SUBJECT: Strategic Petroleum Reserve

There is increasing Congressional pressure to fill the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) at a rate faster than the 100,000 barrel per day average mandated in the Energy Security Act. On Friday, Senator Dole introduced legislation which he plans on attaching to an appropriations bill which would mandate a fill rate of 300,000 barrels per day. Without some further action on our part, this amendment is likely to enjoy broad, bi-partisan support.

In view of these developments, this memorandum provides an SPR update as well as a series of recommendations on how best to proceed.

Some SPR fill has now started. The first tanker began offloading oil at Nederland, Texas, on Monday, September 22nd. As we have previously indicated to the Saudis and others, the oil now going into the SPR is being obtained in exchange for oil from the Naval Petroleum Reserve (NPR). On September 3 we received bids for approximately 36,500,000 barrels of NPR exchange oil. We are now in a position to close negotiations on about 27,000,000 barrels of this oil and could have negotiations on the remainder completed by October 1st.

Because the companies exchanging their oil for NPR oil want to reduce their present high inventories, the companies have offered to deliver most of their oil between now and the end of the year in exchange for NPR oil to be delivered over most of 1981. The proposed contracts for the first 27,000,000 barrels would therefore imply an initial rate of fill, between now and the end of the year, approaching 300,000 barrels per day. We still, however, could change the annual average fill rate to meet a different goal if we should so choose.

I would recommend that we go ahead with this first 27 million barrels on an accelerated fill basis and complete negotiations for the additional 9.5 million barrels if exchanges can be arranged on reasonable terms. In the emotionally charged atmosphere brought on by the Iran-Iraq War, I do not believe we can afford to do otherwise. Taking into account early deliveries,

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I would recommend a fill rate of not more than approximately 300,000 barrels per day in the coming months. This is still consistent with an average fill rate of 170,000 barrels per day--the total average of Elk Hills NPR production--over a longer period of time. This approach would maintain our flexibility for changing the average fill rate after the turn of the year in a way that would not affect the fact that our current purchases are linked to NPR production. This approach is acceptable to Dick Cooper, Henry Owen, and Stu Eizenstat.

If it is acceptable to you, I intend to inform Congress of these plans. It could be helpful in defeating Senator Dole's amendment and our efforts to maintain flexibility in meeting SPRO fill rate decisions.

Either I or Ambassador West will also be in touch with Zaki Yamani to stress the fact that we are continuing to fill with only NPR oil on an accelerated exchange basis.

SUBJECT: Significant Actions, Secretary and Deputy Secretary of Defense (September 20-26, 1980)

TITAN II Accident Hearing: Air Force Secretary Hans Mark appeared Wednesday before Chairman Price and the HASC to brief on the Arkansas accident, and to outline actions being taken, including convening Accident Investigation and Weapon System Safety Review Boards. (The Board reports will take one and two months respectively.) Hans explained that the accident was unrelated to the system's age. He also told the Committee that although eventually we would want to replace TITAN II, there are no near-term replacement options earlier than the MX; any replacement would take five or six years to field.

Additional hearings may be held after the Accident Investigation Board Report is completed. (S)

Visit of Icelandic Foreign Minister: Olafur Johannesson, Ed Muskie's guest here on a ten-day visit, met with Graham this morning. (In the absence of an Icelandic Defense establishment, Johannesson functions as a defense minister in our bilateral and NATO relations.) Our purpose was to reassure him that Iceland remains as important to the defense of NATO as ever. On Monday, Johannesson will visit Admiral Train in Norfolk, where he will be briefed on the activities of the CINCLANT and SACLANT headquarters located there, and will tour one of our new frigates. He departs Norfolk Wednesday for New York and the U.N. General Assembly meeting. (C)

FRG Defense Cooperation Symposium: At our invitation, the FRG Ministry of Defense sent a briefing team to the U.S. early this month to describe German acquisition organization, policies, and practices to U.S. industry. This was a landmark event: Germany is the first NATO ally to come to the U.S. to brief American industry on business opportunities in their country under reciprocal procurement Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs). The German presentations were frank and informative, and several times they emphatically stressed their commitment to an open defense market and the "competition" objectives of the general MOU. Such meetings can help convince U.S. industry that the MOUs are, in fact, a two-way street, and not just a case of DoD letting European industry into the U.S. defense market. We are planning a follow-on session of U.S. and German industry in Munich during mid-November. (U)

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Update on Physical Fitness in the Armed Services: Since my last update to you on physical fitness in June, DoD has received the final report from the Physical Fitness Symposium. (This report will provide the agenda for the efforts of a DoD-appointed Joint Services Study Group that commences work on October 15.) This group will be responsible for consolidating physical fitness standards into a Department-wide Directive. It will also examine the feasibility of implementing the remaining symposium recommendations. The expected completion date of the study group's efforts is the end of January. (U)

China Trip: Bill Perry returned over the weekend from a very successful two-week trip to China. You may be interested in some of his assessments:

- The Chinese educational base was "shattered" by the cultural revolution.
- Chinese research institutes are 10-20 years behind their Western counterparts, and their design institutes cannot produce viable military designs for near-term production. Consequently, Chinese factories are still mass-producing Soviet 1950s-vintage weapons (BADGER bombers, T-54 tanks, etc.).
- Using Egypt as a benchmark, Chinese defense industry is more capable and covers a broader base than that of the Egyptians. (The larger Chinese defense budget--approximately \$12 billion--accounts for some of the difference in the scale of the production effort.)

Media Reports: The current New York Times series on "Defense: Is the U.S. Prepared?" is a sign that national security continues to be potentially a principal issue of the campaign. Growing interest in and support for defense is not, however, simply a product of campaign reporting, as revealed by the graph in last Sunday's Times: over the last ten years (since mid-1969), the number of those polled who felt we were spending too little on defense rose from 8% to 49%; those who felt we were spending too much fell from 52% to 14%. (Those who answered "about right" also dropped, from 31% to 24%.)

I believe the Times series, which attempts to evaluate our preparedness and provide a net assessment of the balance today (together with similar articles, such as those appearing recently in The Los Angeles Times) and the Iraqi-Iranian War will heighten Congressional and public awareness of military readiness and result in continued support this year and next for real defense spending increases. (U)

FY82 Security Assistance Program: I wrote Jim McIntyre today to urge that we demonstrate, in the FY82 Security Assistance Program, our continued strong commitment to the security of our allies and friends. Specifically, I believe we need to (1) preserve MAP for those few countries (e.g., Turkey, Portugal, Liberia and the Sudan) whose economies cannot afford anything other than grant military assistance, (2) fund FY82 IMET at the FY76 level, in terms of purchasing power--twice the FY81 level--and, (3) adopt modestly higher FMS credit and ESF programs than currently proposed by State. Except for these increases, I believe the program levels recommended by State will give us the necessary resources to meet the challenges we--and our partners--face. (C)

Egyptian Procurement of Italian Helicopters: On September 15, Egypt signed a \$143 million contract with Agusta of Italy for the procurement of 15 CH-47C helicopters (originally built for Iran), and associated support equipment, spare parts, and factory support.

Both parties are pleased with the final deal: Egypt will have a much-needed, new heavy lift helicopter squadron early in 1981; Italian industry has been relieved of the substantial financial burden caused by the U.S. embargo of defense equipment shipments to Iran. Politically, the Egyptians will benefit by showing the first new source of foreign credits since the cutoff of Arab aid in early 1979. The Italians feel we have worked hard to honor a USG commitment; the Egyptians are also pleased with the USG role--their bilateral negotiations with the Italians for the helicopters had failed because agreement could not be reached on contract terms and total cost of the program. (U)

Maybank Amendment: As you know, the House recently adopted an amendment that eliminated the Maybank Amendment from the FY81 Appropriation Bill. In mid-September I forwarded a memorandum to you, setting forth DoD's views on Maybank, which is being staffed in OMB and the Domestic Policy Staff. This week John Stennis sent me a letter expressing his concern about the House action, and asking that we provide information for a Senate Armed Services Committee analysis of its potential

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impact. This is a very controversial issue that the Senate will have to confront when it returns from the election recess. I strongly recommend that the Administration not make a final decision, or publicly anticipate a position, on Maybank until the Congress returns. (U)

Subject: Possible Challenge to Israeli Representation in the General Assembly

This is in response to your request for a report on developments with regard to a possible attempt to deny Israel's right to participate in the General Assembly.

The Arab diplomatic campaign against Israel in the UN has reached the point where the Arabs and their Islamic allies are clearly considering a challenge to Israel's credentials. Article 9 provides that the General Assembly shall consist "of all UN members." Thus, action to expel Israel from the General Assembly without Security Council recommendation would be illegal. Under Articles 5 and 6 of the UN Charter, a member can only be expelled or suspended on the recommendation of the Security Council, and such action is subject to veto.

However, South Africa was illegally (but effectively) barred from participating in the Assembly in 1974, and for the first time in several years there is talk of applying this precedent (however unlawful it is) to Israel. The first overt move in this direction came at the August Special Session of the General Assembly on Development when the Arabs circulated a letter referring to their "non-acknowledgement" of Israel's credentials but took no further action. On September 20 Islamic Foreign Ministers meeting in Morocco made a threat to this effect, the 15th of 18 "decisions" adopted at the meeting. More recently, at the UNESCO meeting in Belgrade, Iraq and a number of other states directly challenged the credentials of the Israeli delegation on the grounds that they were signed at Jerusalem, arguing that to accept them would be to recognize that Jerusalem is Israel's capital. The Arabs agreed to drop the challenge without a vote, however, after a compromise was reached allowing the credentials to be accepted by consensus, with a statement to the effect that this action did not constitute recognition of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel.

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At the General Assembly itself there is no sign so far of an Arab campaign to seek support for a serious credentials challenge, and we do not believe a decision has been made. Arab Foreign Ministers are scheduled to meet on September 29 in New York, and may well make a decision at that time.

On September 21, Israel's credentials were routinely approved without debate by the nine member UNGA credentials committee, together with those of the Afghan regime and Democratic Kampuchea. The next step is for the General Assembly plenary to vote on the report of the credentials committee. We are working behind the scenes with Assembly President Von Wechmar of West Germany to urge that he bring the committee's report to a vote as soon as possible in the session. This action could only be overturned later in the session by a two-thirds majority (since reconsideration of an adopted resolution requires a two-thirds vote), which the Arabs would find difficult if not impossible to achieve.

For the time being, Don McHenry believes the best strategy is to keep closely on top of the situation and make sure that all concerned are aware that a challenge would be a matter of the utmost gravity. In dealing successfully with the UNESCO challenge, we undertook an urgent series of strong demarches around the world saying that we would have to reconsider our participation in UNESCO if Israel were thrown out. This has made clear in capitals the strength of our feeling about attacks on Israel's right to sit in international bodies.

If there are any signs of momentum developing towards a challenge after the September 29 meeting, we believe our response should be calibrated to deter the threat. As an initial response we should inform selected non-aligned, Islamic, and Arab Foreign Ministers that such an action will violate the Charter, threaten the principle of universal membership on which the General Assembly is based, and gravely undermine the UN as an institution. This should probably be done by the Secretary. We should urge the Europeans to make a coordinated approach at the Foreign Minister level.

A serious challenge would create a confrontation unprecedented at the UN since the issue of Chinese representation of the 60's, one potentially even more dangerous to the viability and survival of the UN as an institution. If a challenge were successful and Israel were forced to leave the Assembly, the repercussions would probably seriously damage the entire UN system. The major decision we would face, of course, would be whether to withdraw ourselves from participation in the General Assembly in protest over the illegal expulsion of Israel, seeking to persuade our allies to follow suit. We could also consider withholding our assessed contribution to the UN budget, although this is a treaty obligation, and we could suspend our contribution to specialized agencies (e.g., UNESCO, UNDP, UNICEF). An aroused public opinion and Congress would almost certainly find anything less than a total withdrawal from the General Assembly an insufficient response.

SUBJECT: FIRST CIRCUIT

Over the weekend the following developments occurred:

1. The Vice President tried to telephone Senator Kennedy Friday afternoon. Senator Kennedy made one unsuccessful effort to return the call and then went off on a weekend cruise. His office said he would return the call Sunday evening.
2. I then talked to Rick Burke to express my concern that Sunday evening might be too late. Burke said there was no longer any urgency because Senator Kennedy and his staff had concluded, on further reflection, that any effort to bypass the Commission process would be unwise.
3. Senator Kennedy returned the Vice President's call this morning. The Vice President made clear that while we thought our plan was the best one, we would nominate and seek confirmation before the recess if he felt strongly about it. Senator Kennedy said that after further reflection he had changed his mind and thought it was best to defer the nomination until after the recess and the completion of the Commission process.

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GUIDELINES CONCERNING OFFICIAL DEALINGS WITH
MEMBERS OF THE PRESIDENT'S FAMILY

The purpose of these guidelines is to caution government employees against dealing with members of the President's family in ways that create either the reality or the appearance of impropriety.

The primary responsibility to avoid impropriety of course rests on the President and the members of his family. The President has cautioned members of his family not only to observe these guidelines, but also not to place government employees in a position where the appearance of impropriety can occur.

There are three situations which need to be distinguished:

First are the cases where a member of the President's family is performing the duties or exercising the rights of any other citizen. The payment of taxes, military service, and entitlements to Social Security, agricultural, or educational benefits are typical examples. In all such cases, members of the President's family are to be treated the same way as anyone else. They are to seek no special favor, nor are they to be granted any.

Second are the cases where the President calls on a member of his family to act as his official representative at a ceremony, function or meeting in the United States or abroad. In such cases, government employees should afford the designated members of the President's family the courtesies and amenities appropriate to his or her official status and to the occasion - no more, no less.

When members of the President's family take personal trips or where the government has information that their personal security may be threatened, they should be accorded the same treatment and protection as any other public figure.

Third are the cases in which a member of the President's family is seeking to do business with the government on his or her own behalf or to act as an agent for another person, firm or government seeking to do business with our government. Examples are the discretionary award of government contracts and the discretionary granting of valuable licenses.

In this third class of cases, there is a strong presumption against such dealings with a family member. Even though the family member's proposal or request may be entirely meritorious, and the government employee's response is the same as it would be regardless of the family relationship, many will believe, without any other evidence, that the government's response was influenced by the family member's status as such. While it could be argued that members of the President's family have the same right as any other citizen to have the government engage in discretionary dealings with them, this is a right that is best relinquished during the President's incumbency. The President has therefore cautioned family members from making such proposals or requests, and urges all government employees not only to reject all such proposals and requests, but to report their occurrence to the head of the department or agency, who should advise the Counsel for the President.

In extraordinary cases where the responsible employee believes the proposal or request should be approved - for example when the family member's business relationship with the Government predates the President's incumbency and the relationship has not been exploited during his incumbency - the approval of the department or agency head shall first be obtained.

Government employees should also apply a strong presumption against the discretionary disclosure to family members of information of potential economic value about existing or planned government policies or actions that is not generally available to the public.

These guidelines apply only to family members. They do not apply to any business entity with which a family member may be associated, so long as the family member does not participate in any way, and the family member's association is not otherwise exploited, in the entity's dealings with the government.

For purposes of these guidelines, the President's family consists of the President's parents, brothers, sisters and children, and the spouses of his brothers, sisters and children.

SUBJECT: ANNOUNCEMENT OF STEEL PROGRAM

As we discussed, here is the proposed schedule for the announcement of the Steel Program:

- Monday, September 29 -- Buffet and briefing for members of Congress concerned about Steel, and the business and labor members of the Steel Tripartite Committee plus about 12 other steel chief executives and labor leaders. Gretchen Poston advises that she can begin the Buffet at 6:30 p.m. You would speak briefly on economic revitalization and the steel program and then Secretary Klutznick, Ray Marshall, Doug Costle and Stu Eizenstat would conduct the briefing and answer questions.
- Tuesday, September 30 -- announcement of Steel Program Room 450, OEOB. With the members of the Steel Tripartite Committee and four or five key steel Congressmen present, you would announce the Steel Program in a statement before the White House Press Corps augmented by press representatives from steel cities, trade publications and labor publications. After you make your remarks and depart, Secretary Klutznick will conduct a briefing for the press. Phil Wise has tentatively scheduled this for 10:00 a.m.

Other activities around the announcement include distribution of fact sheets and talking points to the Hill and on Wednesday sending surrogates to key steel cities for meetings with business, labor and local government and for press activities. We are also working on covering the morning shows, MacNeil-Lehrer and other related press opportunities.

According to Billy's deposition testimony, Kikhia asked him to convey to you his apologies if Kikhia's chance meeting with John White had caused any embarrassment to the Administration. Billy Carter was asked in his Deposition whether he conveyed Kikhia's message to you. Do you recall any discussion with Billy concerning this matter? If so, I'd appreciate your informing me of the substance of the conversation.


Dear Mr. Moses:

As requested by Mr. Cardozo, we are transmitting herewith a copy of the deposition of Billy Carter taken September 24. One additional question arises from this transcript, which we received only today. At page 46 Mr. Carter testifies as follows about a conversation with Ambassador Kikhia that occurred on or about October 24, 1979:

It was just a general conversation with Ambassador Kikhia. He was upset about an article that appeared -- I think it was a William Safire article -- connecting him and John White at a meeting in Washington. He was extremely upset it might embarrass Mr. White. He wanted me to convey to the President, if I would, that he would apologize if it embarrassed the Administration. He said it was a chance meeting at some terrace motel in Washington. It was a chance meeting. He showed me a copy of the article, which is the first time I was aware of it.

We request that you inquire of the President whether Billy Carter conveyed Ambassador Kikhia's statement to the President or otherwise discussed the matter with the President, and, if so, we request the President's recollection of his conversation with Billy Carter on that subject.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

SUBJECT: TOSCO's Request for a Loan Guarantee

I have checked into the request that Morton Winston, President of TOSCO, made to you in California concerning their application to DOE for a loan guarantee. At my request, DOE has formally notified TOSCO that DOE will expedite its competitive solicitation procedures for the available synthetic fuels funds. DOE is not free under its regulations to award a contract to TOSCO without such competitive procedures, as TOSCO had requested, but at least TOSCO will get a response several months ahead of the original DOE schedule.

TOSCO owns 40% of the proposed Colony Development Oil Shale Project in Colorado; Exxon owns the other 60% interest. This is a promising project which is several months ahead of most of the other potential shale producers. TOSCO does not have the capital to put up its full share, however, and is seeking a loan guarantee of \$1.3 billion from DOE.

DOE has \$3 billion to award loan guarantees for synthetic fuels projects on an interim basis, before the Synthetic Fuels Corporation is fully operational. They will issue their solicitation for bids within the next week for the full \$3 billion. TOSCO has made two proposals to DOE:

- (1) That TOSCO receive \$1.3 billion from this \$3 billion appropriation before it was opened to competition for other projects. DOE refused because this procedure would have been a clear violation of the statute.

- (2) That since TOSCO's proposal was ready for immediate construction, it be considered and decided as soon as the request for solicitations was issued, without waiting to see what other projects applied before the deadline. Again, DOE refused because this would not be a real "competitive selection process" as required by the statute.

DOE has agreed to shorten the application period to 30 days (from the original 90 days), however, so that TOSCO will have as quick an answer as possible within the competitive selection process.
