SUBJECT: Retention of Presidential Papers in My Files

I have reflected on our pre-Christmas conversation concerning my desire to have access in Washington to Presidential papers relating to domestic policy. As you know, I plan to remain in Washington rather than return to Atlanta.

I hereby seek your permission to have possession of, or access to, Presidential papers as described below, it being understood that I will abide by the restrictions on disclosure and publication contained in the departure agreement:

1. I wish to retain in my possession a copy of approximately 30 memoranda from me to you. These memoranda will be identified in the attachment to my departure agreement.

2. The Archivist has agreed to make storage available in the National Archives Building in Washington for up to 60 boxes of domestic policy papers. These include a chronological file of all memoranda from me to you, materials prepared for debates, Economic Policy Group discussion papers, copies of Frank Moore's weekly reports and weekly Domestic Policy Staff status reports. In addition, copies of working subject files on key domestic policy matters would be included. I emphasize that the materials retained at the Archives would be copies of Presidential papers which would be in the Carter repository in Atlanta, and I assure you that I would not duplicate or disseminate any of these materials without your permission.

We believe that the best person to fill that position is Joan Mondale, who has served as a symbol of your administration's commitment to the arts. As you know, she has done an outstanding job in this capacity.

Joan Mondale (Minnesota): author of Politics in Art; potter; graduate of Macalester College. She has worked in several art museums, and has been involved in all aspects of the arts. She wants very much to serve and will devote a good deal of her time and energy to the work of the Center.

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JOAN ADAMS MONDALE
(Mrs. Walter F. Mondale)

Joan Adams Mondale was born August 8, 1930, in Eugene, Oregon. The family moved to Columbus, Ohio and later to Wallingford, Pennsylvania where she attended Media Friends School and Nether Providence High School.

When her father, Dr. John Maxwell Adams, was named Chaplain of Macalester College, the family moved to Minnesota. Mrs. Mondale finished her last year of high school at the Summit School in St. Paul.

In the fall of 1948, she entered Macalester College graduating with a major in history and minors in art and French. During her college years, she worked at the Minneapolis Institute of Arts cataloging prints and teaching children's art classes.

After graduation, Mrs. Mondale worked as an Assistant Slide Librarian at the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and later as an Assistant in Education at the Minneapolis Institute of Arts, giving guided tours and lectures.

Although both Joan and Fritz Mondale attended Macalester College, it was not until three years after Joan's graduation that they met on a blind date arranged by her sister,

Jane Canby. Fifty-three days later they were engaged, and they married in December of 1955.

When her husband was appointed Minnesota's Attorney General in 1960 she gave campaign speeches in his behalf statewide. As an active and enthusiastic participant in the Minnesota Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party, Joan Mondale was elected chairwoman of the 7th ward in Minneapolis and served until she moved to Washington when her husband came to the Senate in 1964.

Mrs. Mondale continued her interest in art when she moved to Washington by giving weekly tours at the National Gallery of Art and taking pottery lessons from a master potter who has called her "my most talented student."

She wrote *POLITICS IN ART*, a non-fiction book published in 1972. She feels there is a close relationship between the concerns of the artist and those of the politician. "Both deal with human emotions and human conditions. Both seek to tell us about the good and the bad around us. The artist often dramatizes the same need for change and improvement for which the politician is seeking answers."

Joan Mondale has been an active member of the Woman's National Democratic Club serving on its Board of Governors for two years. She served as a member of the board of the John Easton Public School PTA in the District of Columbia and on the Advisory Council of Reading is Fundamental, an organization which brings books and the joy of learning-through-reading into the lives of young children.

In 1973, Mrs. Mondale was elected to a two-year term on the Board of Directors of the Associated Council of the Arts, a private non-profit organization which represents all the state arts agencies and approximately 800 community arts councils and allied organizations. She has also worked part-time at a salaried job conducting tours of historical and artistic points of interest for convention groups visiting the Nation's Capitol.

Mrs. Mondale, in expressing her interest in art, has said: "Today, art is no longer just looking at a painting in a museum. It is no longer elitist. Art is for everyone -- everywhere in this country. It is the total range of creativity -- the way of finding one's own private world. For me, it has been the joy of making pottery -- for others it may be teaching music -- painting -- or gardening.

Creativity covers the whole range of human endeavor...there are no limits on the renewable resources of human energy which produce services...The arts are themselves a service industry, employing thousands. And surveys show that for every dollar spent in admissions to art events, three dollars are spent on related activities -- such as transportation, restaurants and child care."

"We are learning that arts should be considered as essential in the planning of communities; they are becoming part of the mainstream of life:...the arts can add to the economic development and welfare of our communities."

The Vice President, and Mrs. Mondale and their three children, Teddy - 19, Eleanor Jane - 17 and William - 15, are the first family to live in the Vice President' House since its designation as the official residence in 1974.

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SUBJECT: Weekly Report of HHS Activities

Visit of Egyptian Health Minister. The Minister of Health of Egypt, Dr. Mamdouh Gabr, is visiting Washington January 11-15 as the official guest of the Department. The purpose of the visit is to renew, for a five-year period, the U.S.-Egypt Agreement for Cooperation in Health. Under this Agreement, an extensive program of health research and training has been established.

Special Procurement Program Targets Exceeded. The Department greatly exceeded its Fiscal Year 1980 special procurement targets in all categories. The women-owned business target was surpassed by 220 percent; the labor surplus area target by 77 percent; the minority business target by 29 percent; and the small business target by 17 percent.

News Conference on Annual Smoking and Health Report. Dr. Julius B. Richmond, the Surgeon General, will hold a press conference on January 12 to announce the release of "The Health Consequences of Smoking: The Changing Cigarette, A Report of the Surgeon General." The report will reaffirm the Public Health Service's previous position that there are no safe cigarettes. While smokers of low "tar" and nicotine cigarettes have a slightly reduced risk of lung cancer, their risk remains significantly greater than that of non-smokers. Furthermore, there is no conclusive evidence to suggest that people who switch from high to low "tar" and nicotine brands experience any reduced risk of other diseases. The report notes that the composition of cigarettes is changing fast and calls for manufacturers to provide information on additives so that health effects can be evaluated.

Unveiling of First Portrait of a Member of the Carter Cabinet. The first portrait of a member of the Carter Cabinet will be unveiled tonight at a reception given by Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Moon Landrieu for me and the artist, Aaron Shikler, who painted my portrait as HUD Secretary. The oil painting, by the artist who painted the official portraits of President and Mrs. Kennedy and Robert Kennedy, was commissioned by a committee established without my knowledge. It is my hope that the prohibition against Federal funding of such portraits will be rescinded so that future portraits of the Carter Cabinet will be of a quality at least as high as that of the first portrait. X

REPORT TO THE PRESIDENT

Specialty Steel: A press release announcing the institution of a surge mechanism for specialty steel was issued Thursday afternoon. I believe that the industry and public reactions will reaffirm the appropriateness of your decision with regard to this matter.

Minority Business Advisory Committee: The Advisory Committee conveyed to me this week their final report setting forth their comments with regard to the Department's program to assist minority businesses. The report contained constructive suggestions for the improvement of our activities, and considerable praise for the efforts of the Department and of your Administration to improve the economic condition of the minority community.

Productivity: I met this week with the members of the GAO Task Force on Industrial Productivity. They expressed considerable concern for the failure to define an appropriate and essential role of the Federal Government in support of the development of productivity related industrial technologies. I expect that their final report will call for more concerted and focused action by the Executive Branch in general and the Department of Commerce in particular.

Transition: The process of transition has become an increasingly difficult one much, I believe, to the disadvantage of the effective functioning of government agencies. It is difficult to reach satisfactory conclusions with regard to even some of the more pressing problems, and the bureaucracy is marked by a hesitancy on all levels to make decisions. It suggests to me that such an interregnum would be handled much more beneficially if the period were significantly abbreviated. Should you concur on balance with such an assessment, I would suggest that such a personal observation by you might contribute to the long-term interest of the Nation.

SUBJECT: Significant Issues for the Week of January 5

The following are significant actions I intend to take prior to January 20.

Auto Study - Next week I will submit to you our major study on the long-term future of the auto industry. It is a forthright document which will generate considerable interest and reaction. I will present the study to the public through a speech in Ann Arbor, a press conference, and TV appearances.

Regulations on Highway Routing of Radioactive Materials - Next week I intend to approve final regulations on the highway routing of radioactive materials. The regulations are necessary to prevent proliferation of State and local rules which prevent movement of radioactive materials or create additional risks in such movements. The regulations will designate the Interstate highway system as the preferred route, will allow States to designate other routes after consultation with local governments, and will pre-empt State and local actions which would be inconsistent. This is a controversial regulation arising originally from action by New York City to prohibit the movement of spent fuel from Brookhaven National Laboratory through the City. While some local States and localities will still oppose the final rule, we have accommodated their views to the extent possible within the basic need to publish a Federal rule. The proposed rule was published in January, 1980 and was subjected to thorough public hearings and comment.

Subject: Weekly Report of Major Departmental Activities

Site Approval Clarification Issued. HUD issued a notice to its field offices clarifying the procedures to be followed in approving sites for new Federally subsidized housing projects in areas of minority concentration. The notice emphasizes the importance of local needs and circumstances, and enumerates factors to be considered in locating Federally assisted housing in areas of minority concentration. We encourage flexibility in siting determinations while underscoring our duty to promote fair housing.

GNMA To Conduct Project Loan Auction. GNMA announced that it will offer for sale by auction approximately \$370 million of FHA-insured project mortgages on Wednesday, February 11. These mortgages were purchased by GNMA through its Tandem plan operations. The February auction will be the third of six bi-monthly auctions to be conducted by GNMA during this fiscal year.

Federal Judge Resigns from St. Louis School Desegregation Case. Senior U.S. District Judge James H. Meredith has resigned from the St. Louis school desegregation case because of health problems. The Chief Judge of the District has appointed U.S. District Judge William L. Hungate as a replacement. Based on an order by Judge Meredith, the Department has developed a plan for insuring that the operation of Federally assisted housing programs in the St. Louis metropolitan area will facilitate the required school desegregation. This plan and related documents will now be reviewed by Judge Hungate. Due to the vast amount of testimony in this case, it is anticipated that it will be some time before any findings related to housing will be available from the Court.

- . Stocks, after rising sharply early in the week, plunged on profit-taking, spurred in part by a sell recommendation by a well-know analyst. Both the DJIA and the more broadly-based NYSE composite index closed slightly lower on the week. Trading volume was heavy, and on Wednesday, new record highs of 93 million and 16 million shares were set on the NYSE and AMEX, respectively.
- . Interest rates in the credit markets rose on balance over the week, as higher Federal funds and dealer financing rates generated speculation about a possible tightening of monetary policy. Both short-term and long-term rates adjusted slightly upwards. Statistics released today showing strength in the economy in December added to the nervousness of the markets.
- . Chase Manhattan and Citibank led a 1/2 point drop in the prime to 20 percent. Most major banks followed.
- . The dollar in London closed mixed against the major foreign currencies. It rose against the Swiss franc and fell against the German mark and the Japanese yen.
- . Today's report of a substantial decline in the monetary aggregates during the week ending January 2 (M1-A down \$2.3 billion and M1-B down \$2.5 billion) sparked a major recovery in the money and capital markets, erasing all of the losses of early today.

2. CHRYSLER

- . The Loan Guarantee Board has informed Chrysler that January 14 is the last day for a decision by the Board on Chrysler's application for an additional \$400 million in loan guarantees. Chrysler has also been told that it must obtain concessions from its workers, suppliers, and lenders which are at least equal to those which Chrysler previously proposed. Negotiations to achieve the concessions are currently underway and are expected to continue through the weekend.
- . This week, I met with representatives of Chrysler's lenders and will do so again over the weekend to encourage their cooperation with Chrysler. At this point, it is too early to predict the outcome of negotiations or whether the Loan Guarantee Board will be able to act before the 14th.

SUBJECT: Weekly Activity Report
Week of January 3 - January 9, 1981

1. Transition: I have met several times with Secretary-designate Edwards. We have briefed him on some of the key issues confronting the Department and we are helping him prepare for his confirmation hearings. His view of the Department seems to be changing as he learns more about its functions.
2. Algerian LNG: Senior Algerian officials will be in Washington next Monday for negotiations with a U.S. Government team on Algerian LNG. This will be the sixth meeting concerning an interim price agreement for the El Paso LNG project.
3. Canadian Natural Gas Price Increase: The Canadian Embassy has informed the Department that the Government of Canada will announce an increase in the price of exported natural gas from the present level of \$4.47 per million Btu to something above \$5.00 per million Btu. Any price increase announced before January 15 would take effect on April 1, 1981. The Department's calculation shows the alternate U.S. fuels price for December 1980 as \$4.96 per million Btu. This increase would be the first since February 17, 1980, when the export price was raised from \$3.45 to \$4.47 per million Btu. The increase will allow Canadian producers to pass on to U.S. consumers the new \$0.25 per million Btu sales tax imposed by the Canadian federal government.
4. Testimony: Our final statistics for 1980 showed that witnesses from the Department testified before Congress 365 times last year, far more than any other civilian department or agency.

SUBJECT: Unemployment Cuts and the 1982 Budget

Now that OMB has whittled the 1982 budget deficit to \$25 billion, there is a very strong case for reconsidering your decision to cut the extended benefits program for those facing long term joblessness.

You were offered two options for cutting back the program:

1. elimination of the national trigger, and
2. dropping those on the extended benefit program from the state and national trigger calculation.

You chose the second option. However, at the unemployment rate now projected for 1982 - 7.6% - the effect of the change in calculation will eliminate the national extended benefits program altogether. OMB's \$2.1 billion saving over current policy is based on the assumption that there will be no program. (OMB's reestimates have reduced the cost of restoring this cut from roughly \$3 billion to roughly \$2 billion.)

DOL estimates that 300,000 people each month in 1982 will be exhausting their basic 26 weeks of benefits. Without a nationally triggered program, those in very high unemployment areas in states with relatively moderate unemployment will not be eligible for the 13 week extended benefits. DOL estimates that 37 states will be affected.

A \$2.1 billion add-back would not be a major increase in the 1982 deficit.

But our current budget position - to in effect eliminate the national program at unemployment rates below 8 percent - represents a major step away from this Administration's commitment to the welfare of working men and women. In the next four years the Democratic party must stand - and be seen as standing for blue-collar American workers if we hope to regain power. For the AFL-CIO, and for hundreds of thousands of American workers this is a gut, bread and butter issue.

I strongly urge, that given the great political importance of this issue, continued high unemployment, and the present predicted level of the 1982 deficit, that you reconsider your position and direct OMB to add-back the \$2.1 billion for the Extended Benefits program.

In addition to restoring the cut, we recommend you call for a major restructuring and reform of the program by shifting the basic unit for calculating the trigger for the extended benefit program from states to local labor market areas. This approach would be more highly targeted than the existing program and is consistent with the views of House Democrats. While this reform can produce significant savings in FY '83, the necessary data cannot be developed in time to effect the 1982 budget.

If you chose to call for such reform it will be necessary for business and labor to work closely with the Department of Labor to bring about the changes.

Mr. Stockman has already placed the extended benefits program on his hit list. Carter Administration support for a major cutback will make his job easier, and that of the Democrats in Congress much harder.

To make remarks at the presentation of the President's Award for Energy Efficiency to 126 persons and organizations in recognition of their outstanding energy conservation efforts.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS AND PRESS PLAN

A. Background:

The ceremony is the culmination of the Administration's energy conservation outreach program. This inter-agency effort was coordinated by the White House Energy Conservation Task Force, and was launched April 29, 1980 with a major briefing on energy conservation. On July 22, 1980, you presented the first set of Presidential Awards for conservation achievement in the transportation sector.

At this ceremony, awards will be presented for achievement in the residential, agricultural, as well as transportation sectors. Awardees were selected by a committee of the Task Force which evaluated interim and year-end reports describing energy conservation progress during 1980.

B. Participants:

Approximately 100 of the 126 award recipients are expected to attend this event. All regions of the Nation are represented, and the awardees include state and local governmental units, major corporations, educational institutions, trade associations, small businesses, farms, community organizations and individuals.

C. Press Plan:

Open press and White House photographers. Individual photos of the award presentations after you leave will be taken by White House photographers.

III. Agenda

When you arrive, Hugh Carter, Secretaries Duncan, Goldschmidt and Bergland and Under Secretary Marrero (HUD) will be on the stage. Your remarks will open the ceremony. After you leave, Hugh Carter will introduce Secretary Duncan to make additional remarks. The awards will then be presented by the Cabinet representatives. Anne Wexler will close the ceremony.

I. PURPOSE

To greet members of the Commission and representatives of the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA).

II. BACKGROUND

The White House Record Library is a collection of music, drama, poetry, and prose reflective of our nation's cultural interests. Part of the White House Historical Association, it was established in 1973 and is administered by a volunteer commission whose members are appointed by the First Lady. Commissioners include representatives of the recording industry, performers, composers, critics, and scholars. The Commission's expenses are paid for by the RIAA.

Over the last four years, the Commission has added 800 new recordings to the Library. 


Dear Congressman Rangel:

Earlier, I made a commitment to you that I would seek additional funds in Fiscal Year 1981 for drug abuse and drug treatment programs. These Federal programs are supporting major efforts already underway in four key cities, including New York.

I intend to fulfill that commitment by requesting additional 1981 funds from two sources. For the Drug Enforcement Administration, I will request supplemental 1981 funds of \$3,080,000. These funds will assist State and local governments in the purchase of evidence and information and in other support costs for local police, channelled through DEA's Task Force Program.

As you know, my FY-81 budget calls for an elimination of State formula grants including \$38 million for drug abuse. I am requesting authority to reprogram \$3.5 million from State drug abuse formula grant funds to drug abuse project grants. These funds are available under the Continuing Resolution. Of this amount, \$2.7 million will support 1,254 methadone maintenance and detoxification treatment slots. The remaining \$0.8 million will continue support in FY-81 for the 884 slots made available through supplemental awards during the last quarter of FY-80. Hopefully, these two actions will offset the reductions in treatment in the targeted cities of the Northeast occasioned by the elimination of formula grants.
