Following is the text of John Trattner's announcement on the Christopher mission yesterday:

"Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher and Minister of Foreign Affairs Benyahia of Algeria, and their respective delegations, held intensive and useful discussions on November 10 and 11 concerning the U.S. response to the November 2 resolution of the Iranian parliament.

"The government of Algeria has agreed to serve as the intermediary for the response of the United States and will arrange for its prompt transmission to the government of Iran.

"During the meeting, Mr. Christopher and the American delegation described the background of the U.S. response and explained the implementation of the legal and financial procedures which would be involved.

"Mr. Christopher and the U.S. delegation departed Algiers for Washington the evening of November 11."

ON THE LAME DUCK SESSION

SINCE YOU ARE MEETING WITH THE LEADERSHIP TOMORROW MORNING AND BAKER IN THE AFTERNOON, YOU MAY WANT TO BE SOMEWHAT RETICENT ABOUT FLAT PRONOUNCEMENTS.

I WOULD STRESS YOUR HOPE THAT THE SPIRIT OF COOPERATION AND OF PLACING THE NATIONAL INTEREST ABOVE PARTISAN CONSIDERATIONS THAT PREVAILS IN THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH WILL ALSO BE REFLECTED IN THE CONGRESS. THERE ARE SOME IMPORTANT AREAS OF WORK THAT NEED TO BE COMPLETED AND ARE NOT PARTISAN IN NATURE -- THE SECOND BUDGET RESOLUTION, THE APPROPRIATIONS BILLS, AND THE ALASKA LANDS LEGISLATION FOR EXAMPLE. THERE MAY BE OTHERS BUT THESE COME IMMEDIATELY TO MIND. THEY ARE NEAR TO COMPLETION AND OUGHT TO BE FINISHED THIS YEAR. (STU SUGGESTS MENTIONING THE YOUTH BILL AND CHAPS. CONGRESSIONAL LIAISON SAYS WE WON'T GET EITHER OF THESE TWO AND SUGGESTS NOT SETTING OURSELVES UP FOR INEVITABLE FAILURE.)

YOU MAY WANT TO HEDGE A LITTLE ON THE TAX BILL IN DEFERENCE TO THE LEADERSHIP BREAKFAST AND YOUR MEETING WITH BAKER TOMORROW

AFTERNOON. HOWEVER, YOU CERTAINLY DO NOT WANT TO BE SO CAREFUL THAT YOU LEAVE THE IMPRESSION THAT YOUR POSTURE IS DIFFERENT FROM WHAT YOU TOLD BYRD.

ONE APPROACH IS TO ADOPT THE "VERY CONCERNED ABOUT THE IDEA" POSTURE AND THEN PROCEED TO LIST YOUR CONCERNS:

- UNLIKELY TO GET THE DELIBERATE, CAREFUL CONSIDERATION SUCH IMPORTANT LEGISLATION SHOULD RECEIVE.
  - COULD VERY WELL BOG DOWN THE CONGRESS AND PREVENT PROGRESS ON THE MATTERS THAT NEED TO BE GOTTEN OUT OF THE WAY (SEE ABOVE).
  - YOU WOULD THINK THAT THE CONGRESS AND THE NEW ADMINISTRATION MIGHT WANT TO GIVE SERIOUS CONSIDERATION TO A BILL THAT IS MORE ORIENTED TOWARD INVESTMENT AND PRODUCTION AND LESS TOWARD IMMEDIATE CONSUMPTION THAN THE SENATE BILL.
- YOU CAN ALSO POINT OUT THAT IT DOES NOT APPEAR THAT

THE REPUBLICANS HAVE MADE A CLEAR DECISION ON HOW OR WHEN THEY

WANT TO PROCEED, AND YOU HOPE THEY WILL DECIDE NOT TO TRY TO  
MOVE A TAX BILL THIS SESSION.

CSCE - MADRID

Question: What is the status of the Madrid Meeting?

Answer: The CSCE Review Meeting in Madrid entered its second day today without agreement on agenda or modalities. Nevertheless on an ad hoc/<sup>basis</sup>the 35 participants agreed to meet in plenary session later today. At that time we expect opening statements to be given by the heads of delegation. These opening statements will then continue through Saturday while work goes forward on the agenda for the remainder of the meeting. Our strong view continues to be that this agenda must insure sufficient time for implementation review and in particular review of how human rights obligations have been implemented. The Soviet delegation, virtually alone, has opposed this, leading to the present impasse. Most participants agree with our position and we trust the Soviets will in the end agree to a reasonable compromise which will <sup>clearly recognize the importance</sup> of implementation review.

MR. WATSON: We met on a variety of subjects pertaining to logistical and administrative aspects of the transition that will go on over the next 10 weeks. But also ways in which we can put together information not only out of the Executive Office of the President but also from the government at large about major issues that they will be confronted with in the months immediately after January 20th, 1981.

This afternoon at 2:00 o'clock Mr. Meese and Mr. Casey will be joined by approximately 20 or 22 additional folks from the Reagan transition team and they will meet here at the White House with about 35 of the transition officers who have been appointed from all over the government. That meeting will basically be an introductory meeting at which time we'll lay out some of the procedures for the access to the departments and coordination between the transition officials and some instructions will be given.

I would like to say on our part that thus far the transition is proceeding very, very smoothly and that my working relationship with Mr. Meese, with whom I have very frequent contact by telephone, has been a most constructive and a most productive one.

MR. MEESE: I would like to echo that. I appreciate very much the cooperation we've received from Jack and all the people here in the White House and we look forward to a very smooth and harmonious transition period. I'd like to say personally it's nice to be able to see Jack in person, face to face. We've been corresponding by television, as some of you know, last week, across the country, and it's nice to get together in person.

Q Jack, this morning Mr. Meese in his news conference said that he was going to ask this administration to defer action on things that don't need immediate attention and defer those decisions, or ask that those decisions be deferred for the President-Elect. Was that request put forward and what was your response to that?

MR. MEESE: If I may say -- let me say that that was already done by Jack, even before I had a chance to ask. So we are both agreed on that.

Q So you've confirmed that?

MR. WATSON: Yes.

Q Can you be specific as to what kind of things will be postponed until later?

MR. WATSON: The President is interested in seeing to it that major matters, major policy questions, issues that will need to be addressed within the next four years, both legislatively and otherwise, and on which Governor Reagan and his administration will be the primary executors, be deferred for their action after January 20th. There are, on the other hand and at the same time, some major matters which are pending before the Congress, for example, the President's Youth Bill. That is something which the President will be meeting with the Democratic leadership on tomorrow morning to discuss the prospects of.

There are numerous appropriations bills that need to be dealt with, not only for the sake of getting some business closed but for the sake of having this government fully operational. Those kinds of matters we will seek to close on. Matters which really ought to be deferred for later conceptual and executive action we will defer.

Q How about the judgeships?

MR. WATSON: There are some judgeships pending before the United States Senate for which we think there might be bipartisan support and as to which there is a prospect for confirmation. That remains to be seen. We don't have any consultations yet with the Democratic leadership on that subject but we will pursue those consultations with the hope that some of the judgeships can be confirmed.

Q When will the President meet with Governor Reagan?

MR. WATSON: We have not set a specific time. Governor Reagan will be in Washington beginning Monday of next week and, though I've not yet had a chance to discuss it specifically with the President, I suspect that a meeting between Governor Reagan and the President will occur sometime in the middle part of next week, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday would be my guess, and a meeting at the same time, I expect, will occur between Mrs. Reagan and Mrs. Carter.

Q Mr. Meese, what about the judgeships?

MR. MEESE: On the judgeships that are in the Congress now, we'll see what action the Senate leadership will take.

Q Well, what do you prefer?

MR. MEESE: We'll wait and see what the leadership will do.

Q The President didn't drop in on this morning's meeting, did he?

MR. WATSON: No, he did not.

Q You surely have an opinion, sir.

MR. MEESE: Well, I have an opinion that if --

Q Will you give it, then?

MR. MEESE: -- if there is bipartisan support for a judgeships, I am sure that will have been cleared with us before it goes ahead.

MR. WATSON: Any other questions?

Q Do you expect to clear them?

MR. MEESE: We'll wait and see and take them on a one-by-one basis.

MR. WATSON: Thank you all very much.

White told the Sperling breakfast this morning that he had made no decisions about his future. He said he just wanted to see the Party rebuilt, etc. He also took some shots at those who were laying all the blame on you. He said he had talked to you and you were in good spirits. He did not say anything about your position on the Party question. (See attached wire copy from another interview.)

This puts you in a position to say that you think John White wants what you want for the Party and what most Democrats want. You hope this whole thing can be worked out in a way that is conducive to Party unity and rebuilding for the future.

Bob Neuman says he thinks White just does not want to be run off. He is perfectly content to turn it over to someone else if he can be a part of working it out and it will look like the new person was his choice, too.

You may be asked about the reports that some West Coast Democrats feel your early concession hurt their chances. You ought to just say that you don't believe that is the case. You considered that question very carefully and concluded that by the time you made your announcement that anyone who was listening to the radio and television already knew that you had lost. You can point out that you also did not want to be ungracious by delaying a statement artificially beyond the time when the outcome was obvious to everyone.

WHITE SAID IN A TELEPHONE INTERVIEW IT WAS "PREMATURE" TO SAY WHETHER HE WOULD SEEK TO STAY ON AS PARTY CHAIRMAN AND, "I'LL MAKE THAT DECISION WHEN THE TIME COMES."

BUT HE SAID, "I WOULD SAY THAT IF I CHOSE TO, I'D HAVE A GREAT DEAL OF SUPPORT."

HE SAID THE DNC WOULD PROBABLY WAIT UNTIL AFTER CONGRESS CONVENES IN JANUARY TO HOLD ELECTIONS FOR PARTY LEADERSHIP POSTS.

SUBJECT: Status Report on the Madrid CSCE Meeting

On the planned opening day of the CSCE review meeting in Madrid there is still no agreement on agenda or modalities. The neutrals have crafted a compromise which would give sufficient time for implementation review while meeting Soviet desires for an extended discussion of new proposals. The neutral proposal has some elements we don't like, but we have adopted it as a basis for discussion. The Soviets have made some encouraging noises about the proposal, but have not formally abandoned their attempt severely to limit our ability to criticize the Soviet human rights record. Griffin and Max think the chances are about even that the Soviets will relent and that the neutral initiative will eventually provide the basis for agreement.

Meanwhile, the Spanish are planning to have a ceremonial opening session later this evening, but will not push for further meetings in the absence of procedural agreement. Our delegation tentatively plans to continue to seek an agreement until midnight tonight; if they are unsuccessful, however, the Madrid CSCE review meeting could simply adjourn. There is evidently widespread agreement among our Allies that this outcome would be preferable to acquiescing in Soviet efforts to restructure the CSCE process in order to deemphasize its human rights component.




In my view, both candidates are exceptionally distinguished and are deserving of the award.

The Department of Energy statute contains provisions for the granting of "an award for any especially meritorious contribution to the development, use, or control of atomic energy," subject to your approval. It is this provision that forms the basis for the prestigious Enrico Fermi Award.

The Energy Research Advisory Board this year accepted responsibility for reviewing all the nominations received this year. The Board recommended that two nominees be given this Award - Dr. Alvin M. Weinberg and Sir Rudolf E. Peierls. The Board's recommendations were also unanimously concurred in by an interagency committee composed of Frank Press, Donald Langenberg, Duane Sewell, James Wade, Thomas Mutch, Jack Holl, and Edward Frieman. I concur fully in their recommendations and have attached supporting justifications for these two outstanding individuals, a list of previous recipients of the award, and the memberships of Awards Panel of the Energy Research Advisory Board and the Interagency Committee.

Each Award consists of a gold medal, a check for \$25,000, and a Presidential citation.

If this meets with your approval, we plan to have an appropriate ceremony later this year. It is my hope that you would be able personally to present these Awards.

## Dr. Alvin M. Weinberg

### Citation

For pioneering contributions to reactor theory, design and systems; for untiring work to make nuclear energy serve the public good, both safely and economically; for inspiring leadership of the Oak Ridge National Laboratory; and for wise counsel to the executive and legislative branches of government.

### Supporting Justification

If we had to single out an individual whose influence on the development of nuclear energy has been of predominant importance, it surely would be Alvin M. Weinberg. His distinguished writings, research, administration, and counsel span a period of nearly 40 years and continue with undiminished excellence and impact to this day. In the following paragraphs, we summarize briefly highlights of his distinguished career and contributions.

The systematic theory of chain reactors began with Weinberg's work in 1942 and culminated with the classical text, published jointly with E. P. Wigner in 1958, The Physical Theory of Neutron Chain Reactors.


Weinberg was one of the pioneers in developing the first successful nuclear reactors, and he suggested the pressurized-water technology that today dominates the nuclear power industry.

Weinberg became an early advocate of the breeder reactor and recognized the importance of using thorium as a raw material in thermal breeders (which minimize radioactivity in the reactor vessel while reducing xenon poisoning).

Weinberg has been, for more than a generation, an eloquent and incisive spokesman on socio-economic aspects of nuclear energy. He has emphasized the importance of meticulous attention to detail, the creation of nuclear energy centers to enhance security through siting selections, the importance of adequate attention to waste disposal, and the training of cadres of highly competent people to manage all aspects of the nuclear industry. Many of these recommendations have been embodied in federal policies and planning.

Weinberg guided the Oak Ridge National Laboratory through trying times and assured its preeminence as one of the world's leading research centers. As Director of the Office of Energy Research and Development, Federal Energy Administration, his insistence on addressing uranium supply problems greatly contributed to world-wide efforts to broaden the supply base. As Director of the Institute for Energy Analysis, he has created a major institution to serve national planners on a wide spectrum of critical technological, scientific, environmental, economic, legal, and socio-economic issues.

Weinberg is a widely respected writer and lecturer, with penetrating ability to articulate critical issues quietly and persuasively to a disparate spectrum of audiences. We can do no better than to quote from the 38th Edition of Who's Who in America (one of sixteen citations) where Weinberg is characterized as having "worked tirelessly for the implementation of scientific ideals for the public good".



## Sir Rudolf E. Peierls

### Citation

For his many pathbreaking discoveries in theoretical physics, including contributions to the understanding of the nucleus and the solid state; for his inspiration to several generations of students; for his pioneering contributions to early atomic energy developments in England and America; and for his efforts in working towards the responsible development and control of nuclear weapons.

### Supporting Justification

Sir Rudolf E. Peierls is notable for a lifetime of brilliant contributions to physics, to the education of a generation of physicists, and to the development of nuclear energy and weapons.


Peierls has made pathbreaking contributions in several areas of physics. In the very beginning of nuclear theory, he solved the problem of the deuteron and its connection with neutron-proton scattering. He was the first to formulate the idea of describing nuclear forces by scattering length and effective range and with Kapur, he developed a vigorous theory of nuclear resonances. He was also the first to treat properly the repulsive core — seminal work that had great influence on Bethe, Goldstone, and others.

Peierls' contributions to solid state physics are equally as significant. He developed the first correct theory of the heat conductivity of insulators. He elucidated the behavior of electrons in metals near the boundaries of Brillouin zones. He developed the best theory of order and disorder in alloys before Onsager's definitive work. And he performed early and important work in statistical physics, in particular the exploration of cooperative phenomena.

Peierls was an outstanding educator of theoretical physicists. For at least twenty years after World War II, he had a most important school of theoretical physics in the United Kingdom. Many productive British theoretical physicists were his students, and his American students include: Edwin Salpeter, Gerry Brown, Freeman Dyson, D. Geoffrey Ravehall, Hugh McManus, Stanley Mandelstam, and James Langer. He was able to give his students, especially his graduate students, a sense of what is important in physics and a feel for the unity of the field.

Peierls also made vital contributions to the development of nuclear energy and nuclear weapons. Early in 1940, Peierls and O. R. Frisch prepared an historic memorandum setting out theoretical estimates of the critical mass of U-235 suggesting how U-235 might be separated from other isotopes, and describing the radiative effects of nuclear detonation. Subsequent events proved that the paper represented a brilliant theoretical prediction. The Peierls-Frisch memorandum initiated intensive and productive work by British Scientists in 1940 and 1941, and the British delegation helped get the U.S. effort moving at high speed. Subsequently, Peierls led the group at Los Alamos concerned with the theory of implosions; the method of assembly they developed has been used ever since.

Dr. Peierls richly deserves the Fermi Award for his work as a scientist, an educator, and a developer of nuclear energy in the U.S., as well as Great Britain.







III. INTRODUCTION

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The purpose of this breakfast is to advise the Leadership of your legislative goals for the special post-election session and to express to the Leadership your appreciation for their efforts in your reelection campaign and for their support of your legislative program throughout your Administration.

Several significant meetings of Democrats took place today. The Senate Democratic Caucus met, and this meeting was followed by a meeting between Senator Byrd and Speaker O'Neill. Byrd, reflecting the views of the Caucus, told the Speaker that he wanted to see several pieces of legislation enacted during the post-election session. He specifically mentioned Revenue Sharing, Paperwork Reduction, Fair Housing, Criminal Code Reform, and CHAPS. It was generally agreed by both Byrd and the Speaker that it would be virtually impossible to enact any appropriations bills not yet in conference, particularly Labor-HHS and Legislative Branch Appropriations. The Speaker proposed that the Congress pass a Continuing Resolution with a termination date of March 15, 1981.

Both Byrd and the Speaker suggested a sine die adjournment date of December 5. Byrd expects the Senate to be in session most of Thanksgiving week, while the House will probably be in recess all of that week.

#### IV. AGENDA

##### A. Expression of Appreciation

You should begin the breakfast by thanking the Leadership not only for their support during your reelection campaign but also for their help throughout the four years of your Administration.

##### Talking Points

- o I consider my relationship with the Democratic leadership one of the strongest and most productive ever. Together we have enacted a number of major pieces of legislation that have great significance for the people of this Nation.
- o We can point proudly to such things as energy legislation (WPT, Synfuels, etc.) which lays the foundation for a more secure energy future, civil service reform, social security and food stamp reforms, urban policy initiatives, and major reorganization of the Federal government! We've expanded our commitment to mass transit and initiated major deregulation of our transportation industries. With your support, my Administration has made significant achievements in the area of foreign policy, among them improved stability in the Mid-East and ratification of the Panama Canal Treaty.
- o None of these achievements would have been possible without your leadership. I am deeply grateful to each of you and to all of you.
- o I am equally grateful for your support of my reelection. Bob and Dan, my wins in West Virginia and Hawaii are in large measure a result of your efforts on my behalf. Jim, I'm grateful to you for all of your help in Texas, especially for organizing the Fort Worth rally. Danny, you spent many hours in Chicago working for my reelection. Tom, as always, you were an articulate spokesman for my Administration and for our Party. Tip, you were successful in bringing our Party back together following the Convention, and your good will was a source of strength to all of us. John and Al, I am deeply shaken by your losses. Our Nation owes a debt of gratitude to both of you for your many years of dedicated service to the country. Your leadership in the Congress will be sorely missed by those of us who have been fortunate to know you and who have benefitted from your wisdom.

##### B. Legislative Program for the Post-Election Session

You should let the Leadership know that you expect of them a productive post-election session and that you would like to see enacted not only the bills mentioned today by Senator Byrd, but a number of other measures on which you and the Congress have devoted considerable effort and on which enactment is possible.

## Talking Points

- o I am pleased to note that you are viewing the post-election session as an opportunity to build upon our record of accomplishment. I want to see a number of measures enacted before you adjourn. These include those on Senator Byrd's list--Revenue Sharing, Fair Housing, Criminal Code Reform, Paperwork Reduction, and CHAPS.
- o I want to add to that list Youth Employment, Superfund (agreement on a compromise leaning toward the House version would be acceptable), the Foreign Aid Authorization bill, the IDA Authorization bill, EDA, Extension of Unemployment Benefits, and Reconciliation (see attached McIntyre memo on Reconciliation).
- o Of all of these bills, I would most like to see the Youth bill and CHAPS enacted before adjournment. These are two issues on which all of us have expended a great deal of effort, and the climate for passage is much more favorable now than it will be next year or the year after.

### C. Tax Cut

The Senate Democratic Caucus today voted against bringing up a tax cut bill this year. Their action, however, does not rule out a move by Republicans to bring a bill to a vote. You should make it clear that you are opposed to a tax cut bill and then call on Charlie Schultze to provide an overview of the economy and your reasons for opposing a tax cut bill in the post-election session.

### D. State of the Union Address

You may be asked by the Leadership whether you plan to deliver a State of the Union Address. You should reply that President Ford delivered an address following his defeat, and that your intention is to deliver an address in early January. The speech will discuss the accomplishments of the Administration and the Congress over the last four years and be positive and forward-looking in its spirit. It will not be an anti-Reagan, anti-Republican address.

### E. Future Breakfasts

Plans are to hold additional breakfasts on Tuesdays of weeks in which the House and Senate are in session.

Late Note: Agreement was reached on the Alaska Lands bill this evening, and a bill will be on its way to your desk in the near future.

SUBJECT: Talking Points on Reconciliation

### Background

This is in response to your request for information on reconciliation for the Leadership Breakfast.

According to congressional estimates, the revenue increases and outlay cuts in the reconciliation bill will reduce the 1981 deficit by \$10 to \$12 billion. Roughly \$2 billion of the outlay savings called for in reconciliation have been enacted. In addition, the conferees have reached tentative agreement on a number of issues including cash management, extension of the telephone excise tax and some reforms of unemployment compensation, benefits for Federal employees, medicare, and other benefit payments.

However, a number of controversial issues remain. For receipts, the major outstanding issues are a House provision restricting tax-exempt mortgage bonds, and a Senate change in the windfall profit tax. The major unresolved outlay issues are: elimination of the national trigger for extended unemployment benefits; annual indexation of Federal employee retirement; whether to make reforms of the child nutrition program effective for one year or permanently; and a variety of increases and decreases in medicare and medicaid.

### Talking Points

- The Administration strongly supports the reconciliation process and hopes that the Congress will pass the remaining savings in an omnibus reconciliation bill in this session.
- If enacted the bill will:
  - . reduce the deficit by \$10 to \$12 billion;
  - . make a number of needed program reforms; and

- . represent a landmark achievement for the executive branch and the Congress to get a handle on the tough uncontrollable programs.
- I realize much progress has been made, in some cases through enactment of separate legislation and in others through tentative conference agreement. However, a number of controversial issues remain. Many of the unresolved issues are under the jurisdiction of the Ways and Means and Finance Members of the conference. I strongly urge that all the reconciliation conferees complete action expeditiously.

Subject: Pending Legislation for the Multilateral Development  
Banks (MDBs)

The prospects for final passage of an FY 1981 Appropriations Bill for foreign assistance appear to be very limited during the post-election session of Congress. The various MDBs can be adequately funded under a Continuing Resolution but only if the Congress first enacts the "IDA Authorization Bill" (H.R. 6811) during the post-election session. That legislation provides not only authorization for IDA VI but also provides for U.S. membership and entry into the African Development Bank.

The Senate has approved this legislation so only lack of House action now prevents U.S. participation in IDA VI. Lack of Congressional action has already prevented the replenishment from taking effect on October 1, as scheduled, and the "bridge loan agreement" arranged with other donors to minimize disruptions in IDA lending would be undermined by further U.S. delay.

Deferral of finalization until next summer would jeopardize important IDA lending programs (particularly major energy projects) and could be a disaster from a foreign policy viewpoint. It would also be particularly embarrassing when Tom Clausen is assuming the presidency of the World Bank.

Finally, United States membership in the African Development Bank has a relatively modest cost but is important for U.S. bilateral relations with African countries and for our growing strategic and economic stake in the region.

After discussing the situation with Secretary Muskie, we both believe that H.R. 6811 should be given the Administration's top foreign policy priority in the post-election session. I will be talking to both the Democratic and Republican Congressional Leadership trying to generate bi-partisan support for the legislation. We recommend that you discuss the matter with the House Leadership as well.

HOSTAGE QUESTION MAY HAVE TO GO BACK TO IRANIAN PARLIAMENT

ALGIERS, ALGERIA (UPI) -- AN AUTHORITATIVE SOURCE SAID TODAY NO IMMEDIATE ANSWER IS EXPECTED FROM IRAN TO THE U.S. RESPONSE ON TEHRAN'S CONDITIONS FOR RELEASING THE AMERICAN HOSTAGES AND SOME SOURCES SAID THE QUESTION MIGHT HAVE TO GO BACK TO IRAN'S PARLIAMENT.

THE SOURCE SPOKE ONE DAY AFTER DEPUTY SECRETARY OF STATE WARREN CHRISTOPHER ABRUPTLY ENDED HIS DIPLOMATIC COURIER ROLE IN ALGIERS AND FLEW HOME, LEAVING GO-BETWEEN ALGERIA TO RELAY THE U.S. RESPONSE ON IRAN'S CONDITIONS FOR FREEING THE 52 AMERICAN HOSTAGES FROM 374 DAYS IN CAPTIVITY.

"WE DON'T ANTICIPATE AN EARLY RESPONSE FROM TEHRAN," THE SOURCE SAID, EXPLAINING THE REASON FOR THE EXPECTED DELAY WAS THAT THE U.S. REPLY FAILS TO MEET UNCONDITIONALLY THE FOUR POINTS IRAN SET FOR RELEASE OF THE HOSTAGES.

THE CONDITIONS ARE A PLEDGE OF NON-INTERFERENCE IN IRANIAN AFFAIRS, FREEING IRANIAN ASSETS FROZEN IN THE UNITED STATES, A MOVE TO RETURN THE WEALTH OF THE LATE SHAH AND DROPPING FINANCIAL CLAIMS AGAINST TEHRAN.

U.S. OFFICIALS HAVE EXPLAINED TO ALGERIA THAT THEY CAN GUARANTEE A NON-INTERFERENCE PLEDGE BUT THE OTHER CONDITIONS INVOLVE LEGAL AND FINANCIAL COMPLEXITIES.

AS PART OF ALGERIA'S ROLE AS INTERMEDIARY, ALGERIAN AMBASSADOR TO IRAN ABDELKRIM GHERAIEB PREPARED TO LEAVE SHORTLY FOR TEHRAN TO EXPLAIN THE U.S. REPLY TO IRAN'S CONDITIONS.

BUT SOURCES IN ALGIERS SAID DIFFERENCES WITHIN THE FACTION-RIDDEN IRANIAN GOVERNMENT COULD FORCE IT TO TAKE THE HOSTAGE CASE BACK TO THE MAJLIS, IRAN'S PARLIAMENT, WHICH FORMALLY ISSUED THE DEMANDS FOR RELEASE OF THE HOSTAGES.

IN TEHRAN A SPOKESMAN IN THE OFFICE OF PRIME MINISTER MOHAMMED ALI RAJAI SAID, "WE EXPECT TO RECEIVE THE U.S. REPLY ON THE HOSTAGE RELEASE TERMS TODAY."

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS IN ALGIERS SAID THEY HAD NO INTENTION OF PLAYING AN ACTIVE ROLE IN NEGOTIATIONS. "OUR ROLE IS LIMITED TO TRANSMITTING THE TWO SIDES' POSITIONS, IN OTHER WORDS ACTING AS A MAILBOX," A SENIOR OFFICIAL SAID.

CHRISTOPHER ENDED TWO DAYS OF MEETINGS WITH ALGERIAN FOREIGN MINISTER MOHAMMED BENYAHIA IN WHICH HE HANDED OVER THE U.S. RESPONSE TO IRAN'S FOUR DEMANDS.

CHRISTOPHER DEPARTED ON A U.S. AIR FORCE PLANE FOR WHAT WAS EXPECTED TO BE A NINE-HOUR FLIGHT TO WASHINGTON. TECHNICAL PROBLEMS WITH THE PLANE FORCED AN OVERNIGHT STOPOVER IN SHANNON, IRELAND, THE STATE DEPARTMENT SAID, ADDING THAT THERE WAS NO D OR EMERGENCY.

"THERE'S NO MORE ACTION HERE," A U.S. OFFICIAL SAID IN ALGIERS TUESDAY AS CHRISTOPHER DEPARTED. ANOTHER OFFICIAL IN WASHINGTON, WHO DECLINED TO BE IDENTIFIED, SAID IT WOULD PROBABLY BE SEVERAL DAYS BEFORE IRAN RESPONDED AND CHRISTOPHER SAW NO NEED TO WAIT IN THE NORTH AFRICAN NATION.

IN TEHRAN, IRAN'S PARLIAMENT SPEAKER HOJATOLESLAM HASHEMI RAFSANJANI SCOFFED AT A U.S. MESSAGE DELIVERED BY THE SWISS THAT SAID PRESIDENT-ELECT RONALD REAGAN APPROVES OF CARTER'S DECISIONS ON THE HOSTAGES, TEHRAN RADIO SAID IN A REPORT MONITORED IN LONDON.

IT IS IMMATERIAL WHETHER CARTER OR REAGAN REPLIES TO IRANIAN DEMANDS, RAFSANJANI TOLD THE SWISS ENVOY. SWITZERLAND IS THE U.S. GO-BETWEEN IN THE THIRD PARTY NEGOTIATIONS, WHILE ALGERIA IS PERFORMING THE SAME DIPLOMATIC COURIER ROLE FOR THE IRANIANS.

Following is the transcript of Secretary Christopher's statement on arrival today at Andrews AFB:

We had two days of useful and intensive talks with the Algerian Foreign Minister and his colleagues. I would say that we definitely accomplished what we set out to do.

At President Carter's direction we have turned over to the Algerians our response to the Parliament of Iran. We had good opportunity to describe the background of our response and to explain to the Algerians how it will work from a legal and technical standpoint. The Algerians have agreed to act as intermediaries in passing on our response. We are grateful to the Algerians for undertaking this role.

Where we go from here will depend on the reaction of the Iranians to our response. All I can say is that we will continue to do everything within our power in what is a profoundly difficult and complicated situation. I will be going to the White House to report to the President in more detail.

A. I really don't have any idea of time frame at all. It seems to me that it might take a few days and so I determined to come back here to the United States last night.

BEIRUT, LEBANON (AP) -- THE U.S. REPLY TO IRAN'S TERMS FOR FREEING THE 52 AMERICAN HOSTAGES WAS DELIVERED TO THE IRANIAN GOVERNMENT IN TEHRAN TODAY, AN AIDE TO IRANIAN PRIME MINISTER MOHAMMAD ALI RAJAI REPORTED.

RAJAI'S OFFICE, REACHED BY TELEPHONE FROM BEIRUT, GAVE NO INDICATION OF THE INITIAL IRANIAN REACTION. BUT AMERICAN OFFICIALS THOUGHT IT MIGHT BE SEVERAL DAYS BEFORE IRAN MADE ITS NEXT MOVE.

THE FIVE-MAN U.S. TEAM THAT DELIVERED THE AMERICAN REPLY TO THE ALGERIAN GOVERNMENT FOR RELAY TO TEHRAN WAS RETURNING TO WASHINGTON FROM ALGIERS TODAY. THEIR U.S. AIR FORCE JET DEVELOPED MECHANICAL TROUBLE EN ROUTE, AND THE GROUP SPENT THE NIGHT AT SHANNON AIRPORT IN IRELAND.

THE TWO DAYS OF DISCUSSIONS THAT ENDED TUESDAY BETWEEN THE AMERICAN TEAM, HEADED BY DEPUTY SECRETARY OF STATE WARREN CHRISTOPHER, AND THE ALGERIANS WERE DESCRIBED AS "INTENSIVE AND USEFUL" BY JOHN H. TRATTNER, A STATE DEPARTMENT SPOKESMAN HERE.

CHRISTOPHER'S GROUP LEFT ALGIERS ON TUESDAY DESPITE ITS ORIGINAL PLANS TO REMAIN UP TO A WEEK TO RECEIVE AN ANSWER TO THE U.S. RESPONSE. THERE WAS NO WORD HERE ON WHETHER CHRISTOPHER'S MISSION WAS CONSIDERED A SUCCESS AND CHRISTOPHER HAD NO COMMENT AS HE LEFT.

ALGERIA IS ACTING AS AN INTERMEDIARY BETWEEN TEHRAN AND THE UNITED STATES BECAUSE THE TWO NATIONS HAVE NO OFFICIAL DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS.

CHRISTOPHER'S GROUP MET WITH ALGERIAN LEADERS TO GIVE A "GENERALLY POSITIVE REPLY" TO THE IRANIAN DEMANDS, U.S. STATE DEPARTMENT OFFICIALS SAID.

THE IRANIAN PARLIAMENT OUTLINED FOUR DEMANDS, INCLUDING A PLEDGE OF U.S. NON-INTERVENTION IN IRANIAN AFFAIRS, CANCELLATION OF AMERICAN FINANCIAL CLAIMS AGAINST IRAN, RETURN OF THE WEALTH OF THE LATE SHAH MOHAMMAD REZA PAHLAVI AND RELEASE OF MORE THAN \$8 BILLION INFROZEN IRANIAN ASSETS.

(ALGERIA TURNS OVER U.S. REPLY TO IRAN; COMMENTS OF IRAN CENTRAL BANK HEAD)

ALGIERS; ALGERIA (UPI) -- ALGERIA TODAY TURNED OVER TO IRAN THE U.S. REPLY TO CONDITIONS FOR RELEASE OF THE 52 AMERICAN HOSTAGES, BUT THE FORMAL TRANSMITTAL WAS PRECEDED BY WARNINGS IN TEHRAN AND ALGIERS IT WOULD NOT LEAD TO A SPEEDY END TO THEIR CAPTIVITY.

"WE DON'T ANTICIPATE AN EARLY RESPONSE FROM TEHRAN," SAID AN AUTHORITATIVE SOURCE IN ALGERIA, NAMED BY THE IRANIAN GOVERNMENT TO ACT AS INTERMEDIARY. "THE IRANIAN AUTHORITIES MAY NEED SOME TIME BEFORE FORMULATING THEIR ANSWER."

THE SOURCE DESCRIBED FAILURE OF THE U.S. REPLY TO MEET IRAN'S FOUR DEMANDS UNCONDITIONALLY AS A REASON FOR THE EXPECTED DELAY.

FROM TEHRAN, THE LONDON NEWSPAPER FINANCIAL TIMES QUOTED CENTRAL BANK GOVERNOR ALI REZ NOBARI AS SAYING THE RESPONSES "DO NOT REALLY MEET IRAN'S FOUR CONDITIONS."

BUT IN ANOTHER INTERVIEW PRINTED IN LONDON TODAY, NOBARI SAID THE UNITED STATES COULD MEET IRANIAN CONDITIONS FOR RELEASE OF THE HOSTAGES IN FOUR DAYS IF IT WANTED TO.

THE IRANIAN BANK DIRECTOR SAID HE BELIEVES THOSE IRANIAN LEADERS WHO ONCE OPPOSED SOLVING THE HOSTAGE ISSUE NOW WANT TO SETTLE IT AND "THERE IS NO LONGER A POLITICAL IMPEDIMENT TO FINDING A SOLUTION."

THE ALGERIAN AMBASSADOR TO IRAN, ABDELKARIM CHERAIEB, CARRIED THE BULKY PRESENTATION DOCUMENTS OF THE AMERICAN RESPONSE TO TEHRAN. SOURCES IN ALGIERS SAID DIFFERENCES WITHIN THE FACTION-RIDDEN GOVERNMENT COULD SEND THE AFFAIR BACK THE IRANIAN PARLIAMENT, WHICH FORMALLY ENUNCIATED THE RELEASE CONDITIONS NOV. 2.

DEPUTY SECRETARY OF STATE WARREN CHRISTOPHER AND THE DELEGATION THAT ACCOMPANIED HIM TO EXPLAIN LEGAL AND FINANCIAL COMPLEXITIES OF THE REPLY RETURNED TO WASHINGTON, APPARENTLY AFTER BEING ADVISED BY ALGERIAN OFFICIALS THERE WAS NO POINT IN STANDING BY IN ALGIERS FOR AN ANSWER.

DELAYED BY MECHANICAL TROUBLE IN SHANNON, IRELAND, CHRISTOPHER DECLINED TO SAY ANYTHING MORE THAN THAT TALKS WITH THE ALGERIANS HAD BEEN USEFUL AND THAT "WE ARE GRATEFUL FOR THEIR HELP" AS GO-BETWEENS.

AS CHRISTOPHER FLEW HOME, BRUCE LAINGEN, THE HIGHEST-RANKING AMERICAN HOSTAGE HELD IN IRAN, TOLD A SEATTLE RADIO STATION BY TELEPHONE HE IS OUT OF TOUCH WITH THE LATEST NEGOTIATIONS FOR RELEASE OF THE 52 CAPTIVES BUT KNOWS OF RONALD REAGAN'S ELECTION AS PRESIDENT AND WISHES HIM WELL.

LAINGEN, THE EMBASSY CHARGE D'AFFAIRES TOLD STATION KAYD TUESDAY NIGHT FROM THE FOREIGN MINISTRY IN TEHRAN, WHERE HE AND TWO OTHER HOSTAGES ARE BEING HELD: "I'M FINE. WE'RE ANXIOUS TO LEAVE, HOPEFUL."

LAINGEN SAID THE HOSTAGES ARE "TOTALLY OUT OF TOUCH" WITH MOVES SEEKING THEIR RELEASE AND SAID: "RIGHT NOW, IT'S A TIME FOR PATIENCE, TIME FOR CALM, TIME FOR COOL RESOLVE AND A TIME FOR CONFIDENCE IT WILL SOON BE OVER."

IRAN'S CENTRAL BANK HEAD TOLD A MIDDLE EAST BUSINESS MAGAZINE PUBLISHED IN LONDON THAT IN ADDITION TO THE FOUR CONDITIONS SET LAST MONTH BY THE IRANIAN GOVERNMENT THE UNITED STATES WILL HAVE TO PAY INTEREST ON THE IRANIAN ASSETS IT FROZE, DELIVER THE MILITARY SPARE PARTS IRAN ALREADY HAS PAID FOR, AND SOFTEN ITS TONE IN DEALING WITH IRAN.

NOBARI, A CONFIDANT OF PRESIDENT ABOLHASSAN BANAI-SADR, SAID OF THE FOUR CONDITIONS ONLY THE DEMAND FOR RETURN OF THE SHAH'S WEALTH SEEMED COMPLICATED AT FIRST GLANCE. HE SAID THAT CONDITION EASILY COULD BE FULFILLED BY AMERICAN RECOGNITION OF THE IRANIAN GOVERNMENT'S RIGHT TO NATIONALIZE THE SHAH'S WEALTH.

HE PROPOSED ESTABLISHMENT OF A COMMISSION TO ARBITRATE DISPUTES OVER CLAIMS BY PRIVATE AMERICAN COMPANIES ON IRAN AND ESTABLISHMENT OF AN ESCROW ACCOUNT IN A THIRD COUNTRY TO PAY THEM.

ASKED HOW LONG HE THOUGHT THE UNITED STATES WOULD NEED TECHNICALLY TO MEET IRAN'S CONDITIONS, HE SAID: "IF THE WILL REALLY EXISTS IT SHOULD NOT TAKE MORE THAN FOUR DAYS. THE FUNCTIONS OF THE ARBITRATION COMMISSION CAN BE DEFINED, \$2 BILLION TO \$3 BILLION CAN BE ALLOTTED TO THE SPECIAL ACCOUNT AND CARTER CAN ISSUE HIS DECLARATIONS IN THAT TIME."

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- RONALD REAGAN'S TRANSITION MANAGER TODAY ASKED THE CARTER ADMINISTRATION TO MAKE ONLY NECESSARY GOVERNMENT DECISIONS IN THE NEXT NINE WEEKS BEFORE THE NEW PRESIDENT TAKES OFFICE JAN. 20.

EDWIN WEESE TALKED WITH REPORTERS BEFORE MEETING LATER IN THE DAY WITH WHITE HOUSE CHIEF OF STAFF JACK WATSON TO HELP SMOOTH OVER THE CHANGE OF POWER TO A REPUBLICAN ADMINISTRATION.

WEESE WAS ASKED WHETHER REAGAN WILL PRESS THE DEMOCRATIC ADMINISTRATION TO HOLD OFF ON ALL BUT PRESSING DECISIONS AND ACTIONS, LEAVING THOSE THAT CAN BE DEFERRED FOR THE NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE.

"HE WILL ASK THEM TO REFRAIN FROM THOSE THAT DON'T HAVE TO BE DONE," HE SAID.

WEESE SAID HE UNDERSTOOD THE REQUEST WAS ACCEPTABLE TO CARTER, BUT HE WAS UNWILLING TO BE SPECIFIC UNTIL AFTER MEETING WITH WHITE HOUSE AIDES.

ALTHOUGH REAGAN IS EXPECTED TO MEET WITH CARTER NEXT WEEK WHEN HE VISITS WASHINGTON, REAGAN PRESS SPOKESMAN JIM BRADY SAID TODAY NO FINAL DECISION HAS BEEN MADE ON SUCH A MEETING.

REAGAN, CURRENTLY RESTING IN CALIFORNIA, WILL ARRIVE NOV. 18 AND RETURN TO CALIFORNIA NOV. 21.

WEESE SAID REAGAN WILL MEET IN WASHINGTON WITH CONGRESSIONAL LEADERS FROM BOTH PARTIES, GET A CIA BRIEFING AND MEET WITH OTHER TOP GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS WHEN IN THE CAPITAL.

OTHER REAGAN TRANSITION TEAM MEMBERS WERE TO MEET TODAY WITH TOP LEVEL WHITE HOUSE STAFFERS.

WEESE CONFIRMED REAGAN'S ADVISORY TASK FORCE ON GOVERNMENT SPENDING HAS DRAWN UP A LIST OF WHERE FEDERAL SPENDING CUTS COULD BE MADE TO TRIM THE BUDGET. HE SAID THE LIST, IF COMPLETELY IMPLEMENTED, WOULD CUT SPENDING 6 PERCENT.

BUT HE SAID REAGAN HAS PLEDGED TO CUT SPENDING BY ONLY 2 PERCENT NEXT YEAR AND ALL OF THE SUGGESTIONS WILL NOT BE IMPLEMENTED.

WEESE SAID THERE ARE SOME "WINOR PROGRAM CUTS ON THAT LIST" BUT MOST OF THE SUGGESTIONS ARE AIMED AT DECREASING WASTE AND INEFFICIENCY AND WOULD NOT ELIMINATE COMPLETE PROGRAMS.

WEESE ALSO ANNOUNCED THE APPOINTMENT OF FIVE PEOPLE TO DIRECT WORKING GROUPS ASSIGNED TO ANALYZE VARIOUS GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS ON POLICIES, PROGRAMS, PERSONNEL, BUDGETS AND LEGISLATION.

STANTON D. ANDERSON, A FORMER SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PRESIDENT RICHARD NIXON, WILL DIRECT THE ECONOMIC UNIT. GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR DAVID GOODRIE WILL OVERSEE THE REVIEW OF NATIONAL SECURITY DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES.

WASHINGTON LAWYER RICHARD FAIRBRANKS WILL HANDLE RESOURCES AND DEVELOPMENT. ELIZABETH M. DOLE, A FORMER FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSIONER AND WIFE OF SEN. ROBERT DOLE, WILL OVERSEE HUMAN SERVICES. LOREN B. SMITH, GENERAL COUNSEL TO THE REAGAN CAMPAIGN, WILL HANDLE THE LEGAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCIES.

NATO-SPENDING

WASHINGTON (AP) -- LAME-DUCK DEFENSE SECRETARY HAROLD BROWN WILL TRY TO STEM A GROWING RETREAT OF WESTERN EUROPEAN ALLIES FROM PLEDGES TO BOOST MILITARY SPENDING, BUT NATO DEFENSE MINISTERS APPEAR LIKELY TO GIVE HIM ONLY A POLITE HEARING.

THAT IS THE RELUCTANT EXPECTATION OF PENTAGON OFFICIALS IN ADVANCE OF A TWO-DAY MEETING OF THE NATO NUCLEAR PLANNING GROUP IN BRUSSELS STARTING THURSDAY. BROWN PLANNED TO LEAVE FOR EUROPE LATE WEDNESDAY.

PRESIDENT CARTER'S DEFEAT FOR RE-ELECTION OBVIOUSLY HAS ROBBED BROWN OF THE CLOUT HE NEEDS TO BACK UP HIS ARGUMENTS THAT THE ALLIES MUST HONOR THEIR PLEDGES TO INCREASE MILITARY SPENDING BY AT LEAST 3 PERCENT.

LAST SPRING, AMERICAN DEFENSE OFFICIALS REPORTED THAT NATO DEFENSE MINISTERS HAD GIVEN A FAVORABLE RESPONSE TO U.S. URGINGS THAT THEY SPEED IMPROVEMENTS IN THEIR MILITARY FORCES, ESPECIALLY TO TAKE UP ANY SLACK IN WESTERN DEFENSES IF THE UNITED STATES MUST DIVERT MAJOR FORCES TO THE OIL-PRODUCING PERSIAN GULF REGION.

BUT EVEN BEFORE CARTER'S NOV. 4 DEFEAT BY RONALD REAGAN, DENMARK, THE NETHERLANDS, BRITAIN AND MOST RECENTLY WEST GERMANY GAVE INDICATIONS THEY MIGHT FALL SHORT OF THEIR PLEDGES BECAUSE OF ECONOMIC PROBLEMS.

PENTAGON OFFICIALS SAID BROWN WILL PROBABLY WARN THE ALLIES THAT THE INCOMING REAGAN ADMINISTRATION WILL INSIST ON THE NATO COUNTRIES DOING MORE IN THE MILITARY FIELD.

"OUR SENSE IS THAT OUR SUCCESSORS WILL HAVE AT LEAST AS MUCH A STRENGTH OF FEELING THAT WE HAVE ON THIS MATTER," SAID ONE SENIOR OFFICIAL WHO ASKED NOT TO BE NAMED PUBLICLY.

PENTAGON SOURCES SAID THE REAGAN ORGANIZATION WAS NOT INVITED TO SEND A REPRESENTATIVE TO BRUSSELS WITH BROWN -- A MOVE WHICH SOME OFFICIALS THOUGHT MIGHT HAVE STRONG INFLUENCE ON THE ATTITUDE OF THE NATO DEFENSE MINISTERS.

ACCORDING TO PENTAGON OFFICIALS, NO INVITATION WAS EXTENDED TO THE REAGAN ORGANIZATION BECAUSE IT HAD NOT YET NAMED ITS DEFENSE TRANSITION TEAM.

THE UNITED STATES HAS STRESSED TO ITS ALLIES THE IMPORTANCE OF BUILDING UP WAR RESERVE STOCKS OF AMMUNITION WHICH EXPERTS SAY ARE SERIOUSLY INADEQUATE.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- A TOP AIDE TO PRESIDENT CARTER SAID WEDNESDAY SOME OF CARTER'S JUDICIAL NOMINATIONS MAY GET BIPARTISAN SUPPORT AND SENATE CONFIRMATION BEFORE THE PRESIDENT LEAVES OFFICE.

AN AIDE TO RONALD REAGAN SAID, HOWEVER, EACH CASE WOULD HAVE TO BE CLEARED WITH THE INCOMING ADMINISTRATION.

"THERE ARE SOME JUDGESHIPS PENDING BEFORE THE SENATE WHICH WE THINK THERE MIGHT BE BIPARTISAN SUPPORT FOR AND AS TO WHICH THERE IS A PROSPECT FOR CONFIRMATION," WHITE HOUSE CHIEF OF STAFF JACK WATSON SAID.

"WE'LL WAIT AND SEE WHAT THE (SENATE) LEADERSHIP IS GOING TO DO," ED WEESE, DIRECTOR OF THE REAGAN TRANSITION TEAM, REPLIED. "IF THERE IS BIPARTISAN SUPPORT FOR A JUDGESHIP, I'M SURE THAT WILL HAVE BEEN CLEARED WITH US BEFORE IT GOES AHEAD.

"WE'LL WAIT AND SEE, AND TAKE THEM ON A ONE-BY-ONE BASIS."

WASHINGTON (AP) - CONGRESS RETURNED FOR A LAME-DUCK SESSION TODAY; AND HOUSE SPEAKER THOMAS P. O'NEILL SERVED NOTICE THAT PRESIDENT CARTER WOULD VETO ANY TAX CUT IT MAY PASS.

O'NEILL, D-MASS., SAID CARTER TOLD HIM IN A PHONE CONVERSATION EARLIER THIS WEEK THAT HE WOULD VETO A TAX CUT LIKE THAT SUPPORTED BY PRESIDENT-ELECT RONALD REAGAN AND BEING PRESSED BY CONGRESSIONAL REPUBLICANS.

ALTHOUGH A CARTER VETO OF THE MEASURE HAD BEEN CONSIDERED A LIKELY POSSIBILITY; THIS IS THE FIRST TIME A FLAT VETO THREAT HAS BEEN ISSUED.

WHILE THE TAX CUT APPEARS TO HAVE A GOOD CHANCE OF PASSING THE SENATE THIS YEAR; ITS FATE IN THE HOUSE HAS BEEN DOUBTFUL.

O'NEILL TOLD REPORTERS: "THE PRESIDENT TOLD ME HE WOULD VETO A TAX BILL HERE IT TO REACH HIS DESK. HE SAID IT WOULD BE INFLATIONARY."

HOUSE AND SENATE LEADERS PREDICTED THE POST-ELECTION SESSION WOULD BE BRIEF AND UNPRODUCTIVE. O'NEILL SAID IT WOULD LAST NO LONGER THAN THE FIRST WEEK IN DECEMBER; CHANGING HIS EARLIER FORECAST THAT THE SESSION COULD LAST UNTIL AFTER CHRISTMAS.

LAWMAKERS WERE EXPECTED TO MARK TIME FOR A NEW CONGRESS MORE INCLINED TO INCREASE DEFENSE SPENDING; CUT TAXES; PERMIT PRAYER IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND BAN ABORTIONS.
