided by all Americans--not just the oil companies. With your help we are going to rebuild the energy foundation of our country, and protect our independence and our economy.

--We have proposed a new program to revitalize our economy. In steel, auto, transportation and other industries we are rebuilding our nation's industrial base to stimulate investment, new productivity, and create hundreds of thousands of new jobs.

--I know that one of the transportation problems you are most concerned about is Westway in New York. I am concerned also. I want to work with you, Governor Carey, and Mayor Koch to iron out the problems you are facing. As you know, there are both state and federal laws which govern Westway's approval. I want you to know that I will not allow the federal government to be a bottleneck to Westway, and I will not permit unnecessary delays in this project.

--Around the world, we have tried to keep America strong, both militarily and morally. We have reversed nearly 8 years of decline in defense spending under the Republicans, and I am determined to keep America's defenses second to none.

--I had to take some strong measures when the Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan. My Republican opponent opposed my grain embargo, draft registration, and waffled on the Olympics boycott. I am proud that the Executive Council of the Operating Engineers unanimously voted to support the action I took.

--In the Middle East, and elsewhere, we have tried to make America a force for peace, and for all peoples, a force for human rights.

--Most of all, I have tried to live up to the values that you and I share. I want our country to be compassionate, to reach out to all our citizens, to be a force for peace and justice throughout the world. I am confident that most Americans share those same hopes and dreams. With your help, I know we will build that kind of future together.

SUBJECT : Japanese Automotive Imports

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Our Embassy in Tokyo has confirmed that MITI Minister Tanaka has now made his statement to the press announcing the exercise of "prudence and caution" by Japanese automotive producers in their exports to the U.S. market. The Japanese have avoided using the words "voluntary export restraints" because of legal concerns, and we should avoid using them also.

In the judgment of our Economic Minister in Tokyo, this will represent up to 200,000 fewer units this year than if they had continued at the same pace set in the first eight months of 1980. He does not believe this would have happened if the Japanese government view had not shifted, although the companies for their own reasons will likely contend their actions are simply in response to changing market conditions. Tanaka also said that the level of Japanese exports for the last quarter of this year would be at the same level or slightly less than during the same period last year.

This is strictly a unilateral Japanese action since we have engaged in no negotiations on this subject with them. This is important to remember also for legal reasons.

Our Economic Minister in Tokyo thinks the following press statement by you would be appropriate:

"The Japanese government has also shown increased sensitivity to our automotive problems with the announcement by MITI Minister Tanaka favoring prudence and caution in their exports to the United States. We discussed the automotive situation during our Venice Summit Conference, and I hope their new sensitivity will be of benefit during our industry's difficult transition to smaller, more fuel-efficient cars."

The Vice President also thinks it would be useful if you would give a boost to the new U.S. smaller cars with something like the following:

"I am also pleased with reports of the new lines of smaller cars being introduced in a few days by our American automakers. I understand these are high quality products with big mileage improvements and good safety standards. I hope to visit an auto plant soon to see these new lines firsthand and how they are being produced."



President's Meeting on EDA Legislation

The Administration's legislation to increase the authority and funding for the Economic Development Administration has reached a critical point in the legislative process. The House-Senate Conferees have reached agreement on most major issues but remain deadlocked on the critical question of whether to authorize a \$2 billion public works program. The House supports such a provision. The Senate and the Administration strongly oppose it. The EDA legislation is a high legislative priority of the Administration for several reasons: First, it is the major bill pending in Congress that will create jobs in the economically troubled regions of our country, particularly in the industrial Midwest and the Mid-Atlantic States. Second, it is critical to the implementation of the President's industrial revitalization program which was announced yesterday. That policy involves a \$2 billion increase in funding for EDA, which is dependent on passage of the legislation. Finally, EDA is the major discretionary program that we can use to solve substantially thorny problems (e.g., Mahwah, N.J., Knoxville Exposition, Youngstown Steel, etc.).

We strongly recommend that the President drop-by a meeting of the Conference leadership, which we have scheduled in the Roosevelt Room at 9 a.m. this Thursday (September 4), to emphasize the importance of passing the EDA bill this year and to suggest a compromise to break the Conference deadlock.

Early action is required to give the Conferees time to complete their work before Congress recesses for the election. Participants in the meeting should include:

Enclosed is a proposed proclamation for National Day of Prayer.

The draft proclamation was prepared in the White House Speechwriters office and forwarded to us by Bob Maddox. It has been retyped in this office solely as to form.

The proposed proclamation is based upon a joint resolution of the Congress approved April 17, 1952 (36 U.S.C. 185; 66 Stat. 64) which called upon the President to set aside a suitable day each year, other than a Sunday, as a National Day of Prayer.

Until recently National Day of Prayer was traditionally observed on the third Wednesday in October. However, in recent years the date has varied so that the observance would not conflict with the other many observances already scheduled for the month of October. October 6 has been set aside this year for this particular observance.

The proposed proclamation has the approval of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget.

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BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A PROCLAMATION

Our Nation's current electoral process is both testimony and example of the power of free men and women to govern themselves. Our forebears, drawing from a faith in the people rooted in a firm faith in God, launched this grand experiment in responsible self-government. In the days ahead, no matter what our individual political convictions, we can all be grateful for the honor and integrity of this noble process.

Without trying to impose our will on other nations, let us continue to hold high the torch of liberty and democracy that has illumined our land. Laying aside arrogance and false pride, let us continue to urge self-determination and human rights as the best way for peoples everywhere to realize their own full destiny.

Let us pray that freedom, in all its manifestations, may be the reality of the present and the wave of the future. Let us pray that people everywhere will be free -- free even to make their own mistakes as they struggle to build a life of material security and spiritual satisfaction.

As we pray, let us never forget the American citizens in Iran who remain hostages in fundamental violation of the teachings of the world's religions. Let us also pray that harmony and stability will come to the people of Iran, leading both to the safe return of our brothers and sisters and to a better life for all in that troubled land.

Recognizing our need for prayer, the Congress, by Joint Resolution, approved April 17, 1952 (36 U.S.C. 169h; 66 Stat. 64), has called upon the President to set aside a suitable day each year as a National Day of Prayer.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JIMMY CARTER, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim Monday, October 6, 1980, as a National Day of Prayer. I further ask that all who so desire make this a Day of Fast as well. On that day, I ask Americans to join me in thanksgiving to God for His blessings and in earnest prayer to Him for His protection in the year ahead. Finally, may He grant freedom to all unjustly held captive, and may He grant us His vision of a world at peace.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-second day of September, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eighty, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and fifth.
