



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Dear Mr. President:



I. PURPOSE

To familiarize you with several automated information systems which could serve as invaluable tools in researching the events and activities of your administration.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS AND PRESS PLANS

A. Background

Over the past four years an intensive effort has been undertaken to implement modern information processing technology within the White House. As a result this automated technology is being used in over 40 areas within the White House.

III. DEMONSTRATION OUTLINE

Four White House automated information systems have been selected for demonstration:

A. President's Diary

The Diary File accounts for the President's time on a 24 hour daily basis. Each meeting or activity is described and codes are assigned which categorize the type of activity (e.g., fixed appointment, official travel, congressional). Each attendee or participant is listed with his/her business title and a variety of codes. (e.g., government, media, hispanic, farmer). Time and location of each activity is also included. To-date, there are approximately 26 thousand separate meetings/activities recorded in the Diary.

B. Staff Secretary's Log

The Staff Secretary System (SEC-LOG) provides an index to all Presidential memoranda. The system provides basic data describing each memorandum (e.g., subject, originator, requested response) which can be used to retrieve original documents filed chronologically.

C. Gift File

The Gift File maintains a record of all gifts to the President and the First Family. The file contains information which identifies the gift, date of receipt, name, address of organization and donor, description, category codes and disposition, plus how the acknowledgment was handled.

D. Press Release System

The Press Release system is a computer file of indexed terms of the subjects contained within the press releases issued during the Carter Administration. This system permits the rapid retrieval of all press releases related to a selected subject.

SUBJECT: McClure Veto Provision

The full Senate Appropriations Committee included in its version of the Continuing Resolution a provision allowing the Chairman of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee to veto a designation under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act.

The Committee staff believes that such a provision is unconstitutional (Congress cannot delegate such power to a Committee or individual, assuming it has the power in the first place.) It will be attacked either on the Senate Floor or in conference. I cannot imagine the House allowing a Senator such power. Also, it is extremely doubtful that Senator Byrd would let this provision become law since there is no love lost between the two men.

I will stay on top of the situation and try to keep you posted.

Dear Mr. President:

As you address the difficult task of allocating FY 82 budget resources, I would urge, from a trade policy perspective, that the Export-Import Bank be accorded a high priority within the Budget.

One of the pervasive themes of your Administration has been to improve the effectiveness of U.S. export policy. During the past 4 years, international markets have become intensely competitive as developed countries have endeavored to offset sharply higher energy costs with expanded exports. The private sector and in particular your Export Council have underscored the need for substantially increased Eximbank financing to afford the U.S. exporter a competitive opportunity in the face of substantial, and often highly subsidized, financing offers by our major trading partners.

Under the leadership of the Treasury Department, your Administration has sought to reduce the general level of subsidies on export credits through reform of the OECD Arrangement on Officially Supported Export Credits. However, the reform deadline of December 1, endorsed at the Venice Summit in June, has not been met, largely due to the intransigence of the European Community. It is important that we bargain from a position of strength at the upcoming negotiating sessions scheduled for December 17-19. Such a position can be achieved through greater support for Eximbank and thus for U.S. exporters. The realization that a competitive advantage cannot be obtained by blocking reform must be clearly presented to the Europeans. What is needed now is a clear budget message that the United States will support its exports. I respectfully urge that you accept the Senate position on Eximbank for FY 81 and the Bank's full budget request for FY 82.

I am aware of the difficult task you face in making determinations as to the relative weights of a number of domestic and international priorities. I am also cognizant of the role an effective trade policy can play in increasing employment opportunities, stimulating business, and facilitating general economic growth. Export financing plays an instrumental role in achieving these goals. I therefore urge that the Export-Import Bank be accorded an authority level commensurate with the needs of U.S. exporters and the requirements of an increasingly competitive international economy.

I. PURPOSE

Congressman Corman requested the opportunity to discuss a few personal matters.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS & PRESS PLAN

Background: Congressman Corman was one of your most consistent supporters legislatively in the 95th and 96th Congresses. He endorsed your re-election early and persuaded a number of his California colleagues to endorse early in 1980.

Last week Corman requested this meeting to discuss personal matters including his views about any effect your concession may have had on his race. He feels that the press has inaccurately characterized his views.

Though he did not mention it in requesting this meeting, he has recently been involved in an effort to find a way to protect the Stanislaus River. Corman, Lionel Van Deerlin and Don Edwards recently met with Secretary Andrus to discuss ways to delay further filling of the New Melones Reservoir. The three Congressmen apparently have decided to ask you to issue an Executive Order designating the Stanislaus River Canyon a National Monument.

On Friday, Don Edwards requested that he, Corman, and Van Deerlin meet with you to discuss the Stanislaus. DPS has reservations about such use of your executive powers. Secretary Andrus' position on the issue is not clear.

SUBJECT: Opening of Fort Allen, Puerto Rico
for Haitian Refugees --
(For Your Information)

Increasing arrivals of Haitian refugees in South Florida combined with the slow resettlement process, require that we now open Fort Allen in Puerto Rico as a processing center. As of noon on Saturday, there were approximately 600 Haitians in temporary facilities in South Florida. The congestion in these facilities is compounding problems caused by Cuban refugees whose sponsorships have broken. I have authorized the Cuban/Haitian Task Force to announce that later this week we will begin taking Haitian arrivals to Puerto Rico for processing pending determination of their resettlement and legal status.

Secretary Harris concurs in this decision. I will notify Governor Romero of Puerto Rico and Governor Graham of Florida. The Task Force will notify other officials and organizations as appropriate.

Obviously, this is a step I take reluctantly, but circumstances in South Florida warrant this action.

MEMORANDUM TO THE PRESIDENT

SUBJECT: Weekly Report of ED Major Activities

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LEGISLATION

- o On December 3, the House passed H.J. Res. 637, the second continuing resolution on appropriations, providing funds for the continued operation of ED programs through June 5, 1981, or until an annual appropriations bill is enacted. The level of funding is the same as that provided in H.R. 7998, the House-passed FY 1981 Labor, HHS, Education appropriations bill. The bill includes two significant provisions affecting the Department's operations: 1) a provision prohibiting issuance of final Lau regulations prior to June 1, 1981; and 2) a provision barring the Secretary from preventing voluntary prayer in the classroom.

The Senate Appropriations Committee also reported its version of the resolution on December 3. The Senate version maintains funding at the levels provided in the House Labor, HHS, Education Appropriations bill, extending the resolution through September 30, 1981. Additionally, the Committee adopted more than 70 amendments to the House resolution, including: 1) an amendment authorizing Impact Aid payments to districts where Federally-connected children comprise 50 percent of enrollment; 2) an amendment appropriating \$15 million for educational services to Cuban and Haitian entrants; 3) an amendment providing \$2 million for the National Commission on Student Financial Assistance, authorized by the Education Amendments of 1980.

Final Senate floor action has not been scheduled.

- o H.R. 7765, the budget reconciliation bill, was sent to you this week. This legislation includes provisions which authorize the Internal Revenue Service to disclose to the Department of Education the names and addresses of students who have defaulted on student loans. The Department of Education supported these provisions.

MEETINGS AND SPEECHES

On Monday, I spoke to the National Consortium for Public Policy Education on the topic of the continuing need for citizen education and effective citizen participation in our society. The Consortium, founded by former HEW Secretary David Matthews, is comprised of educational institutions concerned with improving the processes for educating the public on major policy issues.

Subject: Highlights of Treasury Activities

1. <u>THE MARKETS AND THE DOLLAR</u>	<u>Today's Close</u>	<u>Change Since 11/28</u>

- Stock prices were driven lower over the week by mounting international tensions in the Middle East and Poland along with escalating domestic interest rates.
- Interest rates in the credit markets posted net increases this week as the Federal Reserve forcefully reined in credit. Short-term yields, however, are still below their March record peaks.
- Effective December 5, the Federal Reserve increased the discount rate by 1 percentage point to 13 percent and widened the bank surcharge to 3 percent from 2 percent.
- The prime lending rate, after being raised 3/4 percentage point to 18-1/2 percent this past Tuesday, today was increased another 1/2 percentage point to 19 percent.
- Over the week, the dollar in London traded mixed, improving against the major European currencies but eroding against the Japanese yen.
- A \$1.9 billion surge in commercial and industrial loans and a \$1.1 billion rise in M-1A and a \$1.2 billion increase in M-1B for the November 26 statement week had a negative impact on the Treasury securities market in today's afterhours trading. Evidence of continued acceleration of money and credit growth could adversely affect market psychology at the beginning of next week as well.

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2. CHRYSLER LOAN GUARANTEE BOARD

- . Chrysler Corporation will present its most recent operating and financial plans to the Loan Guarantee Board on Monday, December 8. Chrysler has asked the Board to be prepared to meet the following week to consider Chrysler's request for further Federal guarantees.

3. IDA

- . The Senate Appropriations Committee early this week deleted funding for IDA VI from the Continuing Resolution. The decision was based on the rationale that authorizing legislation could not be enacted this year. Several senators, principally Percy and Mathias, are sounding the prospects for reinstating IDA funding in the Continuing Resolution which would permit funding during FY 1981, if the new Administration chose to expedite an authorization bill. If IDA VI is not provided for in the continuing resolution, there is little prospect of obtaining an IDA appropriation next year.

4. DEBT LIMIT

- . Earlier this week in testimony before the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Debt Management, I recommended an increase in the debt limit to \$978.6 billion through September 1981. The House already approved this level last month. While Senate action is expected next week, it is unlikely to approve a new limit beyond \$935 billion as contained in the first budget resolution.

SUBJECT: Your Future

Bob McNamara told his Board the other day that you had shown more interest in LDC development than any of your predecessors in the previous twelve years. I hope that you will maintain your interest in helping poor people in poor countries after leaving office. You told your Hunger Commission that if you were not President you would like to work on world hunger. There are two ways to do this:

One is to try to arouse public opinion. If you mention in a press conference that you are interested in continuing to work on the world hunger program, invitations to join public commissions and the board of directors of such organizations as the Overseas Development Council will rain on you.

The other route is to get out in the field and do something about world hunger. I remember that you corresponded with a friend who was working for the Baptists in helping poor people in Africa grow more food.

Whichever of these two routes you chose (and they are not mutually exclusive) you could make a large contribution to solving one of the most important problems in the world today.

Dear Charles,

Thanks for the lunch on Friday. I always look forward to those occasions, and hope we can get together again soon.

As you suggested I spent some time over the weekend organizing a few thoughts about the Carter Library. It was a good exercise that helped me reach beyond November 4th.

The basic image for the Library is that an International Conference Center be related to the whole complex. All the other presidential libraries are essentially tourist attractions and I believe President Carter would want something more than this. The country needs for him to play a substantial role in addressing global issues and this could provide him with a very constructive way to do this.

The Library - Conference Center could host International Conferences designed to address global issues and how they relate to innocent human suffering. Some that quickly come to mind include the President's historical concern for human rights, distribution of food resources, energy, etc. It could be the first forum in this country that brings together the public, private, and voluntary sectors in a meaningful, constructive manner. (An acronym for the conference center could be PEACE - - political, economic, and cultural exchange).

At any rate, a forum needs to get the real leadership from these sectors together for some honest appraisal of the issues and model building for the future. Reagan's election, as we will soon discover, represents an evasion of the real issues that confront the globe. I believe the President, as a private citizen, could play an enormously helpful role and significantly impact the future.

The Conference Center wing would have to be a huge structure, eventually housing five hundred or so people. The top floor of the center could be a presidential suite to house the Carter family and serve as his Atlanta headquarters. Conference rooms themselves may need to be equipped for translation.



The Library wing needs to be unusually effective at impacting any visitor with the personal magnitude of the President and his vocational achievements. However, it needs to go further and sponsor various research projects that insure that the facility has a purpose beyond tourism. It needs to be a hub of profound reflection and serious research. The Library could award grants for special projects. The library could serve a very catalytic role in revitalizing education in Georgia and the nation. (I'm disturbed that Georgia students still score decisively lower than the national average on college entrance exams).


With these purposes in mind funding would not be a major problem but would require a substantial effort. I envision about one-fourth of the amount coming from wealthy individuals. A bequest program would also be needed for future funding. A grassroots campaign could raise an additional 25%, and the remaining from foundations and corporations. My initial thought was to ask foreign leaders and governments to participate in the funding, but I'm not sure of all the legal issues related to something like this.

Earnings from the Conference Center could more than provide for the total operation, maintenance, security, etc.

Charles, I'm sure you appreciate how presumptuous this exercise made me feel. Undoubtedly, the President and his staff already have a few basic images in mind. I do think its highly important for the President to begin exploring various possibilities prior to January 20th. He should consider hosting a dinner for his friends and discuss the future with the library in mind.

Let's get together again soon.

SUBJECT: Secretary Miller's Memorandum on Gasohol

As you remember, to effect a campaign promise you directed Secretary Miller by note on October 30 to take whatever action is necessary to ensure that foreign-produced alcohol will not benefit from the gasohol exemption to the gasoline tax.

The Treasury is reluctant to do so, and Secretary Miller has responded to your note by submitting the attached memorandum, which explains that the only way this can be achieved is by replacing the gasoline tax exemption by a income tax production subsidy for domestic fuel alcohol.

We believe that, to honor your campaign commitment, we must at a minimum propose the appropriate legislation. While such legislation has no chance of passage in this session of Congress, we will at least have done what we can to fulfill our pledge.

If you agree, we suggest that you return Secretary Miller's memorandum with a notation that Treasury should prepare and submit the necessary legislation.

SUBJECT APPLICATION OF EXCISE TAX EXEMPTION FOR GASOHOL
MADE FROM IMPORTED ALCOHOL

In your note of October 30 you informed me that the Congressionally enacted exemption of gasohol from the 4¢ a gallon gasoline tax should be applied only to domestically-produced alcohol, to encourage development of the domestic industry.

After reviewing the possible ways to accomplish this, it appears that legislation will be required. It is not possible to reinstate the gasoline tax only for imported fuel alcohol by administrative action. Also, under present circumstances, there does not seem to be a basis for other administrative action, such as an import fee or quota.

As to a legislative solution, a tax only on gasohol made from imported alcohol or a tariff on imported fuel alcohol would violate our GATT obligations. An acceptable alternative would be to reinstate the gasoline tax on gasohol, and grant a direct subsidy in the amount of the tax for domestically-produced alcohol used in gasohol.

As required by the windfall profits tax acts, I am sending a report to the Senate Finance and House Ways and Means Committees outlining the various options. The report points out that if foreign-produced alcohol is not to have the benefit of the gasoline tax exemption, then the preferable solution, consistent with our international obligations, would be enactment of a production subsidy for domestic fuel alcohol.

SUBJECT: Preparation of Your Farewell Address

Here is a suggested timetable for your consideration with Jack, Jody and the speechwriters.

1. Speech strategy discussion with you covering themes, topics, tone for a memorable message; including your designation of the clearance group; we recommend sometime Monday or Tuesday afternoon of next week at a time when you can talk and think with 3 or 4 people in a relaxed and reflective way.
2. Preparation of a cleared draft for you by Tuesday, December 16; requested reactions to the speechwriters by Thursday, December 18 from you.
3. Preparation of a final cleared draft for you by Monday, December 22. This would provide you with a final version for further reflection and revision over the Christmas holidays if you wish.
4. Probable delivery date approximately one week before Inauguration, but ideally a day or two before Governor Reagan comes to Washington permanently; probably Tuesday, January 13 or Wednesday, January 14.

THE CHAIRMAN, INTELLIGENCE OVERSIGHT BOARD
