Dear Mr. Secretary:

Advisory committees can be of great value. They may contribute to the "openness" of governmental decision-making, and provide ~~expertise~~ ^{talent} and opinions not otherwise available. However, ~~I am concerned that~~ many existing committees ~~may~~ ^{are} have outlived their usefulness, or ~~may~~ not ~~be~~ providing truly balanced advice and recommendations. The Congress reflected a similar concern in the Federal Advisory Committee Act (P.L. 92-463), which assigned committee management responsibilities to the President, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and to the heads of agencies. In the first year after enactment, the number of committees was reduced ~~from about 1,500 to about 1,250~~ ^{by 250} -- and ~~that~~ ^{The} number has remained about the same ever since.

Accordingly, I am ordering a government-wide, zero-base review of all advisory committees, with the presumption that all committees should be abolished except those 1) for which there is a compelling need; 2) which ^{will} have truly balanced membership; and 3) which ^{will} conduct their business openly. The Director of OMB will provide you and your staff with instructions for carrying out the agency reviews which are to be

completed, ~~and the results~~ submitted to OMB, ~~by~~ April 1, 1977.

I consider this an important part of our effort to improve the organization and effectiveness of government. To ensure that it is successful, I am requesting that you assume personal responsibility for the review insofar as your agency is concerned.

I hope for prompt results from this effort. Specifically, I hope that the number of advisory committees will be sharply reduced (by terminations effective no later than September 1, or as soon as possible when legislation is required to carry out a recommended termination), and that appropriate changes in membership will be made wherever necessary. Moreover, I want you to undertake a continuing effort to assure that no new advisory committees are established unless they are essential to meet the responsibilities of the government.

IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

Objective. Carry out the Presidential initiative to (a) significantly reduce the number of Federal advisory committees, and (b) ensure that there is a compelling need for each committee continued, and that the membership of such committees is balanced and representative. It should be clear that this is a major concern of the President, to be met by a prompt, but careful, case-by-case review of each committee.

Methodology

1. The importance of this effort to the President, and the need for ^{all}~~each~~ agency and department heads, to take personal responsibility for the analysis in their respective agencies -- with OMB in a review role -- would be set by a Presidential memorandum sent to each of the individual agency heads. This letter, sent at the earliest opportunity, would stress the President's concern, direct agency heads to take personal responsibility (or delegate to directly reporting subordinates) for their agency's committees, indicate that OMB will provide instructions, and indicate the need for prompt action. The letter would not state a "target" (percentage reduction, or specified number of committees), to lessen

the risk of either falling short or eliminating committees which later prove necessary. However, an important followup of the President's directive would be discussion of the effort at a Cabinet, or similar (a number of non-Cabinet agencies have large numbers of committees), meeting, at which the agency heads could be told privately of the desired target levels.

2. The Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA) requires (Section 7(b)) the Director of OMB to make an annual comprehensive review of each advisory committee. In 1976 this requirement was met by having the agencies make an initial, case-by-case review of all committees, and submit the results, on April 1, to OMB for further review by the Committee Management Secretariat (CMS) and the program divisions.

With only minor modifications, that procedure will provide a means for carrying out the Presidential initiative and satisfying the FACA requirement:

- About 80% of all committees are either agency-established, or authorized by law (the agency head has some latitude in whether or not they are established). Accordingly, and to ensure that new officials are familiarized with their

agencies' committees at an early date, the initial review of committees, and determinations of which committees should be terminated, continued, membership revised, etc., would be made during February and March by the agency. The review would include all committees, regardless of when they were established, or renewed, or the authority for establishment. The agency heads would be instructed to submit to OMB, by April 1, for further review:

- a. For each agency-established committee which is proposed for termination, a "coversheet" identifying the committee, and the recommended action (primarily so that OMB can ensure that all committees are reviewed; it is not anticipated that OMB would question agency-proposed terminations).
- b. For each committee established by law which is recommended for termination, an identifying "coversheet", and a brief explanation of the basis for the recommendation (to support any later request to the Congress to enact necessary legislation).

- c. Each committee which is recommended for continuation would require a "coversheet", plus a detailed justification which cited the factors supporting the recommendation (need for the committee, lack of other sources of the committee's views or expertise, the "balance" of membership, etc.).
- The materials from the agencies will be received by CMS and, where appropriate (recommendations to terminate statutory committees, recommendations to continue committees), packaged with quantitative data from the Annual Report and relevant data from committee files, for further review. This review, by CMS and the program divisions will ensure that the recommendations for continuation truly present a "compelling case," that questions such as the balance of membership have been adequately addressed, and that recommendations for individual committees are consistent with Administration program objectives.
 - OMB's review should be completed by June 1, 1977, and a report prepared from the Director to the President indicating the actions taken: how the review was undertaken; what committees have been

terminated; what statutory committees are recommended for termination by the Congress, and what committees are to be continued. The report might also suggest further Presidential actions (e.g., public statement, etc.).

- By September 1 the entire effort would be completed: agency committees terminated, recommendations submitted to Congress, etc.

CABINET MEETING TALKING POINTS

Many advisory committees are extremely useful:

- Provide direct policy input;
- Provide expertise and varied viewpoints not otherwise available;
- Contribute to the "openness" of governmental decision-making.

Many committees have strong support:

- Particular interest groups;
- The Congress, or particular committees or members of Congress;
- Agency program operations;
- Members of the particular committees.

Nonetheless, I am concerned that there are too many committees (about 1,250), and many of these may not have memberships which are "fairly balanced in terms of the points of view represented and the functions to be performed"

Therefore, I am ordering a government-wide, zero-base review of all advisory committees to ensure that only essential committees are continued, and that those committees have truly "balanced" memberships. I will confirm this initiative by letter to each of you.

OMB will provide instructions for conducting the agency reviews of committees, but I am asking each of you to

take personal responsibility for achieving the purposes of this effort insofar as your agency is concerned.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE HEADS OF EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS AND
ESTABLISHMENTS

SUBJECT: Review of Federal Advisory Committees

The President, in his letter of _____, 1977, expressed his concern about the number and usefulness of Federal advisory committees, and ordered a government-wide, zero-base review of all committees. Section 7(b) of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (P.L. 92-463) requires the Director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to conduct annually a comprehensive review of each advisory committee to determine:

- a. whether such committee is carrying out its purpose;
- b. whether, consistent with the provisions of applicable statutes, the responsibilities assigned to it should be revised;
- c. whether it should be merged with other advisory committees; or
- d. whether it should be abolished.

The Director may request such information as he deems necessary to carry out this function, and agency heads shall cooperate with the Director in making the reviews.

To meet the President's objectives, and the requirements of the Act, the following instructions, and reporting format, are provided for the review of Federal advisory committees.

1. Agency comprehensive review. This review is to be a comprehensive, zero-base review of each advisory committee -- regardless of the authority under which the committee was established, or when it was established or last renewed. The head of each agency, or a senior policy official designated by the agency head, should review the need for, and accomplishments of, each committee in terms of factors such as those enumerated in the attached review coversheet (Exhibit I), with particular attention to the "balance" of membership representation.

Based on this review, a determination should be made to continue, merge, terminate, or revise responsibilities of, as appropriate, each advisory committee established by the agency. Similar actions should

be recommended for each committee established by statute or Presidential directive, for which the agency has responsibility.

2. Reports. Following the agency's review, the following is to be submitted to the Committee Management Secretariat, OMB, not later than April 1, 1977, for OMB and Presidential review:
 - a. A review coversheet (Exhibit I) only, in duplicate for each agency-established committee which is proposed to be terminated.
 - b. A review coversheet (Exhibit I) and brief explanatory statement, in duplicate, for each committee established by statute or Presidential directive, which is recommended for merger or termination.
 - c. A review coversheet (Exhibit I) and detailed justification, in duplicate, for each committee which is proposed to be continued.
 - d. A letter of transmittal for the coversheets and accompanying statements, constituting a determination that the continuation of the committees proposed to be continued is in the public interest, signed by the agency head.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: Bert Lance and Stu Eizenstat *Stu*
 SUBJECT: Advisory Committees

This memo outlines your authority to review and/or abolish advisory committees to the Federal Government. A list of the existing 1,172 advisory committees is attached. These committees cost the Federal Government \$55.3 million in 1976.

Committees are categorized in four groups, based on the authority for their establishment:

1. Executive Order. Approximately 16 committees were established by Executive Order. These committees cost \$1.5 million in 1976. Of all the advisory committees, these are the only ones that can be terminated directly by the President.

2. Statutory. 209 committees were established by statute. The total cost during 1976 was \$20.7 million. These can be abolished only by statute.

A list of these committees is contained in Attachment 2 to this memo.

3. Authorized by law. 465 committees were authorized, but not specifically mandated, by law (e.g., "The Secretary is authorized in his discretion to establish a committee to..."). The total cost for committees created as an exercise of this statutory authority was \$17.8 million in 1976. A list of these committees is contained in Attachment 3.

These committees cannot be terminated directly by the President. They can be abolished only by the authority that created them.

However, the President may direct a Secretary or Executive agency head to abolish or review committees which he or his predecessor

created. The President may not direct an independent regulatory agency to abolish any committees created by it. He may, however, urge any independent regulatory commission to review or abolish advisory committees it created.

4. General Agency Authority. 482 committees were established under the general statutory authority of Department Secretaries, executive agency heads, or independent agencies. These committees cost \$15.3 million during 1976. A list of these committees is contained in Attachment 4.

The President's authority with respect to these advisory committees is the same as that for category (3) above.

Presidential Authority

You, therefore, have the authority to take any or all of the following actions:

- abolish by Executive order - or direct an expedited review of - any or all of the 16 advisory committees created by Executive order
- direct Secretaries and executive agency heads to abolish any or all committees which they have authority to abolish (Total: 947 - those contained in categories 3 and 4, above.)
- direct an accelerated, zero-based review of all committees which your Secretaries and executive agency heads have authority to abolish. (Total: 947 - again, those contained in categories 3 and 4 above.)

You could impose stringent deadlines for the review, and direct that all committees for which there is no compelling need be abolished. The review could also include an examination of whether the committee membership is truly balanced. Materials implementing this alternative are contained in Attachment 5.

(OMB has identified 40 committees established by agency heads that neither met nor made reports -- nor, as far as could be determined, recommendations -- in 1976. None of these committees has been reviewed for its usefulness, and at least one committee is designed to meet only in emergencies. Therefore, OMB recommends an expedited review to determine whether any of these committees should be abolished, or whether special circumstances justify their continuation. A list of these 40 committees is contained in Attachment 6.)

- ° urge independent regulatory agencies to abolish or review any or all of those committees created by them
- ° direct OMB, pursuant to its authority under the Federal Advisory Committee Act, to advise against the creation of any new advisory committees unless it is convinced that a committee is essential to meet governmental responsibilities
- ° direct that all pending or proposed legislation to create advisory committees be reviewed to insure that such committees are essential, and
- ° urge Congress to conduct an expedited review of the 209 committees created by statute.

Considerations

Early abolition of many advisory committees would dramatize your intention to streamline the Federal bureaucracy.

However, there are a number of considerations which you may wish to keep in mind:

1. Some Committees are Worthwhile

Since many committees provide a valuable service to the government that cannot be obtained by other means, it would be wise to review each committee individually before making a decision to abolish it.

For example, some committees actually save money. It sometimes costs less money to have a grant review committee made up of experts who meet only a few times a year, than to hire full time employees to do the job.

2. Need for Cabinet and Agency Review

Department Secretaries or executive agency heads will probably want to review each committee within their province before action is taken to abolish it.

3. Congressional Backlash; Effect on Reorganization Authority

If many committees are summarily abolished -- especially those for which there is Congressional interest -- Congress may create more statutory committees to insulate them from executive action.

OMB is concerned that any action taken to reduce the number of advisory committees be done in a manner that will not adversely affect the chances of passing reorganization legislation. Unless advisory committees are carefully evaluated before they are abolished, Congress may not be as inclined to give you sweeping reorganization authority.

4. Public Participation by Disadvantaged Groups

Many committees were established to provide vehicles for public participation to groups that traditionally have not been heard by the government. For example, many committees deal with women, minority groups, and the handicapped. Eliminating these committees without individual review may cut against your pledge for an open government.

5. Future Advisory Committees

Your Administration is currently developing some work groups that will probably qualify as "advisory committees." Examples are the proposed Presidential Committee on Mental Health, and the panels to recommend appointees for Federal judgeships. It may be difficult politically to create new committees while terminating others without individual review.

Recommendation

Attached for your review is a draft Presidential directive to Cabinet Officers and Executive Agency Heads ordering a government-wide zero base review of all advisory committees.

The directive imposes an April 1 deadline for agency review, and presumes that all advisory committees should be abolished except for those for which there is shown to be a compelling need, and for those which have a truly balanced membership. The OMB would be given until June 1 to review agency recommendations and submit a final report to the President

Dear Mr. President:

Kentucky joins you in your support of pending legislation that would place Federal controls on the strip mining of coal. Already, I have publicly endorsed the general objectives of such legislation. Both Senators Huddleston and Ford and four of our seven congressmen, including Congressman Perkins, are also prepared to support the general objectives of the legislation. However, *we sincerely believe that certain provisions of the proposed legislation could be perfected in the interest of the Nation and its energy, environmental and economic objectives.*

Up to the time of your election, the initiatives for this legislation, including all of its content, have come *solely* from the House and Senate Interior Committees of the Congress and their respective staffs. Neither the U.S. Department of Interior nor the state governments' attitudes have been given sufficient consideration. Surely your administration should be given some additional time in order to consider the ramifications of this legislation and of its implementation once it becomes law.

While there is a modest representation on the House and Senate Interior Committees from the Eastern United States, it is an unrefutable fact that the committees' composition reflects Western United States' interests. I know that other governors and members of Congress from the Eastern United States, and especially those who represent Appalachia, share my concern that the provisions of this bill will place Eastern United States coal, and especially Appalachian coal - the Nation's best coal in terms of BTU quality and low sulphur content - in an unfavorable competitive position.

We have major concerns regarding the procedural pre-mining, mining and post-mining requirements that will be imposed under the Act. We believe these requirements, while desirable, to be beyond the capability of most independent coal operators and, consequently, will eventually result in a concentration of the mining industry into fewer and fewer, but larger and larger, economic and corporate entities. It remains to be seen whether or not this will be in the best interest of the Nation.

Our overriding concern about the Federal legislation, however, rests with two environmental standards of the bill which we feel are *neither environmentally nor economically sound* and to which we take strenuous objection. They are:

- (1) The requirement in contour mining to return steep slope areas (those over 20°) affected by surface mining to their "approximate original contour"; and
- (2) "Mountaintop removal" mining and reclamation technology which has been pioneered in Appalachia, especially in Kentucky, will only be allowed as a variance under this act and with such established criteria as to practically preclude this method of mining.

In the opinion of professional engineers within our state regulatory authority, *the Act's requirement to return steep slopes to "approximate original contour" is not environmentally nor engineeringly sound*. In embracing this concept, we believe the congressional committees relied on consulting studies and reports published in 1974 or earlier and which are now outdated. Current professional studies performed and published during 1976 and 1977 for both the U.S. Bureau of Mines and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency draw contrary conclusions. These studies should be carefully examined by your administration and the congressional committees before this legislation is finally perfected.

In Kentucky the most successful surface mining and reclamation technology yet developed is the so-called "mountaintop removal" method which recovers all of the solid fuel resource, casts no overburden over the steep outcrops and leaves large tracts of useful topography for ultimate higher land uses. Under the provisions of this act, the process is only allowed as a variance with such conditions imposed that it is our belief that few, if any, such projects would qualify. *Why should we adopt a national policy which may preclude such technology or even make it difficult to pursue such technology?*



There is no question but what the practices of some elements of the coal industry in the past history of Appalachia represent environmental abuses so extensive and so pervasive as to demand the Federal presence. Unfortunately, in the history of our political processes, our solutions often tend to overreact to our problems. Therefore, it is my concern that in this legislation there has not yet been a proper resolution of the energy, environmental and economic goals which you set forth in your campaign for the presidency.

No reasonable person maintains that this legislation will destroy the coal industry. In a long-term sense, the industry will adjust to the requirements of this act. We do believe, however, that there will be a major short-term disruption in the two to three years after the enactment of the legislation and that this disruption will in fact reduce coal production in the Appalachian coal fields (especially in high quality/low sulphur coal) to the overall detriment of the Nation's energy, environmental and economic objectives.

I am especially hopeful that the Congress will permit your newly appointed Secretary of the Interior sufficient additional time to perform a constructive and critical review of this legislation, which his department will be called upon shortly to administer and enforce. I am also hopeful that this review will be performed in consultation with the various coal producing states and their state regulatory authorities who also must ultimately share responsibility with the Federal Government to administer the provisions of this act.

Thank you for your letter requesting prompt Congressional action on legislation to provide Presidential reorganization authority.

I certainly agree that efforts to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of the Federal bureaucracy should receive the highest priority, and I would like to pledge my full cooperation in that effort.

As you undoubtedly are aware, the specific provisions of Presidential reorganization authority have undergone a gradual evolution since the genesis of that procedure in the early 1930s. Specifically, amendments have been adopted concerning cabinet-level reorganizations, one-House Congressional disapproval, the pace and scope of Presidential reorganization initiatives, and the creation of legal authority. In addition, since reorganization authority under the 1949 Act was allowed to lapse in 1973, a number of further revisions have been suggested. Two of these possibilities are of particular interest to me.

My first concern relates to instances in which part, but not all, of a reorganization plan is unacceptable to the Congress. The only statutory alternative under the 1949 Act is to disapprove the plan, await submission of another proposal, and allow another 60 days to expire. Not only is this an extremely awkward procedure; it also results in considerable delay.

Thus, some sort of amendment procedure would be beneficial for all parties. Certainly the most direct method would be to treat the reorganization plan as legislation subject to Congressional amendment. Although this would ensure that the will of Congress would not be thwarted on any particular provision, it would have the disadvantage of inviting wholesale amendment by special interests.

On the other end of the spectrum, pre-submission of the plan for a brief period would facilitate Congressional input without threatening necessary but unpopular provisions. However, this is also imperfect as it lengthens the process and permits the President to alter the plan prior to formal submission--once again leaving Congress with no alternative except total disapproval.

Thus it appears that some procedure for revision during committee consideration would be desirable. A provision for amendment by the committee would provide the greatest flexibility, although a Presidential amendment procedure would be adequate. However, it would be necessary to ensure that any such Presidential amendments would be submitted only during committee consideration. In addition, the committee must have the option of reviewing each amendment for 10 days prior to reporting its recommendations--and possibly seeking further amendment--even if that meant lengthening the 60-day period.

The second problem with which I am concerned is the current procedure for Congressional veto rather than affirmative action. Serious questions have been raised as to whether this procedure meets the requirements of Section 7, Article 1, of the Constitution. It appears that there must be some requirement for a vote to be taken in each case by both Houses.



1. PURPOSE

1. To listen to concerns and priorities of Hispanic-elected officials and other leaders;
2. To assure this constituency that the White House wants a continuing dialogue with them.

11. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS, AND PRESS PLAN

A. Background: This meeting was originally initiated by the Hispanic Congressional Caucus (Gonzalez, Badillo, Royal, de la Garza, Corrada). Other Hispanic elected officials had asked for a meeting and were also invited. The Congressional group did not want their meeting to include other officials and several (notably Badillo and Roybal) said that they would not attend. It was agreed under the circumstances that the meeting would go forward with the officials already invited and without the Congressional group, which would be given a separate appointment at a later date.

In summary, although the appointment process is only two-thirds of the way complete, we have already done much better than President Ford at the conclusion of his term of office. As Harris, Bell, Vance and Marshall complete their appointments, there will be several more Hispanics appointed to executive level positions. We will do better than ever before on judgeships, regulatory commissions and ambassadorships.

SUBJECT: Telephone Call to Prime Minister Trudeau

I telephoned Prime Minister Trudeau on February 2 to give him your views on the site, timing and agenda for the Summit.

Trudeau is fully in favor of calling the meeting "the Summit," and he agrees that the Summit agenda should include political as well as economic issues. In his view, London is fine as the site.

Prime Minister Trudeau has a concern about timing. He said he will want to see how the date proposed for the Summit relates to the timing of the Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting scheduled for June 8-16 in London. He noted that the Commonwealth meeting provides an important forum for the discussion of North-South issues.

On a related issue, Trudeau supports your suggestion that the CIEC meeting should be held before the Summit.

MINUTES OF THE CABINET MEETING
JANUARY 31, 1977

The second meeting of the Cabinet was called to order by the President at 9:05 a.m., Monday, January 31, 1977. All Cabinet members were present except Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Bergland. The Vice President was absent due to his travels abroad on behalf of the President. Other persons present were:

Charles Schultze, CEA Chairman;
Zbigniew Brzezinski, National Security Affairs Adviser;
Robert J. Lipshutz, Counsel to the President;
Frank Moore, Assistant to the President for Congressional Relations;
Stuart Eizenstat, Assistant to the President for Domestic Affairs and Policy
Midge Costanza, Assistant to the President for Public Liaison;
Rex Granum, Deputy Press Secretary;
Dick Moe, Chief of Staff to the Vice President;
Jim King; Special Assistant to the President for Personnel;
Joe Aragon, Special Assistant to the President;
Hugh Carter, Special Assistant to the President for Administration; and
Jack Watson, Secretary to the Cabinet and Assistant to the President for Intergovernmental Affairs.

The President made the following remarks:

(1) The President would like to explore the opening of Cabinet meetings to the press, perhaps by having one or more members of the writing press present at the meetings. He solicited the advice of Cabinet members on the subject and said that he has asked Jody Powell to discuss the subject informally with members of the press to get their suggestions. The President acknowledged the potential problems of such a practice but said that he would like to try it on an experimental basis.

(2) The President reiterated his desire to reduce the various perquisites of office and called on Cabinet members to help him do so. He cited as an example his intention to eliminate un-

necessary transportation, communication, and secret service support of Cabinet members and other government officials while travelling, and said that government planes would be used for domestic travel only when necessary.

(3) The President commented briefly on his meeting with Cyrus Vance, Andrew Young and Zbigniew Brzezinski on Saturday, and said that the meeting was extremely productive.

(4) The President asked members of the Cabinet to meet with Ham Jordan and Frank Moore following the full Cabinet Meeting to discuss procedures for recommendation and clearance of top level Sub-Cabinet appointees.

(5) The President again stressed the need for continuing aggressive efforts on the part of all Cabinet members in recruiting women, Blacks, Hispanics, Native-Americans, Asian-Americans and other ethnic minorities into the government. He noted for example, that there has never been a woman U.S. Attorney, and that he expects that tradition to be changed.

(6) The President emphasized the importance of continuing consultation between members of the Cabinet and members of Congress and urged all Cabinet members to concentrate on establishing and maintaining strong working relationships with Members of both the House and Senate.

(7) The President's legislative message on the economic stimulus package is going to Congress today. He emphasized his desire that all legislative messages and other communications with the Congress and among members of the Executive Branch be succinct and comprehensible.

The President called on members of the Cabinet for their comments and a brief report on their activities. Each Cabinet member beginning with the Secretary of State, Mr. Vance, did so. The following is a summary of matters discussed:

(1) Mr. Vance noted that:

(a) The situation in Rhodesia continues to be serious, and that the Administration will support efforts to repeal the "Byrd" amendment.

(b) The State Department is monitoring the situation in Lebanon and the movement of Syrian forces in that area.

(c) The recent statement by the State Department on the Sakharof case will not, in his opinion, have a negative impact on U.S. discussions with the Soviet Union; and

(d) He will be meeting later in the day with the Panamanian Foreign Minister Aquilino Boyd to discuss the Panama Canal treaty and other matters.

(2) Mr. Blumenthal reported that:

(a) The Treasury Department is reviewing provisions of the Jones Act which prohibit the movement of foreign vessels between U.S. ports. The present problem relates to the shipment of natural gas in foreign vessels from one U.S. port to another.

(b) Treasury has begun work on an outline of goals and objectives for tax reform and is reviewing ways in which to proceed with development of reform proposals. The President noted that, when the procedures are determined, they should be widely publicized so that Congress and the public will understand how we plan to proceed and what we are doing.

(c) Mr. Lance, Mr. Schultze, and he testified before the House Budget Committee on Thursday, January 27, 1977, and that testimony to other key Committees is scheduled for this week.

(3) Griffin Bell said that the Justice Department is willing and ready to serve as the "law department" for the entire Cabinet, and that requests for legal opinions and assistance from Justice would be answered promptly. Mr. Bell reported that he has terminated the practice of having FBI guards for the Attorney General, and that the portal-to-portal service for deputies and others in the Department has stopped.

(4) Mr. Andrus reported a cutback from 9 chauffeur-driven automobiles to 4 in the Department of the Interior. He also reported that a separate private dining room for Assistant Secretaries has been closed. Mr. Andrus announced that he is in touch with the Governors of those states facing emergency or disaster situations, and that he would report to Mr. Watson on Interior's response on a state-by-state basis.

(5) The President noted that there is a potential for unprecedented floods when warm weather returns. He asked Jack Watson to coordinate an assessment of the most serious danger areas and to recommend appropriate action.

(6) Ms. Kreps reported that the Commerce Department has been contacting businesses throughout the country to ask for suggestions on how best to respond to the energy shortage. The Department is evaluating various ideas and proposals which have been submitted.

(7) Mr. Marshall reported that the Labor Department is reviewing the legal and practical implications of the four-day work week proposal. His staff is also analyzing the possibilities of using public service employees for emergency assistance such as snow removal, fuel delivery, emergency clean up and repair, etc. Mr. Marshall also reported briefly on the Teamster investigation.

(8) Mr. Califano suggested that the President include in his speech to the country on Wednesday a statement that special efforts will be made to extend the reach of the tax rebate to the two to five million Americans who do not file tax returns. Mr. Califano reported that he has contacted several Governors, Mayors, leaders of Congress and others in connection with his formation of a task force on welfare reform. A similarly representative group will be formed to address the subject of national health insurance. Mr. Califano said that he is undertaking a "zero-based budgeting" analysis of all regulations issued by HEW.

(9) Ms. Harris said that federal salary levels are adversely affecting recruitment efforts of HUD. She also reported that she has named several career civil servants as Acting Assistant Secretaries, and that she is extremely pleased with their performance. HUD will soon be issuing new public housing regulations. She urged the President and other members of the Cabinet not to be too quick to condemn the Section 8 housing program. She is convinced that the program can be made to work, and that it is essentially sound in concept.

(10) Mr. Adams reported that DOT is assessing ways in which it can respond to the disaster and emergency situations across the country, and that a report on the subject will be delivered to Mr. Watson shortly. He mentioned that decisions will have to be made very soon on a variety of major transportation issues, including I-66, WestWay in New York and the Mid-Way Airport. He also announced that DOT's negotiations with the United Kingdom were being coordinated with Cyrus Vance.

(11) Mr. Young thanked the President for the swearing in ceremony on Sunday afternoon and said that for many of the State Department and foreign service people who were present, it was the first time they had ever been in the White House. Mr. Young reported that activities at the UN are relatively quiet at the moment, and that a Human Rights Commission meeting in Geneva is scheduled for next week. On his forthcoming trip to Africa, Mr. Young will meet with 25 Heads of State in what he described as a "listening tour."

(12) Mr. Schlesinger reported that the natural gas situation has improved somewhat since Saturday, partly because of public response to the President's request to lower thermostats in houses and businesses. There is a slight build-up of pressure in the most severely afflicted pipelines, and temperatures across the country have generally improved. There has been a slight shift to alternative fuels in some areas which is alleviating the natural gas shortage. Mr. Schlesinger's staff are examining possible uses of the Defense Production Act.

(13) Mr. Schultze reported briefly on the potential economic impacts of the cold weather spell and compared the cold weather to an "excise tax" on consumers. First, he estimated that if the cold weather continued there could be as much as a \$2 1/2 to \$5 billion increase in consumer spending ~~as a direct result of the need for more fuel~~. Second, depending upon how long the cold weather continues, there could be an increase in gasoline prices this summer. Third, the damage to the citrus and vegetable crop in Florida is hard to assess at this time but could potentially have an adverse effect on the consumer price index. Finally, the effect of present commercial and industrial layoffs will depend on how long the layoffs last. ←

The CEA is working on an anti-inflation policy for consideration by the President and will soon transmit to the President a set of Executive Orders reconstituting the Council on Wage and Price Stability. Mr. Schultze suggested that OMB's Office of Legislative Service, as well as Stu Eizenstat's staff, should be used by the Departments to coordinate the actual drafting of legislation.

(14) Mr. Lance announced that the zero-based budgeting seminar, which the President called for will be held on Thursday at a time and place to be announced. Mr. Lance also announced that the reorganization bill is almost ready and should go to Congress this week.

(15) Mr. Brzezinski reported that the NSC is undertaking a series of comprehensive reviews of US foreign policy, all of which will be completed by early summer. NSC staff are also working on a four-year foreign policy statement of goals, with recommended sequences and timing of US action in pursuit of those goals. This paper should be ready by the time of the International Summit meeting. NSC staff are analyzing various miscellaneous issues, including human rights, boycott, defense budget and the international narcotic problem. Mr. Brzezinski reported that the personnel selection for NSC staff is almost complete.

(16) The President said that he had asked Jack Watson to work with various Cabinet members and OMB on an analysis of federal regional offices throughout the country.

The President emphasized his desire that Cabinet members avoid schedule conflicts with the Cabinet meetings. He expects all members of the Cabinet and senior advisers to set aside two hours from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. every Monday morning and suggested that other important meetings not be scheduled until 12 o'clock noon.

The President adjourned the meeting at 11:25 a.m.
