- I. PURPOSE: Follow-up meeting; to provide assessment of Administration's progress/problems.
 - II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS, AND PRESS PLAN:
 - A. Background: You previously indicated your interest in continuing informal consultations with Messrs. Hill and Russell.
 - B. Participants: The President; Jesse Hill; Herman Russell; and Hamilton Jordan.
 - C. Press Plan: No coverage.
 - III. TALKING POINTS:
 - 1. Perceptions of Administration's performance/problems.
 - a. You will probably be requested to appoint a black Atlantan male to your staff who has strong ties with black businessmen in the South.
- Possible options they might suggest to you:
- . Bill Clements - recently appointed Associate Administrator for Minority Business, SBA. Bring to White House or designate as your liaison for minority business.
 - . Bernard Porsche - currently Herman's special assistant; former coordinator of EPA federal grants, Atlanta region.
 - . Johnnie Johnson - currently highest black staff person with MARTA. Bring to White House or appoint Deputy Administrator, Urban Mass Public Transportation Administration (UMPTA), Department of Transportation.

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2. Stu will begin monthly policy forums with national Black organizations on Wednesday, August 24 to systematically review issues and Administration initiatives.
3. "Summit Meeting" of Civil Rights leadership. Vernon Jordan has called this meeting in New York for late August. You anticipate meeting with group, if requested.
4. Department of Transportation, Minority Business Resource Center -- Citizens' Advisory Committee.

Jesse Hill will probably be asked to chair this 5-member committee in early September. He should be encouraged to do so. The Minority Business Resource Center (MBRC) and advisory committee were created by legislation to involve minorities in the revitalization of the nation's railroads. Plans are well underway for the Northeast Corridor, and \$50 million in contract awards are to be made before October 1.

Although Secretary Adams is totally supportive of affirmative involvement of minorities in this project, implementation appears to be faltering. Congressman Parren Mitchell has expressed serious concerns about departmental laxity in getting the MBRC fully operational.

LEGIONNAIRES:

TODAY OUR NATION FACES A TROUBLESOME PASSAGE -- REQUIRING
DRAMATIC CHANGES IN OUR SOURCES OF ENERGY. IT IS A PASSAGE BOTH
DIFFICULT AND POTENTIALLY PERILOUS. NONETHELESS, IT IS ONE
THROUGH WHICH -- WITH FORESIGHT AND WITH DEDICATION -- WE CAN
TRIUMPHANTLY COME. THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES HAS SOUNDED
A ~~CLARION~~ CLARION CALL -- OF WARNING AND OF CHALLENGE. TO THAT
SUMMONS LEGIONNAIRES ALONG WITH OTHER AMERICANS WILL RESPOND.
IT CALLS US TO A DIFFERENT TYPE OF BATTLEFIELD -- ONE THAT REQUIRES
LESS RAW COURAGE THAN IT DOES PERSISTENCE AND PATIENT EFFORT.

IF WE AS A PEOPLE RESPOND -- AS WE HAVE DONE BEFORE -- THEN
WE SHALL WITH RELATIVE EASE MOVE THROUGH A DIFFICULT TRANSITION OF
PROSPECTIVE OIL STRINGENCY INTO A NEW FUTURE IN WHICH OUR ENERGY
SUPPLIES WILL BE PROVIDED BY NEW SOURCES AND NEW TECHNOLOGIES ACHIEVED
THROUGH AMERICAN IMAGINATION AND INGENUITY. IF WE FAIL TO RESPOND,
WE SHALL FACE A GROWING MENACE TO OUR ECONOMY AND TO OUR POLITICAL
AND SOCIAL STABILITY. CONSEQUENTLY WE CANNOT AFFORD TO FAIL.

PRESIDENT CARTER HAS CALLED FOR THE MORAL EQUIVALENT OF WAR. THIS DOES NOT -- HAPPILY -- MEAN THAT THE NATION NEED GO ON A WARTIME FOOTING OR RESORT TO WARTIME MEASURES. BUT IT DOES MEAN THAT WE MUST ACHIEVE THE COHESION AND THAT SENSE OF NATIONAL PURPOSE NORMALLY ACHIEVED ONLY IN TIME OF WAR.

IN ITSELF THE ENERGY CRISIS PROVIDES NO CLEAR, UNEQUIVOCAL SIGNAL OF NATIONAL DANGER SUCH AS THAT REPRESENTED BY PEARL HARBOR. INSTEAD THE DANGER IS MORE SUBTLE, MORE COMPLEX. IT CAN BE GRASPED ONLY THROUGH ANALYSIS AND COUNTERED ONLY THROUGH VISION. YET THE SIGNS AND THE PORTENTS HAVE CONTINUED TO GROW. INDEED, ONE MIGHT DESCRIBE THE BRIEF EMBARGO OF 1973-74 AS AN UNDISCERNED PEARL HARBOR.

ONLY LATELY HAVE WE BEGUN TO GRASP THE MAGNITUDE OF THE ENERGY PROBLEM. AND OUR AWARENESS IS YET IMPERFECT. RECENT POLLS HAVE DISCLOSED THAT SOME FIFTY PERCENT OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE DO NOT KNOW THAT THE UNITED STATES IMPORTS ANY OIL AT ALL. THIS IS DISTURBING WHEN OUR IMPORT DEPENDENCY HAS ALREADY REACHED ALMOST FIFTY PERCENT. THUS, ALTOGETHER TOO MANY AMERICANS APPARENTLY BELIEVE THAT WE ARE SELF-SUSTAINING AND POSSESS ENERGY INVULNERABILITY. THEY CANNOT THEREFORE APPRECIATE THE CONSTRAINTS THAT CONTINUING ECONOMIC GROWTH AND GROWING DEPENDENCY WOULD IMPOSE ON OUR FOREIGN AND DEFENSE POLICIES -- OR ANTICIPATE THE EVEN GREATER VULNERABILITY THAT WE WILL FACE AS OIL PRODUCTION WORLDWIDE REACHES THE POINT THAT IT CAN GROW NO FURTHER.

HOW DID WE GET WHERE WE ARE TODAY? LET US EXAMINE THE BACKGROUND.

TIME WAS THAT OUR ENERGY PROBLEMS LIKE OUR SECURITY PROBLEMS, TO WHICH THEY ARE INTIMATELY RELATED, WERE EASILY BORNE. IN THE WAKE OF WORLD WAR II, AND DOWN INTO THE VIETNAM WAR, THE PREEMINENCE OF AMERICAN POWER REMAINED UNQUESTIONED. THE EXPANSION OF THE INTERNATIONAL ECONOMY AND THE MAINTENANCE OF SECURITY TOOK PLACE UNDER THE PROTECTION OF THAT AMERICAN POWER. IN THAT ERA WE ALSO WERE TOTALLY SECURE IN OUR ENERGY SUPPLIES. INDEED, OUR CAPACITY WAS SO GREAT, RELATIVE TO DEMAND, THAT WE COULD NOT ONLY SATISFY OUR DOMESTIC REQUIREMENTS, BUT COULD ALSO TAKE CARE OF OUR ALLIES IN A PERIOD OF EMERGENCY. IN THE SUEZ CRISIS OF 1956, FOR EXAMPLE, THE SHUT-IN PRODUCTION CAPACITY OF THE UNITED STATES WAS BY ITSELF SUFFICIENT THAT WE COULD TIDE EUROPE THROUGH A PERIOD OF CUT-OFF.

IN THE SUBSEQUENT TWENTY YEARS VAST CHANGES HAVE TAKEN PLACE. AMERICAN OIL CONSUMPTION HAS GROWN TO SO GREAT AN EXTENT THAT EVEN WITH ENLARGED PRODUCTION WE CAN ACCOMMODATE LITTLE MORE THAN HALF OF OUR DOMESTIC REQUIREMENTS. AND, OF COURSE, THERE IS PRECIOUSLY LITTLE SPARE CAPACITY TO TIDE OTHER NATIONS OVER IN A TIME OF TROUBLE.

JUST AS POLITICAL SECURITY HAS BEEN AFFECTED BY A WORLD GROWN MORE FRACTIOUS, JUST AS OUR MILITARY POSITION HAS BEEN CHALLENGED

BY THE STEADILY GROWING POWER OF THE SOVIET UNION, SO HAS OUR OVERALL POSITION BEEN FURTHER WEAKENED BY THE NEW FACT OF SUBSTANTIAL ENERGY DEPENDENCY. ENERGY SUPPLY AND SECURITY HAVE ALWAYS GONE HAND IN HAND. BUT THE UNITED STATES HAS BEEN BLESSED WITH ABUNDANT RESOURCES, SO THAT THE CONNECTION BETWEEN ENERGY AND SECURITY COULD BE ACCEPTED WITHOUT BEING EXPLICITLY RECOGNIZED.

YET, AS THE WORLD HAS BECOME MORE INTERDEPENDENT, AND AS OUR OWN DEPENDENCY HAS GROWN, OUR ABILITY TO PROTECT OUR VITAL INTERESTS HAS COME UNDER A NEW AND DIFFERENT CHALLENGE.

MOREOVER, THERE IS STILL A MORE FUNDAMENTAL AND UNDERLYING ISSUE THAT GOES BEYOND THE ORDINARY CONSIDERATIONS OF SECURITY POLICY. IT IS A PROBLEM, THAT WE SHARE WITH ALL OTHER NATIONS, OF PROSPECTIVE WORLDWIDE SHORTAGE. IT IS THE PROSPECT THAT WITHIN A DECADE OIL PRODUCTION WORLDWIDE WILL HAVE REACHED A LIMIT BEYOND WHICH IT WILL NOT BE POSSIBLE SIGNIFICANTLY TO INCREASE PRODUCTION. SOMETIME IN THE EARLY 1990'S OIL PRODUCTION WORLDWIDE WILL PEAK OUT AND BEGIN ITS LONG SLIDE DOWNWARD. BUT EVEN BEFORE THEN WE SHALL APPROACH A PRODUCTION CEILING SUCH THAT OUTPUT CANNOT ACCOMMODATE FURTHER INCREASES IN DEMAND. CONSEQUENTLY, EXPANDING SUPPLIES OF OIL -- THE WORLD'S FUEL OF CHOICE -- WILL NOT SUPPLY THE ADDITIONAL ENERGY TO SUSTAIN FURTHER ECONOMIC GROWTH AND RISING STANDARDS OF LIVING. THIS BRIEF PERIOD, A CENTURY IN WHICH OIL HAS BECOME THE PRINCIPAL MOTIVE FORCE OF WORLDWIDE ECONOMIC EXPANSION WILL BE AT AN END. WE, ALONG WITH ALL

OTHER NATIONS, SHALL HAVE TO TURN TO ALTERNATIVE SOURCES OF SUPPLY -- AND IN THE PERIOD OF GRACE, ALLOWED TO US, SEEK OUT THOSE ALTERNATIVE SOURCES.

THERE ARE, OF COURSE, ALWAYS POLLYANNAS WHO WILL BELIEVE THAT NOTHING, THAT THEY WISH NOT TO OCCUR, CAN POSSIBLY OCCUR. THEY WILL SUGGEST THAT, OF COURSE, THERE MUST BE MORE OIL OUT THERE -- TO ACCOMMODATE OUR EVER-EXPANDING APPETITE. BE NOT DECEIVED. OUR VORACIOUS DEMAND FOR OIL -- DOUBLING EVERY DECADE, INCREASING THIRTY FOLD IN HALF A CENTURY -- IS BEGINNING TO ENCROACH NOT ONLY ON POTENTIAL PRODUCTION LIMITS BUT ON POTENTIAL LONG TERM SUPPLY. IN THIS DECADE ALONE THE WORLD WILL CONSUME NOT ONLY ONE-THIRD OF ITS PROVEN RESERVES, BUT WILL ALSO CONSUME ONE-TENTH OF ALL THE OIL THAT THE GEOLOGISTS IN THEIR WILDEST DREAMS EVER EXPECTED MIGHT EXIST WORLDWIDE -- AND MIGHT BE FOUND AND RECOVERED.

THUS, WE -- ALONG WITH OTHER NATIONS -- FACE AN ALTERED AND POTENTIALLY DISTRESSING FUTURE. LET US GATHER OUR COURAGE AND DETERMINATION AND FACE UP TO IT.

WE MUST NOT IMITATE THE GRASSHOPPER IN AESOP'S FABLE. WE MUST AVOID A POLICY OF DRIFT -- UNTIL THE MOMENT OF ACUTE CRISIS IS UPON US. IF WE HAVE THE APPROPRIATE VISION AND FORESIGHT, WE SHALL TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE TIME THAT IS AVAILABLE TO US -- AND ACT NOW.

WE SHOULD BEGIN NOW -- WHILE WE STILL HAVE TIME AND BEFORE THE ERA OF RESTRICTED OIL AND GAS AVAILABILITY IS UPON US -- TO ALTER THE CAPITAL EQUIPMENT THAT SUSTAINS AND WILL SUSTAIN THE AMERICAN STANDARD OF LIVING -- OUR FACTORIES, OUR HOMES, OUR AUTOMOBILES. OUR FACTORIES AND POWER PLANTS SHOULD INCREASINGLY BURN COAL OR URANIUM -- WHICH THESE STATIONARY FACILITIES, UNLIKE OUR TRANSPORTATION, CAN UTILIZE AT SMALL PENALTY. WE MUST, IF WE ARE PRUDENT, TAKE CARE TO AVOID INCREASED DEPENDENCE OF OUR CAPITAL ASSETS ON OIL AND GAS -- WHEN WE ALREADY KNOW THAT THE FUTURE SUPPLIES WILL BE LIMITED. AND WE MUST ACHIEVE A HIGHER DEGREE OF FUEL EFFICIENCY. WE MUST LEARN TO CONSERVE.

THESE ARE THE THINGS THAT WE MUST DO. AND THESE ARE THE THINGS THAT PRESIDENT CARTER'S ENERGY PLAN IS INTENDED TO ACCOMPLISH. THE MEASURES ARE NUMEROUS AND INTRICATE, BUT THE UNDERLYING DESIGN IS QUITE SIMPLE. PUT BRIEFLY THE PROGRAM IS INTENDED, FIRST, TO ATTAIN A HIGHER DEGREE OF FUEL EFFICIENCY, TO REDUCE WASTE, AND TO CONSERVE. SECOND, IT IS INTENDED TO WEAN US AWAY FROM OIL AND GAS AND GRADUALLY TO SUBSTITUTE FURTHER OUR MORE ABUNDANT FUEL RESOURCES -- SOLAR ENERGY, COAL AND URANIUM.

A MAJOR GOAL OF THE PLAN IS TO REDUCE THE ANNUAL GROWTH OF ENERGY CONSUMPTION IN THE UNITED STATES FROM APPROXIMATELY FOUR PERCENT TO LESS THAN TWO PERCENT PER YEAR. THIS CAN BE ACHIEVED BY MAKING OUR HOMES BETTER INSULATED, OUR AUTOMOBILES MORE FUEL-EFFICIENT,

AND BY PROVIDING INCENTIVES FOR GREATER EFFICIENCY IN OUR INDUSTRIAL PROCESSES. IT CAN BE ACHIEVED WITH NO SACRIFICE IN OUR PROSPECTIVE LIVING STANDARDS.

THE PRESIDENT HAS CALLED FOR SACRIFICE, BUT THE SACRIFICE FOR WHICH HE CALLS IS LESS OF A MATERIAL NATURE THAN OF A CHANGE IN ATTITUDE AND ASSUMPTIONS -- OF ALL SACRIFICES THE HARDEST FOR MEN TO MAKE. WE SHALL HAVE TO GIVE UP OUR CARELESS, SPENDTHRIFT WAYS IN ENERGY USE. WE SHALL HAVE TO LEARN ANEW SUCH HOMESPUN WISDOM AS "WILLFUL WASTE MAKES WILLFUL WANT".

NONETHELESS IT IS AXIOMATIC IN THE PRESIDENT'S PLAN THAT ENOUGH ENERGY SHALL BE AVAILABLE TO PERMIT THE CONTINUED GROWTH OF THE ECONOMY -- AND THE EXPANSION OF PRODUCTIVITY, OUTPUT AND THE NUMBER OF JOBS. THE PACE IS GRADUAL, AND THE USE OF ENERGY WILL CONTINUE TO GROW. WE ARE NOT INTERESTED IN SELF-PUNISHMENT THROUGH CONSERVATION.

THE MAJOR ELEMENT IS EQUALLY SIMPLE: TO AVOID A GROWING DEPENDENCE ON OIL AND GAS AND TO MAKE BETTER USE OF OUR MORE ABUNDANT FUEL RESOURCES.

IT WAS ONLY AFTER WORLD WAR II THAT WE EMERGED FROM A PERIOD IN WHICH COAL HAD BEEN OUR PRINCIPAL FUEL. INCREASINGLY WE SHALL RETURN TO IT. FACILITIES-IN-PLACE CAN IN MOST CASES READILY UTILIZE COAL. IN THAT WAY WE CAN RESERVE A LARGER SHARE OF THE DWINDLING SUPPLY OF FUEL LIQUIDS FOR OUR TRANSPORTATION SECTOR -- IN WHICH

THERE IS NO SUCH READILY AVAILABLE SUBSTITUTE. OUR NEW FACTORIES AND POWER PLANTS SHOULD USE COAL OR URANIUM. IN THAT WAY WE CAN AVOID HAVING OUR NEW CAPITAL PLANT AND EQUIPMENT BECOME DEPENDENT ON A TYPE OF FUEL WHICH IS UNLIKELY TO BE AVAILABLE DURING THE LAST FIFTEEN OR TWENTY YEARS SERVICE OF THAT PLANT.

IF WE ARE PREPARED TO ACT NOW, WE CAN MAKE THIS TRANSITION RELATIVELY SMOOTHLY AND PAINLESSLY. IF WE FAIL TO ACT NOW, THE CONSEQUENCES WILL BE FAR MORE DIRE: IN THE MIDDLE 1980'S RISING UNEMPLOYMENT, MUCH MORE RAPID INFLATION, AND SEVERE BALANCE OF PAYMENTS DIFFICULTIES. SUCH DEVELOPMENTS WOULD SHAKE THE POLITICAL AND SOCIAL FOUNDATIONS OF THE UNITED STATES IN A WAY THAT THEY HAVE NOT BEEN SHAKEN SINCE THE 1930'S. MUCH HAS BEEN SAID ABOUT THE ECONOMIC CONSEQUENCES, RELATIVELY LIGHT, OF THE NATIONAL ENERGY PLAN. IT IS FAR WISER, IF WE TAKE INTO ACCOUNT, NOT THE CONSEQUENCES OF OUR DECISION TO ACT, BUT THE ECONOMIC AND POLITICAL CONSEQUENCES OF OUR FAILURE TO ACT -- FOR THOSE COULD PROVE DEVASTATING.

BUT WHAT OF THE LONGER TERM? WHAT HAPPENS WHEN WE RUN SHORT, AS WE INEVITABLY MUST, OF FOSSIL FUEL? WILL THESE SHORT TERM SACRIFICES, WHICH WE NOW CONTEMPLATE, MAKE THINGS BETTER FOR OUR CHILDREN AND GRANDCHILDREN IN THE FUTURE -- OR WILL THEY MERELY POSTPONE A DAY OF RECKONING? SOME PEOPLE THESE DAYS HAVE BECOME SO DISQUIETED BY FUTURE SHOCK THAT THEY HAVE LOST FAITH IN OUR LONG RUN ABILITY TO COPE. WILL THERE BE A HAPPY ENDING?

THE ANSWER IS -- UNEQUIVOCALLY YES. WE FACE THE FUTURE, NOT MERELY WITH HOPE, BUT WITH CONFIDENCE. WE SHALL DEVOTE OUR TECHNICAL RESOURCES TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF NEW SOURCES OF SUPPLY -- BE THEY TECHNIQUES FOR THE MORE EFFICIENT USE OF AVAILABLE ENERGY, BIOMASS, SOLAR ENERGY MORE NARROWLY DEFINED, OR FUSION OR FISSION POWER. OUR RESEARCHERS AND OUR SCIENTISTS HAVE NOT YET FAILED THE UNITED STATES. ONCE WE RECOGNIZE THE PROBLEM, AND APPLY TO IT THE TIME-HONORED INVENTIVENESS AND THE RESOLUTION OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE, WE CAN HAVE UNBOUNDED CONFIDENCE IN OUR ABILITY TO SOLVE IT.

YET, THE NATION DOES FACE A FORMIDABLE CHALLENGE.

LET US RESOLVE TO MASTER IT.

THE PRESIDENT HAS PRESENTED AN AMBITIOUS PLAN. ITS DEVELOPMENT HAS BEEN GUIDED BY THE PRECEPT: MAKE NO SMALL PLANS; THEY HAVE NO MAGIC TO STIR THE SOULS OF MEN.

THE CHALLENGE IS SUFFICIENTLY GREAT THAT THIS IS NO TIME FOR POLITICS AS USUAL, LOOKING NO FURTHER THAN THE NEXT ELECTION. IT IS NO TIME FOR BUSINESS AS USUAL, LOOKING NO FURTHER THAN THE NEXT PROFIT AND LOSS STATEMENT.

THE PRESIDENT HAS CALLED ON ALL OF US: IN EVERY STATE, MUNICIPALITY, AND HAMLET; IN BUSINESS AND IN UNIONS -- AND IN VOLUNTARY ORGANIZATIONS. LET US ALL RESPOND TO THAT CALL. WE SHALL NEED THE HELP OF EVERY MAN AND WOMAN IN AMERICA.

SUBJECT: GENERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF ACDA

Zbig, Harold, Paul Warnke and I have thoroughly reviewed the attached list of recommendations for the General Advisory Committee of ACDA.

We all agree that the Committee should be constituted so that it places more emphasis on broadening the base of support for SALT, and less emphasis on quarterly technical advice. Most of the names suggested on the list are persons who can help us in states with swing Senate votes or with important constituencies that would broaden the SALT debate.

For chairman, we recommend either Thomas J. Watson, Jr. of IBM, or McGeorge Bundy of the Ford Foundation. Both men have indicated that they would like to help the Administration. Watson is broadly respected, but lacks a working knowledge of SALT and defense issues. Bundy would command respect from a somewhat narrower range of constituents, but has national security experience. Both men could be counted on to be active chairmen who would speak out on behalf of the Administration's SALT position.

Both Watson and Bundy are acceptable to Zbig, Harold, and Warnke. Zbig and Harold would lean toward Watson; Warnke leans toward Bundy.

SUBJECT: Domestic Policy Staff Weekly Status Report

ECONOMICS AND BUSINESS

Tax Reform: We continue to consult with Treasury, CEA and outside experts such as Joe Pechman and Stanley Surrey.

Trade Adjustment Assistance: We are working with Commerce, STR, and the agencies on a general TAA program. The paper should clear interagency review within the next several weeks and we will have a decision memo to you shortly.

OPIC: We will have a memo to you shortly responding to your inquiry about the Overseas Private Investment Corporation.

GSP-OPEC: We are working with NSC and the Vice President's office to coordinate consultation on the Mondale Option with Congress and some of the OPEC countries.

HEALTH

National Health Insurance: The next meeting of the HEW Advisory Committee on National Health Insurance will be in Canada on September 8 and 9.

Rural Health Clinics Bill: A subcommittee of the House Ways and Means Committee has reported out legislation to provide Medicare reimbursement to physician extenders in rural clinics. The Senate is likely to expand the bill to include Medicaid reimbursement to physician extenders in rural clinics. We are in favor of both proposals.

Hospital Cost Containment Act: The full Senate Human Resources Committee has reported out an amended version of the legislation.

PRIVACY

Privacy Protection Study Commission: A memo to the relevant agencies has been sent out for their views. Comments due on August 22.

CIVIL SERVICE MATTERS

Hatch Act Reform: Hearings are being held in the Senate. We are working with the Civil Service Commission and Senate staff on policy development. Also coordinating with Frank Moore's staff on legislative strategy.

EDUCATION

Expiring Legislation: We are working with HEW in formulating legislative proposals for expiring education legislation for elementary and secondary education. Initial proposals will be available in September.

Department of Education: We are working with OMB Reorganization Team in completing final public comments from education, civil rights and ethnic groups on the structural reorganization of the federal education function.

International Education: We are beginning to work with HEW on the federal initiatives in meeting the Helsinki commitment toward foreign language and area studies.

Service Academies: We have begun the study you requested of the curricular offerings and their relationship to future career opportunities at the service academies.

WELFARE REFORM

We are working with HEW and Labor on providing a briefing on the proposals to interested groups and congressional staff. The draft of the bill is proceeding in both of the departments. We still expect to be able to submit the legislation immediately when Congress returns. The public and private comments from interested parties remain overwhelmingly positive.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Major components for the Administration package have received tentative approval. We are working with HEW, Treasury, CEA and OMB on strategy, as outlined in my memo to you dated August 12.

AGRICULTURE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Farm Bill/Setaside: My staff met with Secretary Bergland, Charlie Schultze, and Bo Cutter yesterday in preparation for meeting with you next Tuesday afternoon to discuss these topics.

International Food and Agricultural Policy: We are pulling together comments on a brief report to you from Secretary Bergland on this topic and will have it to you by early next week.

Bidding Procedures for National Forest Timber: A decision memo is on its way to you, in response to your recent notes.

Coordination of Food and Agricultural Policy: Secretary Bergland's proposal that you establish an Interagency Working Group on food and agricultural policy and our memo in support of it has been temporarily delayed while we respond to staff comments and questions.

Peanut Oil: Following the Vice President's approval, the FDA resumed negotiations with India over sale of CCC peanut oil stocks.

LABOR

Humphrey-Hawkins: A redraft of our proposed bill has been received from Humphrey and Hawkins staff. We are reviewing with CEA staff.

Independent R & D: At your request, an assessment will be in to you September 6.

HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

Urban Policy: We are now working closely with HUD staff to kindle a sense of urgency and a targeted work plan for the interagency Urban Policy Group. You will receive an early report on major themes and proposals that should be included in a comprehensive urban policy, including special attention to central cities. Our aim is a major message to Congress early next year.

Citizen Action and Volunteerism: Working with Vice President's Staff, ACTION, CSA, HUD and Agriculture on suggestions for national voluntary initiatives and citizen action in cities and rural areas. Option paper by early September.

Neighborhood Commission: Appointments to be made before October 1. Commission can help in proposing policy options for city revitalization.

COMMUNICATIONS

Telephone Interception: We have worked with NSC and other agencies on a policy to deal with Soviet interception of the domestic telephone system. The report has been submitted to the NSC.

Public Broadcasting: We have worked out proposals for reauthorization legislation with OMB and HEW, and the decision memo is on the way to you.

Reorganization: We are working with OMB and Commerce on the charter and budget of the new Assistant Secretary of Commerce, who will replace the Office of Telecommunications Policy. Commerce expects to get you a recommendation on that appointment in September.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Alternative Missions for Corps of Engineers: Along with OMB, we are beginning to survey all engineering and construction programs in government to develop options for future role of Corps of Engineers.

Water Policy Review: Secretary Andrus has stretched timetable in response to widespread criticism that sufficient time had not been allowed for outside input. Reform package completion in early 1978.

Federal Water Pollution Control Act: House has agreed to hold short series of hearings beginning September 8. Prospects for moving the legislation through the House quickly appear good.

ENERGY

Nuclear Licensing Reform: Revised draft legislation should be ready for circulation for comment by interested outside parties on August 19. Working with Schlesinger, FEA, CEA to develop possible companion safety initiative.

Phantom Taxes: Review group including Treasury, OMB, DOE staff will be formed to examine problem and suggest needed remedies. Will also work with California PUC to evaluate their program which limits tax pass-through. Preliminary memo complete by September 15.

Alcan Natural Gas Pipeline: Continuing to participate in interagency group conducting negotiations with comparable Canadian group. The time schedule calls for additional negotiations next week, with Presidential decision-making before September 1. At present, the prospects for agreement on an acceptable Alcan route seem good.

CONSUMER MATTERS

Agency for Consumer Protection: We are working with Esther Peterson, OMB and Frank's staff to develop strategy for initiating House action.

Class Actions: We are working with Esther Peterson and Justice to review recently-introduced consumer class action bills and to develop an Administration position. We are working with Esther Peterson, Frank's staff and Justice to help enact the FTC Improvements Act, which authorizes class actions to enforce FTC rules.

REGULATORY REFORM PROJECTS

Regulatory Reform: The Reorganization Project is redrafting the proposed guidelines for regulations writing to incorporate your comments as well as the comments received from the Cabinet. The guidelines will be forwarded to you next week.

Surface Transport Reform: Following your meeting with Secretary Adams, a task force is studying and preparing a decision memo for you on surface transport reform options. The DOT memo was sent to OMB and circulated to other agencies on July 25.

Airline Regulatory Reform: We are continuing to assist the Senate committee in revising the air bill. The committee will probably report the bill in September. A bill was introduced in the House last week. A member of our staff is traveling to many cities this month to increase public awareness of the Administration's program.

Regulation of Housing Construction: We have asked HUD to appraise a recent study that federal, state, and local regulation adds \$8,000 to the price of a \$50,000 home, and to explore reform concepts. No target date yet.

Financial Institutions Regulation: We are working with Treasury, HUD, OMB, and CEA to develop a format for approaching the new reform agenda in this area beyond NOW account legislation now on Capitol Hill.

MISCELLANEOUS

Executive Branch Reports to Congress: We will have a memo to you next week.

CIVIL RIGHTS AND JUSTICE

Undocumented Aliens: We will consult with the Justice Department as they write the legislation.

Handguns: We will review the draft legislation with Justice, OMB and others.

Morris Dees Memo on Death Penalty: We will meet with Justice and comment on the memo by September 1.

INTEGRITY AND OPENNESS MATTERS

Executive Order on Logging: Memo prepared by Justice has been reviewed. Justice draft has been redrafted by the Executive Office Working Group and circulated for comment to agencies. Target date is immediately after Congress' return in September.

Lobby Reform: Per your campaign promise, we have supported a strong new lobby law. House Committee is in mark-up, and we sent proposed language on executive branch lobbying developed with OMB and Justice to the Hill. It covers the lobbying of executive level officials on legislation matters as well as "lobbying" by companies who seek government contracts. Justice testified in Senate on August 2.

Revision of Security Classification System: The interagency task force has completed its work. We are drafting a decision memo for you along with NSC.

Public Officials Integrity Act: We are working with Frank's staff, Justice, CSC and the Speaker's office to secure House passage this year.

Funding for Printing of Federal Register and Code of Federal Regulations: GSA has changed their position on this. They are working on a memo that will be in to you soon.

OSHA Reform: We are working with OMB, CEA and DOL to establish an interagency task force as approved by you. Public announcement signed by you was released August 5. We are now looking for a competent staff director.

Coordination of Toxic Substances Regulation: CEQ has assembled an Interagency Task Force for long-term review of the area. The four major toxics regulatory agencies (EPA, OSHA, CPSC, FDA) have begun a major effort to coordinate their activities, which was announced August 2 at a press conference.

UNDERGRADUATE HELICOPTER PILOT TRAINING (UHPT) CONSOLIDATION

- o Present UHPT programs conducted at:
 - Whiting Field, near Pensacola, Florida, for Navy/Marine Corps/Coast Guard students in a mixed fixed-wing and helicopter course.
 - Fort Rucker, Alabama, for Army/Air Force students in an all-helicopter course.

- o FY 1978 Defense budget proposed consolidation:
 - Into single all-helo program conducted by Army at Fort Rucker.
 - Using course with all-Service common core plus Service-unique final phase.
 - Retaining follow-on specific mission/aircraft training by the parent Service (as is now done).

- o Consolidation proposal was:
 - Approved by House Appropriations Committee, after extensive hearings, and by full House.
 - Rejected by Senate and Conference Committee.

- o Effectiveness of training in consolidated program, as compared to Navy training, shows:
 - More total flying hours (195 vs. 191).
 - Almost twice as many helicopter flying hours (195 vs. 100).
 - Much higher quality helicopter simulators for instrument flight training.
 - 50 flying hours of Service-unique training conducted by parent-Service instructors. This, at Navy and Marine Corps option, can be used to provide:
 - Instrument training, all in helicopters and helicopter simulators, to augment instrument training in the core syllabus.
 - Carrier and overwater training. Navy course now provides less than one hour of actual carrier landing training, and Fort Rucker is only one hour's flying time from Navy's training carrier at Pensacola.

 - Navy and Defense Comptrollers.
 - GAO, which considered them conservative.

 - Smaller procurement needs for aircraft and simulators.
 - Operations and maintenance efficiencies.
 - Economies of scale.
- o No base closure savings are included.
- o Navy training helicopters (H-1s) would shift to use in consolidated program.

I have now spoken to Hamilton regarding Dale Myers and he is quite agreeable that we both plan to go ahead with the appointment and that you make the telephone call, as indicated below. In addition Bob Lipshutz has reviewed his case for possible conflicts of interest and he has indicated that there are no foreseeable problems other than working out a few details about his pension.

Dale Myers, as I mentioned, is the President of North American Aircraft Operations for North American/Rockwell. He was Project Manager for the Apollo Program. From 1970-74 he was Assistant Administrator of NASA and the head of the manned space flight program. More recently he has headed up the B-1 effort and succeeded in putting it back on track (in a technical and managerial sense). Thus, he has both proven government experience and management competence. I am delighted that we are able to attract a man of such ability to serve as Under Secretary. In a department as complex and with so large a budget as the Energy budget will have, we will need this kind of management talent.

There is a small problem — and that is where you necessarily come in. As head of the old North American component of Rockwell, Myers has been attempting to hold the organization together, since your B-1 decision. He has urged all personnel to have confidence in the future, not to desert (not to abandon a sinking ship), etc. Understandably he feels in a slightly delicate position, if he now seemed prepared to pull out. It might open the floodgates of despair and departure. He has indicated, however, that it would be much easier to explain both to his subordinates — and to his superiors in the parent company — if he received a direct request from the President of the United States to serve in the important national undertaking represented by our energy program.

Consequently, if you could take a few minutes to talk to him, it would ease the situation for him and would enable us with high assurance to attract him. His telephone number is: 213/647-5595. I indicated to him yesterday that he might expect a call from you before the end of the week.

I hesitate to intrude on your vacation time in this matter, but I think that it will be useful in moving forward the energy program of the Administration.

Subject: New orders for durable goods in July
(released Monday, August 22, 4:00 p.m.)

New orders to manufacturers for durable goods fell sharply (-4.4 percent) in July. Virtually all of the decline occurred in two industries: motor vehicles and aircraft. The new order data for motor vehicles are meaningless as an indicator of future activity. Auto manufacturers don't produce to order; shipments to dealers are treated in the statistical series as new orders. Auto sales to consumers are holding up. The decline in aircraft new orders reflects a large cancellation of defense orders (very probably the B-1, but the Census Bureau can't give that information out), and a drop in commercial aircraft orders after a huge bulge in June.

New orders for capital goods, which we watch very closely as a sign of future investment outlays, fell during the month, principally because of the decline in commercial aircraft orders. Other capital goods orders fell only slightly (-1.3 percent).

The drop in July orders is definitely not good news. But apart from the meaningless decline in motor vehicle "orders" it was concentrated so heavily in one industry -- aircraft -- that we can't read much about the future from this one month's statistic.


The following information obtained from Rufus Adams, Chairman of the State Committee, and Arthur Jerrell, Acting State Executive Director:

About \$1,800,000 fraud involved. The County Office Manager was terminated, the County Clerk was terminated and both were barred from any future ASCS employment.

We understand that they have talked with some attorneys about a possible appeal; they have also asked to be reinstated so that they could resign. This request was denied by the State Committee. On August 8, 1977, two members of the County Committee were reinstated and the first alternate came on as a member. They had their first meeting on August 10th. We were told that the County Committee was allowed to function just as soon as the Hearing Officer advised the State Committee that this was proper.

The State Chairman and Acting Executive Director assured us that the Telfair County Office is installed and fully functional.

The comments and suggestions on drought changes are well taken and we are currently undertaking a study for a complete revision of the drought programs.

PROBLEMS

SOLUTION TO PROBLEM

1. Corn under Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) Loan located on farm, counts as feed on hand when applying for help under Emergency Feed Program. (Most producers put their corn in CCC loan to keep the surplus off of the market at harvest (gathering) time and usually sell before next years harvest to pay off bank loans). *Jung*
Change the Emergency Feed Program to exempt corn under the CCC Loan.
2. Allotment and Payment yield for cotton and corn are out dated. Allotment and yield were set up for corn using 1959 and 1960 data obtained from farmer. New yield's and allotment's for corn and cotton should be established.
The ASCS County Committee should establish new yields and allotments based on what a farm is planting and current yields being made.
3. Overproduction on corn and wheat in U.S.A.
Set up a set aside program for 1978 for both crops.
4. Government Price Support and control on all Peanut acres planted.
An allotment control should be maintained on all peanuts planted for the next four years. The peanut program could stand some changes ' but Government Price Support is essential to maintain a fare market price for peanuts now being produced. All peanuts should be spot checked to maintain compliance control.
5. Rules concerning the Farm programs are being constructed after all crops have been planted. Example- Tobacco farmer when planted in excess of their allotment by more than a certain percentage is not eligible for 1977 price support.
All Farm PROgram PROvisions which will affect the next year's crops should be constructed prior to January 1 of that year.

PROBLEMS

SOULTION TO PROBLEM

6. 1977 Disaster Payment for corn are based on yields and allotments established from data obtained from farmer in 1959 and 1960.

Disaster Program provisions should be changed to include all 1977 planted acres of corn on a farm.
7. Farm Storage and Drying Equipment Loan interest rate is too high (7 percent at present).

All Farm Storage and Drying Equipment Loans should be reduced to 3 percent, this would enable more farmers to obtain adequate storage space needed on the farm.
8. CCC Commodity Loans are to high (6 percent at present).

The CCC Commodity Loans program should be changed to reduce the interest rates to 3 percent.
9. Under the FIP (Forestry Incentive Program) the funding is out of proportion as compared to the other Conservation programs administered by USDA (This money is being tagged for FIP before it is sent to the State ASCS Offices.

Priorities should be left up to the County Committies to place the money where it is most needed to carry out a well rounded conservation program.
10. Farm Programs are too complex and detailed for the average farmer to understand. (All programs should be simplified).

The personnel who write farm programs should have a farming background and a thorough knowledge of the crops involved.
11. Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) Insurance rates are too high in comparison to the expected yields being produced on an individual farm basis.

Lower the rates and increase Insurance coverage where a crop failure has occured.
12. Crop Reporters and Crop Appraisers who are working as part time employees with USDA-ASCS do not have any employee benefits other than Social Security at time of retirement.

Bring these part time employees under the same retirement program as other Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) employees. Give them credit for the actual time worked in prior years and let it count toward their retirement. (Some reporters have been working on a part time basis for 12- 15 years.

A bold innovative masterful political move on your part to rectify this situation and establish a program of this sort would not only help balance the trade deficit, but also would assure you a place in the annals of history for such an imaginative solution to this knotty problem.

If there is room for another Georgia native in your administration, I am available to work out the details with the Arabs. I would be glad to work as a dollar-a-year man. (This is approximately twice what I made this year.) If you are interested in pursuing this idea any further, you may call my appointments secretary (Ms. Linda Price) for an appointment.

SUBJECT: Independent Attorney General

You have asked us to assess your campaign statements on the role of the Attorney General. We believe the following quote summarizes your position. (Two other statements from your speeches are attached.)

The Attorney General of this nation must be removed from politics and given the full prerogatives, independence, and authority of his or her own office, plus those allotted temporarily to the Special Prosecutor during the Watergate scandals. The Attorney General should be appointed for a specific period of time and should be removed from office only for malfeasance, as mutually determined by the President and designated leaders of Congress. The Attorney General and all assistants should be barred from all political activity.

We have asked the Justice Department, in view of your statements, to look at this issue again. As we have reported, they have previously concluded that they believe that anything short of a Constitutional amendment to set a term of years and, therefore, separate the Attorney General from Presidential control, would most likely be found unconstitutional. Methods they examined included legislation and an Executive order.

If they, upon re-examining the question, come to any different conclusion, we shall inform you.

SUBJECT: SPENT FUEL POLICY

Introduction

In furtherance of our discussion on spent nuclear fuel, this paper recommends the Government provide storage for domestic spent nuclear fuel after payment by a utility of a one-time fee, based on total costs for storage and permanent disposal. This would enable utilities to estimate the cost of the complete nuclear fuel cycle and remove a major uncertainty in utility planning. To reduce the pressure for recycling spent fuel and permit foreign governments to examine U.S. non-proliferation initiatives on their own merits, the Government also would offer to accept spent fuel from foreign countries.

United States' utilities have expanded on-site storage capacities in recent years. However, interim away from reactor storage facilities are needed to handle the fuel from utility storage pools prior to permanent disposal. Under current plans, utilities will need additional space starting in 1982, although one small reactor (100 MW) will run out of space in 1979. One Japanese reactor runs out of storage space in 1978. Other foreign reactors begin to run out of storage space in the early 1980's.

Capacity

The U.S. Government has no facilities licensed to store spent commercial fuel, nor does it have much excess unlicensed capacity. Small amounts of storage could be made available on an emergency basis. To develop the interim storage needed by domestic utilities and to provide space for foreign fuel, existing government facilities must be expanded, new government or private capacity built, or existing commercial facilities leased.

If a decision were made this Fall, existing, unlicensed facilities at Oak Ridge and Savannah River could be expanded to accept a total of 1500 tons (50 annual discharges) by 1980 for \$45 million. Licensing these facilities could delay the availability date and increase the cost. The available commercial facilities belong to General Electric and Allied General Nuclear Services (AGNS). General Electric plans to expand its Morris, Illinois, facility for use by its customers. The AGNS Barnwell plant could store over 1000 tons, although the owners do not want to operate it for spent fuel storage. Exxon and other companies have expressed interest in operating spent fuel storage facilities as a commercial venture. Building and licensing a new 1000 ton facility would take 4-6 years and cost \$40-60 million.

Policy

I recommend the Administration propose the following policy on spent fuel:

1. The U.S. Government will accept and take title to spent fuel from domestic utilities.
2. The utility must pay a one-time fee that covers the total cost of interim and permanent storage. Our current estimate is that the annual cost would be about \$4 million for a 1000 MW reactor, adding less than 1 mil per kwhr to the utility cost (which currently is about 25 mils per kwhr).
3. The utility will be responsible for delivery of the fuel to a government approved site.
4. The U.S. Government will also accept and take title to spent fuel from other countries, with appropriate limitations on the offer to be developed by negotiation.
5. Foreign governments also must pay a full-cost one-time fee and arrange for delivery.
6. The fee paid by domestic and foreign users will not include any credit for either plutonium or uranium in the spent fuel. If the U.S. decides in the future that commercial recycling is acceptable, the original owners could retrieve their fuel, with an appropriate refund, or be compensated for the fuel value.

Actions

If you approve this policy, two actions will be taken:

1. ERDA will negotiate with private industry to determine whether it is feasible to plan on interim storage facilities that are privately owned and operated under government lease. The main advantage of such an arrangement is that construction costs would not be in the budget. We will explore this approach, while recognizing that it may be more difficult to license these facilities, and, therefore, it may be necessary to propose government-owned interim storage facilities.

2. ERDA, with the assistance of other federal agencies, will develop environmental impact statements and any legislation that may be necessary to implement this policy. (The Senate has passed an amendment to the ERDA Authorization Act requiring Congressional authorization for spending funds related directly or indirectly to repurchase, transport, or storage of foreign spent fuel.)

This memorandum responds to your request for information on HEW's current activities in pregnancy prevention and the Department's plans for future initiatives.

Current Activities

Family Planning

- Project Grants of \$113 million in FY '77 provide family planning services to 4 million women. Your FY '78 budget includes a request for \$124 million in order to extend benefits to an additional 270,000 low income and young women. *\$30/woman*
4 1/4 million
- Family planning services are also provided through Community Health Centers.
- Family planning is part of the program which States must establish under the Maternal and Child Health provisions of the Public Health Service Act.
- An estimated \$70.3 million will be spent this year in Title XX Social Service funds. The bulk of expenditures are for information and referrals. Approximately 1.4 million individuals will be served.

All States provide family planning services to income maintenance recipients either through Title XIX (Medicaid) or Title XX.

Population Research

- The FY '77 budget included \$60 million for population research and training. An additional \$2 million has been requested for FY '78 for the Center for Population Research.

Education

- Health education activities include the provision of sex education information.
- The Office of Education in conjunction with the Office of Child Development has developed an Education for Parenthood program.

Future Plans

Recognizing that nearly 40 percent of low and moderate income women are without family planning services and understanding the need for family planning for both men and women, I have established two task forces within the Department -- one on Adolescent Pregnancy and Related Problems, the other on Alternatives to Abortion -- to consider the questions of education on human sexuality and parenthood, the provision of contraceptives, and support for the broad health and social needs of adolescents and the indigent.

Some of the specific pregnancy prevention issues under early consideration include:

- the expansion of research in contraceptive technology;
- improvement of family planning services to meet the special needs of adolescents;
- the encouragement of expanded and wide-spread family planning in Community Health Centers and Maternal and Child Health clinics;
- the elimination of financial barriers inhibiting access to family planning services;
- the elimination of legal barriers which hinder the availability of services and the dissemination of contraceptive information and sex education;
- the provision of contraceptive information and/or services in conjunction with the EPSDT (or CHAP when it is enacted) program for adolescents;

- the increased involvement of males in contraception use and awareness;
- the development of training programs for personnel oriented to the special needs of the client population (e.g., the very young, the poor);
- extending AFDC and Medicaid coverage of the unborn child of the eligible mother to all 54 States and jurisdictions;
- strengthening linkages between family planning activities and health, educational and social services.

The Adolescent Pregnancy Task Force met last week with more than 50 representatives of concerned organizations, including several members of the six major family planning and health groups who were the subject of the Washington Post story which prompted your inquiry. HEW is actively considering all of the proposals advanced by those groups.

There are difficult human problems and precious human values involved here and we will produce programs that are attentive to them. The shot from the six family planning groups was a decidedly cheap one, since Rey knew pretty much what we were doing when they fired at you.

SUBJECT: SOUTH ASIAN NARCOTICS

As we promised in the July 28 memorandum on Afghanistan, this is our current view of the narcotics situation in South Asia. Detailed back-up information of the full report is available. Specific recommendations are attached.

In summary the major producing area lies at the northern sector of the border between Afghanistan and Pakistan. Regional production is roughly equal to that of the "Golden Triangle" region, and expanding rapidly. The Drug Enforcement Administration feels that little South Asian heroin is at present entering the United States, while Interpol has suggested that opiates from the region are being transited from South Asia via Dubai and Turkey to both Western Europe and the U.S.

Traditionally, the region has been a "closed system" for narcotic drugs with local consumption equaling the region's supply. This balance, however, has been seriously altered by dramatic increases in production during the last three growing seasons, and Iran's recent efforts to reduce both demand and traffic into that country. Of additional concern is the recently developed capability of converting opium to morphine and heroin. These factors added to the existing illicit trafficking routes moving hashish (a concentrate of the resin from the marijuana plant) from the region to Western Europe, provide the region with all the requirements for becoming a major threat to the West, e.g., excess supply of opium, ability to refine bulky opium gum to morphine and heroin and ability to move it to existing markets in the West.

Of the three countries (Afghanistan, Pakistan, Iran), only one, Afghanistan, offers any hope of having sufficient impact on the problem to prevent opiates from this region from becoming a major source of heroin in the U.S., and causing Afghanistan to deal effectively with this problem will be one of our most difficult anti-narcotics efforts over the next several years.

The existing domestic political situation in Pakistan precludes any effective anti-narcotics efforts between now and the promised elections on October 15, and in our view the long term prospects are not much better since other agenda items will force the narcotics issue to a lower priority.

Iran has traditionally been a net importer of opium, and recent actions in that country in demand reduction, as well as increased interdiction efforts, will have the effect of reducing the flow of opium into Iran thereby making more Afghanistan-Pakistan opiates available for the international illicit market.

Effective programs in Mexico, Burma and Thailand can be expected to drive traffickers to this readily available supply.

Because of existing severe political constraints in Afghanistan, our strategy there must limit itself to encouraging President Daoud to ask the farmers to decrease their production, and continue to support the U.N. managed interdiction program. Crop eradication programs are not at this point feasible but with greater emphasis on the problem by Daoud, as well as increased enforcement against traffickers, we can hope that some small eradication efforts could be initiated as early as next year.

Afghanistan is the one opium producing country in the world where both our own and United Nations efforts have failed to effect a reduction in cultivation. In fact, production has doubled in each of the past two growing seasons, and all indications point to increased planting for the upcoming season, which begins in September. These factors all point to Afghanistan as the single most significant threat to our ongoing strategy, and demand our immediate attention.



Large number of publications, none of them particularly scholarly. Has been a member of a number of major national commissions. Has participated in the writing of a number of commission reports including the final draft of the Federal Criminal Code prepared by the Commission on Reform of Federal Criminal Laws and the final report of the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence. He was appointed by Chief Justice Burger in 1976 to a committee to study and prepare standards for admission

to practice in the federal courts. Is a member of a number of associations and either director or trustee of numerous non-profit institutions, including Yale University (trustee, 1970-76); University of Pennsylvania (trustee); Philadelphia Urban Coalition (director, 1969-74). Has more than a dozen honorary degrees. In 1964, was one of the ten most outstanding young men in America, U. S. Chamber of Commerce. Has received numerous awards, including Yale University Law School Citation of Merit. He was ranked number one by the nominating commission.
