U.S.. State Programs Hit

Leasing of Coal Lands In West Called 'Giveaway'

NEW YORK (AP)—The leasing of public and Indian lands in the West for coal production is still a "give-away" despite promised reforms, and most leases "are being held for speculation," according to the Council on Economic Priorities.

The nonprofit research organization, which in 1974 issued a highly regarded report calling the coal-leasing situation "pitiful," said in its new report that nothing much has changed.

"Attempts to correct the historical travesties of the federal leasing program have been ineffectual," the report said, adding that state leasing programs also are "grossly maladministered." The report added:

"Lessees paid the federal government and Indian tribes approximately \$1 an acre in rent in 1977. The six state governments collected an average of just 41 cents an acre.

"Only 14 percent of all federal leases and a minuscule .7 percent of state leases are now in production. Thus enormous coal expansion in the West could easily be supported without additional leasing."

The council noted that the Interior Department is working on a new leasing program, but urged that the department "focus on a coal development program for the substantial acreage already under lease."

The council's 1974 report accused giant corporations of holding vast expanses of surface coal land, apparently for speculative purposes,

despite the energy crisis and the need for coal production.

The new report said that although coal production on federal lands has tripled since 1973, coal was produced last year on only 67 of the 474 federal leases and "lease speculation is rampant."

"Over 25 percent of all federal leases have changed hands since 1973," the report said, "and one-third of all state leases have been assigned at least once."

The report said about 31 percent of the land leased by the federal government is controlled by five companies, and the Peabody Coal Co. controls more than one-third of all leases on Indian lands.

"Oil companies in general play a dominant role in western leasing," the report added. "The Exxon Corp. is the largest holder of state, federal and Indian leases in the West."

Rapid City Police Put End To Rattlesnake Robberies

RAPID CITY, S.D. (UPI)—Rapid City police have stopped what could have been a never-ending circle of rattlesnake robberies at a local tourist attraction called the Reptile Gardens.

Earl Brockelsby, owner of the attraction, said Saturday two juvenile employes allegedly carried rattlesnakes out the establishment's back door and sold the snakes back after keeping them undercover for a couple days. He did not say what charges would be brought against the juveniles.

Subject : Coal Leases

The Research Organization report which the newspaper article referred to was done in 1974 with a recent update. Part of the quotations were from the old report, part of them from the new report. In the recent update, there is language that says, "Sincere efforts of talented members of the Carter staff have gone beyond the token and feeble reforms of the Nixon Administration to begin dealing with these very difficult issues." The newspaper story obviously chose to leave this language out.

The lands in question are those lands that were leased in 1968, 1969 and 1970. There have been no coal lands leased from 1971 until August of 1978, when we leased small tracts to hardship cases as defined by the Federal Court. In every case, this was in a response to a demonstrated demand for specific Federal coal needed to keep an existing mine producing or to supply an existing power plant.

When large amounts of Federal coal were leased in the Nixon Administration, there were no diligence requirements for enforcement of production schedules. In 1976, the Democratic Congress imposed a diligence provision that requires the mine to be in production within 10 years of the lease date. Much of this leased coal will probably not meet the diligence requirements and we will cancel the leases. Other tracts will probably not be mined because of uneconomic quality, environmental reasons, transportation problems or lack of market. But in the meantime, they are legitimate leases that were given by the Federal Government and we have to wait for the clock to run. In the meantime, we are completing a programmatic EIS and Regional Site Specific EIS's which will put a responsible and viable coal leasing program on line in mid-1980.

With existing leases, with new leases that have been approved by the Court, and with our proposed schedule, we will have no difficulty in meeting the coal requirements of your Energy Policy as you outlined it to America.

I can assure you, Mr. President, that your Administration has not participated in any coal leasing that puts Federal coal into the hands of speculators or large energy companies who simply want to hold it. We are urging development of old leases and have advised the coal industry that the leases will be canceled if the diligence requirements are not met. There is more to the story than this brief paper. Should you desire more information, please advise.

Commerce chief Kreps fighting agency shakeup

WASHINGTON—In a classic case of administration infighting, Commerce Sec. Juanita M. Kreps is struggling to prevent her jumbled department from being largely dismantled, and perhaps abolished, in the name of government reorganization. The Sun-Times has learned.

The soft-spoken Kreps, not known as one of the Cabinet's most forceful members, is trying to fend off other Cabinet officers, such as Housing and Urban Development Sec. Patricia Roberts Harris, who hope to purloin large chunks of her agency.

In addition, Kreps is pitted against a White House reorganization team on the verge of recommending that at a minimum, Commerce's biggest and best programs be given away and that, preferably, the department be disbanded.

With her Cabinet post seemingly at stake, Kreps huddled Monday evening with key advisers to plan a counterattack. It was decided, among other things, that she would seek a private audience with President Carter before Nov. 15, when he is expected to receive the reorganization team's recommendations.

INFORMED SOURCES say the report is likely to include three options, none of which is acceptable to Kreps:

- Transfer of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, which formulates the nation's oceans poli-

cy, to the Interior Department. Interior Sec. Cecil D. Andrus covets the added jurisdiction.

- Transfer of the politically potent Economic Development Administration to the Housing and Urban Development Department—a move Harris has been pushing for since the early days of the administration. EDA not only accounts for more than half of Commerce's budget, but it also is perhaps the only program that gives the department any clout with Congress. EDA handles most pork-barrel and public works projects not under the Army Corps of Engineers.

- Abolition of the Commerce Department altogether. Under this scenario, the Maritime Administration would be split, with some functions going to the Defense Department and others to the Transportation Department. The Office of Minority Business Enterprise would be transferred to the Small Business Administration, while Commerce's foreign-trade responsibilities would go to the Treasury Department. Economic and business analysis functions might be vested in some new bureau or agency or transferred to an existing department.

ANOTHER OPTION, which may or may not be included in the report, would be to strip Commerce of everything but business and foreign-trade functions and turn it into a Department of Industry and Trade. If that were to happen, however, Kreps would be left

with only \$700 million of her current \$4.4 billion budget.

"I think it would be very, very difficult to abolish the department," a top Commerce official said. "The business community would take it as an affront—since there still would be a Labor Department."

That, indeed, may be the strongest thing Kreps has going for her—the desire not to insult the business community at a time when Carter desperately needs its co-operation on inflation. Yet, sources report "very strong sentiment" in key quarters for dismantling Commerce, which Kreps once said is "like Noah's ark, except it only has one of everything."

THE CONVENTIONAL wisdom is that, at best, Commerce is likely to lose EDA and NOAA, which account for three-fourths of the department's small budget and virtually all its constituency.

Subject: Industrial Production in October

Tomorrow (Wednesday, November 15) at 9:30 a. m. the Federal Reserve Board will release its estimate of industrial production in October. Total industrial production rose 0.5 percent in October, a 6 percent annual rate, as it did in September.

Over the past several months, growth of industrial output has been slowing (see table). Monthly increases in the second quarter were very large, as first quarter production losses due to cold weather and the coal strike were made up. Since then, production increases have moderated substantially. And the October increase would have been smaller than the September gain had it not been for the rail strike, which reduced coal production and auto assemblies in September and increased output in these two sectors last month.

The trend of production gains in recent months, however, is still relatively strong. Moreover, production of durable goods is rising faster than output of nondurables. That is a good omen, because signs of impending weakness in the economy normally show up in the durable goods industries.

This report is consistent with our view that real GNP is continuing to grow at a good pace in the fourth quarter. The third quarter increase was about a 3-1/2 percent annual rate, and we hope to see a fourth quarter gain close to that.

RE: Proposed Proclamation Entitled:
"Temporary Duty Increase on the
Importation into the United States
of Certain High-Carbon Ferrochromium"

On November 2 you sent a memo to the Special Trade Representative directing an increase in the tariff on certain ferrochromium. There was also a report to Congress to the same effect.

The attached proclamation implements your directive to the STR by imposing an additional duty of 4 cents per pound on high-carbon ferrochromium imported from non-Communist countries and valued at less than 38 cents per pound. (There is no HCF imported from Communist countries.) The increase will extend for a period of three years, beginning November 17.

We recommend that you sign the attached proclamation.

Purpose of the Drop-by

The purpose of your dropping by the Council meeting is to congratulate your new appointees to the Council; you signed their Commissions yesterday.

Background

The President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports was created by Executive Order 11562 on September 25, 1970 and directs the Secretary of HEW to "develop and coordinate a national program for physical fitness and sports."

You have already appointed thirteen of the fourteen Council members and selected Governor Apodaca as your Chairman. The membership (list attached) includes three Olympic athletes, successful coaches, two sports physicians and other well known personalities.

The Council has a small support staff in HEW which is responsible for carrying out the nine point national program as outlined in the Executive Order.

Scenario

The Council has been meeting over the last two days and will adjourn after meeting with you. The members will be seated at the table when you enter. You should go around the table to shake hands with them and provide a photo opportunity.

Gene Eidenberg, my deputy, will serve as host for the group.

Talking Points

- ° It is a pleasure for me to welcome you to the White House today, and I want to thank you for serving on my Council in a volunteer capacity.
- ° I am pleased that Governor Jerry Apodaca has agreed to serve as Chairman of the Council, and I know that he will do a good job.
- ° Some of you are world-famous athletes and coaches. The task of this Council is not to produce world-class athletes but rather to inspire Americans who never exercise or participate in physical activities.
- ° It is ironic that while the quality of our trained amateur and professional athletes gets better every year, 50 million adult Americans never exercise, and youth fitness test scores have not improved since 1965.
- ° Data also show that particular groups of Americans are more likely to be obese and in poor physical condition -- low income, poorly educated, and minorities. A particular challenge to this Council is to influence these groups to improve their fitness.
- ° You endorse the approach which the Council takes to serve as a catalyst for grass-roots activities to promote physical fitness and sports. With very little Federal expenditures the Council has been able to stimulate business, labor, civic groups, local and state governments and other organizations to initiate physical fitness programs.
- ° Physical exercise and recreation have been important to you, and while you do not have as much time to participate in physical activities as you would like, physical activity and sports have been important in maintaining your good health and productivity.

Court Session Reportedly Told Chilean Official Is CIA Agent

A secret court session has been told of "information" that Hernan Cubillos, Chile's foreign minister, has been a "principal" Central Intelligence Agency operative, the Los Angeles Times learned yesterday.

Patrick M. Wall, defense lawyer for Robert Berrellez, an International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. official, cited the information in a closed court hearing Oct. 23, informed sources said.

Wall considered the subject so sensitive that he turned over his copy of the sealed court record to John T. Kotelly, a Justice Department prosecutor, saying he did not want disclosure blamed on him.

Berrellez has been charged with conspiracy, perjury and obstructing governmental proceedings as a result of testimony he gave in 1973 to a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee investigating ITT-CIA attempts to block the 1970 election of Salvador Allende as president of Chile.

Sources said Wall told the court he had "seen" information on Cubillos' covert role, but did not have physical access to it. The lawyer was seeking government documents to bolster Berrellez' defense that he is being prosecuted for acts he contends he was induced to do by CIA representatives, including Cubillos.

Wall's New York office said yesterday that he was traveling and could not be reached for comment.

Juan Prado, press officer for the Chilean Embassy in Washington, said the information sounded "impossible" to him. "It's the first time in my life I have heard something about Mr.

Cubillos and the CIA. For sure, I can say it's a lie."

A CIA spokesman would not comment on grounds the case is still pending.

U.S. District Court Judge Aubrey Robinson Jr. dismissed the jury in the Berrellez case last month rather than accept the Justice Department's special procedure for protecting sensitive information in the case.

The Justice Department urged the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia last Thursday to direct Robinson to accept the procedures under which prosecutors could challenge the relevancy of defense material before it is presented in open court.

Assistant Attorney General Philip B. Heymann had indicated to reporters that the government's chief concern in the case was over revealing CIA station locations. But, without confirming Cubillos' CIA tie, he said yesterday that his earlier statement was merely "illustrative" of the problems surrounding the case.

"With regard to any people or any places, I just can't tell you anything," Heymann said.

Cubillos had been mentioned in the criminal information that the Justice Department filed against Berrellez, but prosecutors dropped references to him without explanation on the day the trial was to begin.

Cubillos, 42, was named foreign minister last April 20, although his only previous government service had been as a Chilean naval officer.

Before dismissing the Berrellez' jury, Judge Robinson said of the government's secrecy proposals: "I just sense there is one name that if it pops up could blow ... I don't know what."

He at one time was the Secretary of the Department of Administration in Florida, which is a sort of OMB, as I understand it.


He has a background in farming and considerable background in business and has considerable wealth.

SUBJECT: Anti-Inflation Outreach

Based on meetings with Alfred Kahn and White House staff, the following is an outline of an initial outreach program on anti-inflation over the next few months. Although many activities are underway, some proposals will have to be reevaluated as the substantive issues are developed. Additional activities will be added during this process, and many details remain to be worked out.

I. WHAT WE WANT TO ACCOMPLISH

- A. Show continuing commitment of the Administration
- B. Educate business -- large, medium and small, about:
 - (1) The nature of current inflation and reasons for the actions we took, and
 - (2) What the wage and price standards mean to the average businessman and what we are doing in terms of Federal fiscal policy and regulatory policy, and also how we intend to use Federal power to secure compliance.
- C. An education campaign that reaches beyond business (but includes labor) to achieve general public understanding.
- D. Obtain specific agreements of compliance from all business -- large, medium and small.

II. HOW WE WILL DO IT

- 1. Briefings in Washington for: (Wexler)
 - Utilities -- Under discussion
 - Banks and Financial Institutions -- In planning
 - Chamber of Commerce Executives -- In planning

2. Regional meetings -- Strategy is to cover every part of the country with briefings by local Federal regional officials. This will require training the best regional officials and commitment of their time; utilization of local Chambers, civic clubs (e.g., Kiwanis, Rotary), and union organizations (as well as consumer groups and other organizations); bring various groups together for briefing and follow-up for support; briefing state and local officials including impact on agency programs; some media development. Preliminary briefing for FRC chairman planned; program being developed. (Wexler/Watson)
3. Regional forums -- Use Washington leaders, with heavy media effort, in several cities; utilize local Chamber, business, or economic forums; focus regional attention on anti-inflation effort; review Hartford and St. Louis forums for decision on future activities. (Strauss)
4. Speakers Bureau -- Develop Washington-based officials who can speak on anti-inflation program at more major forums throughout the country; respond to all invitations; develop requests for speakers using organization networks; identify and track conventions and meetings; track speakers' commitments. First briefing for speakers on November 9; initial speaking engagements to follow. (Aragon)
5. Mailings (Wexler/Watson/COWPS/H. Carter)
 - For December trade association newsletters through ASAE - Done.
 - To Fortune 500 companies from President, seeking compliance - Letter cleared by staff.

- To Commerce business list (companies beyond the Fortune 500) seeking compliance - Being discussed.
 - To interest groups which were pre-briefed advising of Speakers Bureau and asking mailing of information to members; follow-up calls; letter from President for groups participating. First letter from Wexler being drafted.
 - Use telephone, utility bills, etc., for distribution of brochure and information -- Being explored.
 - Response to telegrams, letters and statements of support, asking sender to publicize support -- Letters being drafted for Kahn/Wexler signatures.
6. Actions on the Dollar -- Mailgrams explaining Administration actions in support of the Dollar sent by Watson, Wexler, Moore, Marshall to governors, local officials, 250 business, financial and interest group leaders, Congress and labor leaders. Strong positive response, statements of appreciation.
 7. Work with consumers -- Consumer newspapers; additional steps with food, housing, health, energy; COIN program; identify compliance agreements or endorsements which reach consumers (e.g., retail firm compliance and advertising that to customers). (Peterson)
 8. Regulatory program -- Develop public involvement in regulatory efforts, particularly business; open up discussion of regulatory problems; show openness. Needs further discussion. (Kahn/Wexler/DOC/OMB)
 9. Possibilities for prompt support - Identify institutions which might give prompt support --- financial organizations, utilities, brokerage houses, etc. --- develop mechanisms to reach them using briefings, smaller meetings, mailings, etc. Under discussion. (Wexler/Kahn)
 10. Specialized press briefings -- Labor press (National, regional, local); ethnic press; specialized business press (other than trade associations); others. -- Being scheduled. (Wurfel - See also attached general press plan)

11. State and local government activities -- by separate memorandum, Jack Watson has reported on his activities. They are being coordinated with other outreach efforts.
12. Impact activities -- Identifying additional actions (e.g., Executive Order signings, new regulatory actions) which should be publicized or which can show immediate impact and continuity of program; use of briefings; consultation. (Kahn/Wexler)
13. Commitments -- Business leaders to work with their peers to obtain commitments; a self-enforcement mechanism. Kahn, Eizenstat, Wexler and Butler met with Reg Jones and Mil Batten; additional meetings planned week of November 13; positive reaction thus far. (Wexler/Butler/DOC)
14. Public Relations -- Ad Council campaign; "We Comply" logo on business mailings. Under discussion. (Rafshoon)

III. CONGRESSIONAL ACTIVITIES

Frank Moore and Alfred Kahn's staffs are developing this legislative program. The working group is tracking several matters to insure coordination:

1. Drafting of legislation -- wage insurance; timetable; support building; consulting.
2. Developing other legislation -- timetable; tracking; consultation; briefings; developing support; responsibility.
3. Additional briefings for Members (to develop knowledgeable supporters); for staff (staff briefing suggested for week of November 13).
4. Mechanism for handling Congressional problems -- e.g., questions concerning relief for an industry in a state or district.

GENERAL PRESS PLAN

1. Taped television exclusive interviews for Kahn, Schultze and others in selected markets beginning next week -- related to regional forum cities.
2. Updates to editorial writers and columnists on accomplishments to get across sense of progress -- every two weeks or so through Media Liaison Office.
3. Radio actualities for Kahn, Schultze and others for small and medium-sized markets beginning within 30 days.
4. Continue liaison with Speakers Bureau for media and Administration spokespersons.
